Dubuar Funeral Here This Friday

Chas. L. Dubuar, 86, Long-Time Resident of Village Passed Away on Birth-day.

News reached this village Wednesday of the death of one more Northville pioneer, Charles L. Dubuar, at the home of his son in New York State. Mr. Dubuar passed away on his eighty-sixth birthday, Jan. 10, at Wanakena, where he had gone about four years ago to make his home with James and his family. The remains were brought to the Casterline Funeral Home and services will be conducted there at 2 o'clock this Friday afternoon, by Rev. J. Leslie French of the Presbyterian church.

Charles Dubuar was born in Northville in 1859 to Rev. Jas. S. Dubuar and Mrs. Dubuar, who had come from New York to take up ministerial duties in Northville's Presbyterian church. Mr. Dubuar attended the Northville schools and upon graduation in 1876 went to the University of Michigan, where he received his degree. For several years he worked as an inspector for the U. S. Postal Service, living at one time in Washington, D. C. Later, Mr. Dubuar set up business here known as the Dubuar Lumber and Coal Co., in buildings at the east end of Main street.

Mr. Dubuar conducted this business for many years, selling out in the fall of 1919 to Henry Ford who established the present Ford Motor plant on the property.

A quiet spoken scholarly man, Mr. Dubuar devoted much of his time to the Northville schools, serving for thirty-two consecutive years, 1893-1925, as a member of the local board of education. He was an elder in the church in which his father had served for more than twenty years, his name appearing on the list at the time of his death.

Report Shows Local War Loan Drive Tops Goal


\$71,500 Sold by 36 Women Gallants Who Worked Block Canvass; Mrs. Fred High Sales Lady

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
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
