Elmer, a 1940 graduate of the Northville High school, went into service Dec. 10, 1942 and was sent overseas Oct. 6, 1944. He rose from the ranks to staff sergeant and on June 16, 1945 was given an honorable discharge from the Infantry, and made a commissioned officer. Elmer was wounded by a shell fragment in the left leg, Nov. 21, in France, when he crawled thru shell fire to administer first aid to four wounded comrades. I like my work very much and have been working in the same office ever since I came overseas. The whole thing has been quite an experience and I wouldn't exchange a day of it.



by Leo Hollis to his parents,

who live on First street and re-

ceived about six weeks ago:

Philipine Island -

Well I suppose you all have

been wondering what has been

happening to me in the last

month or so. I have been sort

of busy. We made a loading here

and I hit the assault wave. You

don't have to worry though be-

cause I'm still OK.

The Philippines were sure glad

to see us coming in. The Japs

have been treating them kind of

souge for the past year but they

are sure happy now.

When we came in it was quite

a show. You can never realize

how it is until you see one.

You know my heart took a couple of

extra skips coming in. The Navy

sure did a swell job. I saw more than one Jap plane knocked down.

I got a chance to get some Jap

money so I'm enclosing some of

it in the letter. I thought you

would like to see some. They

have the money divided into

pesos and centavos. A peso is

equal to about 50 and a centavo

is 1/2 of a cent. That will give

you some idea what the money

was worth, of course, it isn't

worth anything now.

I can't tell you much right now

because of the scarcity of paper

around here now. By the way I

had to borrow this. You can't carry

so much coming in and

you can never realize

how it is until you see one.





SUGAR SAVER. No sugar—and very little shortening—is used in this recipe from our Home Service Department:

Plymouth Brownie

1/2 cup yellow corn meal 2 cups salt
2 cups boiling water 1 cup yeast
2 tbs. shortening 1/2 cup lukewarm water
1/2 cup molasses 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 egg, white

Stir corn meal very slowly into boiling water, stirring constantly. Boil five minutes, add shortening, molasses and salt. Cool. When lukewarm, add the yeast, which has been softened in 1/2 cup of lukewarm water. Add the flour for a stiff dough. Knead well and let rise until double in bulk. Shape into two loaves, place in well greased loaf pans, let rise until double in bulk again. Bake for one hour in preheated oven at 350° F.


