The following is a letter written by Capt. Carl Denton to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jos. Denton, of Randolph street.

Something in France with me. Ready to move again after a couple days rest. Quite a number of my men have been recommended for decorations. I refused a chance of promotion as I could stay with my outfit and I am glad I did. You will see by the papers we are again on the offensive. We have found the enemy strong but they are leaving him to be, but man for man our soldiers are far superior. The Jerry's are like automatons or dummies. They are finding out the American soldier is not so soft-hearted as they thought them to be. We are anxiously waiting to run up and meet our Russian buddies.

Jerry is getting no quarter now and we wonder what he will do next, but we are already for him. We are going to be busy again. You don't know how much I shall not have much time to write and our Post Office isn't next door, you know. All my love, Carl.

Received 8 of 10 Records at mail call, and also the Xmas edition. I was very glad to receive them and want to thank you very much. I also got my packages from home which have been coming since October and November and which also are very nice to receive. I will close now, thanks again for the Record. Sincerely, Hugh J. Just a few lines to let you know I am feeling fine and hope you are also. Well as you well know I am now going to school with the crew before we go aboard our ship. It is a large cargo vessel. I was supposed to get a transport but they changed my orders. I got your Record of Jan. 26 and want to thank you very much for it. It really helps me to keep in touch with what my buddies in Northville are doing and where they are stationed. Well I will be here for 7 weeks then I will start on another sea going trip I suppose. It is quite cold up here but I guess I'll be able to stand it all right. I had a swell time at home and want to thank everybody for the way they help to make us service men happy. Your fine Northville Record followed me all the way out to California. Now I sure would appreciate it if you made a change of address, and started sending it now to sunny Fla. The Marine Corps are sending me to A. E. M. School, which stands for aviation electrician's mate. This school is situated in Jacksonville. It is the largest base I have been to so far. It is really a Navy base but the Marine Corps has a small detachment here. I will be stationed here for the next five months. So it will be with real and sincere gratitude that I will be looking forward to receiving my first Florida bound Northville Record.

The 11th General Hospital, England - Private First Class Robert C. Sears, twenty-three, of 407 Yerkes street, Northville, Michigan, who was wounded in fragments during fighting in Germany, is now recovering in this United States Army general hospital in England.

Pfc. Sears is making very good progress in his recovery, and will soon be transferred to the rehabilitation section of this hospital, said his ward surgeon, First Lieutenant Henry W. Quist, Jr. of Minneapolis, Minn.

Pfc. Sears was advancing with the Infantry unit, part of the 102nd Division, towards a small town on the River when he was hit by the Nazi main natural gas fence barrier before the Rhine, when he was wounded.

"I walked a few hundred feet back to where company aid men were treating other wounded," Pfc. Sears said. "After I was fixed up I had to wait until daylight to be moved. By then we had taken the town on the Roer."

After treatment at Army hospitals in Belgium and France, Pfc. Sears was evacuated to England by plane. He holds the Purple Heart and Expert Infantryman's Badge.

Before entering the Army November 26, 1942, Pfc. Sears was a machinist for the Ford Motor Company plant in Northville. His brother, Sergeant Russell Sears, is with the Air Force in the United States.

Bob is the son of Mrs. Myrtle Sears of Yerkes avenue and of Earl Sears of Grace avenue.

Given Bronze Star for Heroism

Pfc. Herbert H. Brown of Northville Rewarded for Heroism Near St. Die France

Pfc. Herbert H. Brown, a Northville man with the 49th Infantry Division, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroism in action near St. Die, France, on November 11, 1944. According to the citation Pfc. Brown throughout the day continually exposed himself to artillery and mortar fire to give first aid and to evacuate the wounded. On five occasions, with utter disregard for his life, he courageously braved enemy fire in order that first aid could be given as expeditiously as possible. Due to Pfc. Brown's gallant and unselfish actions, the lives of at least five men were assured.

Pfc. Brown's father, Herbert Brown, lives at 19540 Maxwell Road, Route No. 2, Northville, Mich. He is the brother of Mrs. Sam Lawrence formerly of Fairbrook road now of Walled Lake.

ORDINANCE No. 122
CONTRIBUTING TO THE DELINQUENCY OF MINORS

The People of the Village of Northville, Ordain: SECTION 1. FURNISHING OBSCENE BOOKS TO CHILDREN. Any person who shall sell, give away or, in any way furnish to any minor child any book, pamphlet, or other printed paper, or other thing, containing obscene language, or obscene prints, pictures, figures or descriptions, tending to the corruption of the morals of youth, or any newspapers, pamphlets or other printed paper devoted to the publication of criminal news, police reports, or criminal deeds, and any person who shall in any manner hire, use or employ such child to sell, give away, or in any manner distribute such books, pamphlets or printed papers, and any person having the care, custody or control of any such child, who shall permit him or her to engage in any such employment, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 2. EXHIBITION OF OBSCENE MATTER WITHIN VIEW OF CHILDREN. Any person who shall exhibit upon any public street or highway, or in any other place within the view of children passing, any book, pamphlet or other printed paper, or other thing containing obscene language or obscene prints, figures, or descriptions, tending to the corruption of the morals of youth, or any newspapers, pamphlets or other printed paper or thing devoted to the publication of criminal news, police reports or criminal deeds, shall on conviction thereof be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 3. FURNISHING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES TO MINORS. Any person who willfully gives or furnishes any alcoholic beverages to a minor except upon authority of and pursuant to a prescription of a duly licensed physician shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 4. PENALTIES. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or by imprisonment in the Village Jail, or Detroit House of Correction for a period not exceeding 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment may be required in the discretion of the Court, together with costs of prosecution.

SECTION 5. "This ordinance shall be in full force and effect twenty-one days after passage."






Table comparing 'BEFORE' and 'AFTER' lighting conditions with lamp counts and lumens.

HOW THE LOAN PART OF GI BILL OPERATES

Save Trouble and Time By Knowing No Loans Are Made Directly by the Government, As So Many Believe

Veterans of World War II who want to take advantage of the loan provisions of the GI Bill of Rights are informed that a study of the provision will save many disappointments and a lot of steps.

First, the government does not make the loans provided for by the bill, but it does guarantee to the lender the repayment of 30 per cent of the loan, the limit of the guarantee being \$2,000. It also provides for payment of the interest for the first year, and sets a limit to the interest rate that can be charged.

The veteran must secure the loan from the usual sources of loans, such as banks, savings and loan associations, private lenders, and so forth. These lenders will want to be sure that the loan is for a proper purpose—and the purposes are limited to farms, farm machinery, homes and business purposes and will want to be assured that there is a reasonable chance for repayment—for while the government guarantees up to half, the lender is also taking a chance.

Loans will not be available to finance vacation trips, for personal clothing, for a pleasure car, or for many other personal purposes.

LEGION CLUB HOUSES

American Legion club houses are the centers of community life in thousands of towns in the United States. Thousands of these club houses are owned by The American Legion Posts and they will eventually pass along to the young veterans of World War II who take over the tasks their elders must soon lay down.

Somewhere between 40 million and 50 million dollars have been invested by American Legion posts in War Bonds. Reports have not been received from the last bond campaign. It's a nice but egg for the World War II veterans who will be tomorrow's American Legionnaires.

WAR II VETERAN IS ASST. STATE ADJUTANT

MILWAUKEE, Wis. — Clarence Gersonde of Racine, Wis., a World War II veteran was one of the organizers of Harvey R. Hanson Post of The American Legion, composed exclusively of World War II men and named for the first Racine man killed in World War II at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. Gersonde is assistant, and World War II returning men have someone at the department office who knows their side of the story.

In December, the Veterans' Administration announced that it also adopts that attitude, unless fraud on the part of the veteran entered into securing the loan.
