I've just had another physical check-up, and though I've improved I'm limited duty for another month, which means about three more months in Miami. I won't mind, I'd sure hate to go north right now into ice and snow. If it as hot as the Miami papers say, I would much rather be in Miami than far as people are concerned however. Michigan folks are much more friendly and down to earth.

I was one of the service men fortunate enough to be with his wife and child this Christmas. My boy Lee will be three in February. Just thought to be very excited about Santa Claus and his gifts. Mrs. Rix and I sure enjoyed watching him Christmas morning. He was a very busy boy for about three hours before he'd finally examined each of his many presents. We left Santa Claus a coke and sandwich the night before, and Lee was quite impressed the next morning when he saw the empty dishes.

I started out to be a Radar officer, but I'm now in charge of a Radar room. I have about twenty men under me, including a chief petty officer. It is interesting work. They could get along without me as far as the mechanical work is concerned, but the set-up is rather complicated, and an officer is needed to keep things running smoothly. We have a preventive maintenance program in addition to our regular repairs. Coast Guard and Navy activities are combined. We have "motor pools" which supply transportation to service personnel on official business; we have "Temporary Reserve" personnel who work here one night out of eight—they are civilians the rest of the time—a different group each night; there are also Temporary Reserve Spars who do office work; we have to contact out Navy and Coast Guard activities continually about their vehicles. So everything considered I'm doing useful work although I'm on limited duty. I won't be quite contented however until I'm put on an active duty status. Sincerely,

Philippine Island

Dear Mom, Dad and Ralph:

Well I suppose you all have been wondering what has been happening to me in the last month or so. I have been sort of busy. We made a landing here and I got the assault wave. You don't have to worry though because I'm still OK.

The Filipinos were sure glad to see us coming in. The Japs have been treating them kind of tough for the past year but they are sure happy now.

When we came in it was quite a show. You can never realize how it is until you are one.

I know my heart took a couple of extra jumps coming in. The Navy sure did a swell job. I saw more than one Jap plane knocked down.

I got a chance to get some Jap money so I'm enclosing some of it in the letter. I thought you would like to see some. They have the money divided into pesos and centons. A peso is equal to about 50 and a centon is 1/2 of a cent. That will give you some idea what the money was worth of course. It isn't worth anything now.

I can't tell you much right now because of the scarcity of paper around here now. By the way I had to borrow this. You can't carry it with you coming in and

the regulations are limiting us a bit.

OK by the way I still haven't got all my Christmas packages and I suppose it will be quite a time before I get them. I received quite a few Christmas cards though.

Well I will close now until I can write you some more. Be good and don't worry. Your son, Leo.

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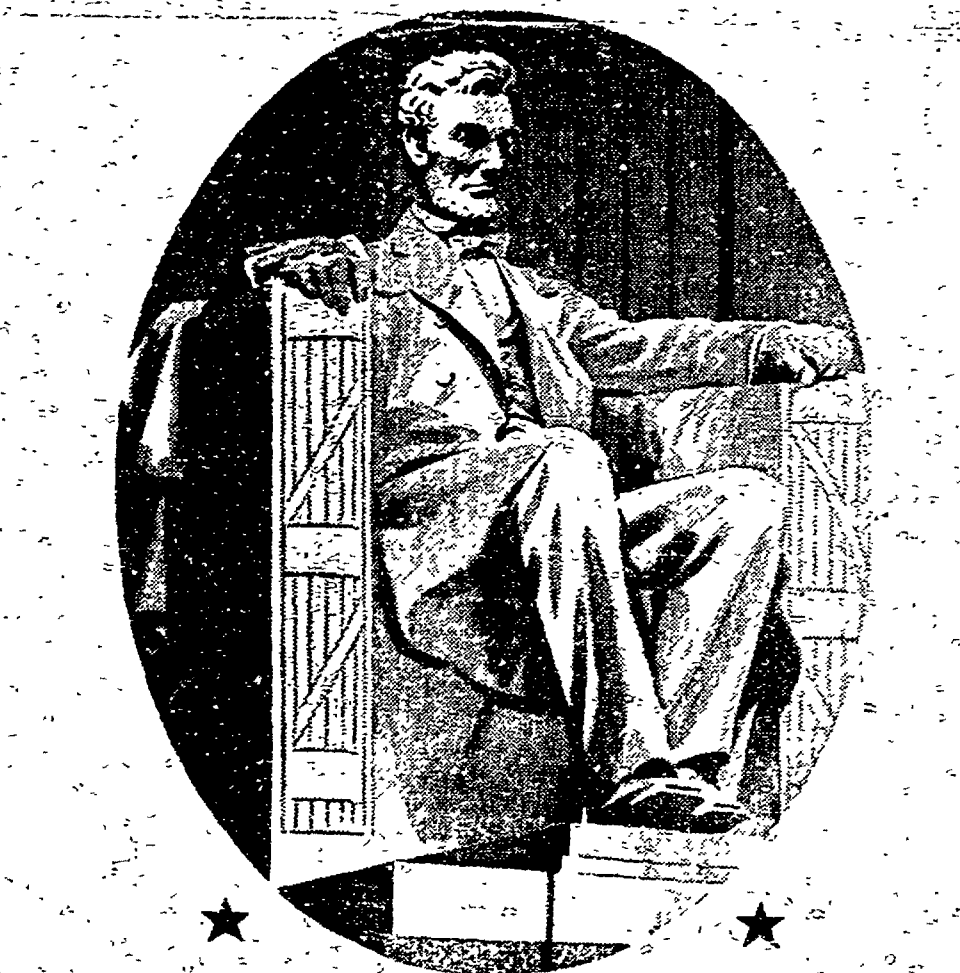

Legionnaires Will Canvass Village After Supper this Friday Evening to Gather Waste Paper

Everyone in Northville knows by now that waste paper is the No. 1 Critical War Material. It's needed to day in fighting the war as ever more vital than money.

Today, Monday, Feb. 6, the Waste Paper will be picked up throughout the village after five o'clock P. M. by truck-manned by Legionnaires. Bundle your papers, tie them, and place them at the curb or in sight on your steps early Friday so you won't forget and to remind your neighbors.

Bundling waste paper saves gasoline. Bundled waste paper can be moved four times faster than loose paper and a truck can carry much larger loads of bundled paper than of loose. That makes fewer truck trips necessary, thus cutting down the use of gasoline and manpower.

Indrude of Northville households still have quantities of old papers, magazines, books lying around the basement or attic, utterly useless, there and a fire hazard as well. It is the solemn duty of every household to get that paper out and moving to the mills, many of which because of the small amount of waste paper coming in, are on the verge of suspending operations.

The Army and Navy depend on more than one-third of their total economy requirements on eight paper mills in Michigan. It requires about 2,500 tons of waste paper a week to keep them going at full production.

It is the patriotic duty of everybody to save, bundle, and get that waste paper on the road to the mills so they do not become a burden on a single hour.

1/2 cup yellow corn meal 2 tsp. salt
2 cups boiling water 1 cake yeast
2 tbs. shortening 1/2 cup lukewarm water
1/2 cup molasses 4 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
enriched white flour

Stir corn meal very slowly into boiling water, stirring constantly. Boil five minutes, add shortening, molasses and salt. Cool. When lukewarm, add the yeast, which has been softened in 1/2 cup of lukewarm water. Add the flour for a stiff dough. Knead well and let rise until double in bulk. Shape into two loaves, place in well greased loaf pans, let rise until double in bulk again. Bake for one hour in preheated oven at 350° F.
