Villagers Asked to Bundle Papers and Place at Curb

Please Tie Securely, and Place on Front Steps or Curb Where Truck Gangs Will Be Able to See Them As They Travel Street; Need Better Record Than One Out of Ten Houses.

Won't You Help—Save Paper Tie It, Too

A special appeal has been received by the state Salvage Bureau at Lansing for waste paper. Practically every paper mill in the State of Michigan has been forced to close down two or three days per week due to the lack of waste papers. Packaging material are being used more extensively for war supplies to be sent overseas in medical supplies and equipment that need careful packing due to the nature of their frailty.

Despite allied control of the seas pulpwood from Sweden has so far been unable to be shipped here, and the shortage of manpower in Canada will force a reduction of 100,000 tons of pulpwood to be imported by the United States.

With these facts in mind the American Legion boys who are doing this heavy salvage job appeal to all patriotic citizens to gather and tie their papers and set them on their steps or curb on FRIDAY, February 9th for the pick up. Please put your tied bundles out early so as to suggest by example that your neighbor do likewise. Trucks will operate after 5 o'clock in picking up the paper. Routes have been set up and personnel assigned to the work, and paper not gathered Friday evening will be collected Saturday morning.

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



SAVORY SAVING... This recipe for using up "leftover" roast beef is highly recommended by our Home Service Department:

Luncheon Rolls with Mushroom Sauce
2 cups flour 1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt 2 lbs. shortening
2 1/2 to 3 1/2 cups milk

Soft dry ingredients together, cut in shortening, and add milk to make a soft dough. Roll to 1/4-inch thickness and spread with mixture of ground leftover roast beef, finely diced cooked potatoes and finely minced onion. (This may be moistened slightly with white sauce or leftover gravy.) Roll like a jelly roll and cut into one-inch slices. Bake in casserole pan at 450° F. for 12 to 15 minutes. Serve with mushroom sauce.

CARE OF CORDS... It is always important to take care of your electric appliance cords—and particularly so in wartime. These simple instructions will extend the life of your cords: Keep them free from oil, moisture and grease; avoid kinking and knotting; keep them away from sharp edges and hot appliances. Do not hang them over nails. When disconnecting them from outlets, grasp plug firmly—don't jerk cord.

RATION FREE SHOE SALE COMING UP

Limited quantities of men's and women's shoes may be sold to consumers ration-free at specified price reductions during the week of February 19 through March 3. OPA announces two-fold purpose of the temporary ration: holiday OPA states, is to give consumers the benefit of extra shoe mileage that otherwise might remain unused on dealers' shelves and to help dealers clear their stocks of the normal accumulation of odds and ends and broken sizes. Before rationing, such shoes were customarily dispensed in seasonal clearance sales.

O.P.A. estimates that about 4,500,000 pairs of shoes will be sold in this special ration-free "sale."

CUT AUTOMOBILE RATION

An out of one-third will be made in the number of new passenger cars available for rationing in February, when the quantity will amount to 2,000 cars on a national basis, or 1,000 less than in preceding months, OPA reports.

The action will leave about 12,000 new cars in the nation's stockpile.
