

age of any single engagement to the enemy fleet.

Her Air Commander, Commo David McCampbell, with 34 Jap planes at this writing, has made strikes on Marcus, Wake (twice), Truk, Rabaul, Saipan, Guam, and Bonins, the Philippines, Formosa, Kavieng, Namur (Babuyan Islands) and Palau. Gilberts, Marshalls, Samar, Visayas, Luzon, and Mindanao. She has been shot down 15 times. She has made strikes on Marcus, Wake (twice), Truk, Rabaul, Saipan, Guam, and Bonins, the Philippines, Formosa, Kavieng, Namur (Babuyan Islands) and Palau.

The Essex has destroyed 1,025 planes, of which 41 were shot down by her own task forces in the last two historic sea-battles of the Philippine Sea, engagements of June 19-20 and Oct. 24-25, the first of which completely destroyed Japanese air strength. She has sunk or damaged over 7,000 sorties flown, in

which were expended tons of bombs, rockets and torpedoes.

Ship sunk by the Essex planes include an escort carrier, 2 destroyers, two tankers and 26 cargo vessels. Working with other carriers she has sunk one large and one small carrier. Her outstanding individual feat was an attack on a convoy of 30 ships off Pagan in the Marianas. In a single raid she sank a destroyer, five cargo ships and two escort vessels and probably sank six more cargo ships and one escort—a total of approx. 60,000 tons of shipping sunk or probably sunk from one convoy.

There are many, aces on the Essex an Ace being a man who has shot down five planes. You never hear their names; for only the Bongs and McCampbells, the Fosses and Gentiles and Gantels' get mentioned in the papers. One of the Essex pilots who has got his five kills in a quiet way, with nothing said about it until now, is Lt. Wayne Morris, the motion picture actor.

Archie has been with the ship ever since she was commissioned and a gunner expects to be home around April or May—won't be too soon.
