The writer is Pfc. Gerard Miller, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Miller of First street, and he is 19 years old. Jerry went into service March 22, 1944, training at Camp Robinson, Ark., Camp Maxey, Texas, and Ft. Jackson, S.C. His diploma from the Northville High was presented to his parents during the graduation exercises held here in June, having made up his credits before leaving for service. Jerry was home last August on furlough and went overseas about the first of October, 1944, to Belgium.

Dearest Folks:

Received five Christmas boxes besides the one from the Blue Star Mothers. I was very pleasantly surprised as I thought I had already received all of them. Thanks again! I don't know whatever prompted you to send the chapstick but I sure am glad you did. Having a lot of awful wet and windy weather in my lips are cracked half the time.

I guess the reason the boxes didn't get here earlier is because we haven't stayed in one sector long enough.

The Record is finally coming thru a couple more copies have just arrived. Please thank them for me and I shall write later. Belgium

This letter was received by the Record from Pfc. Wm. H. Lewis. I received your card, but somehow I lost it so I will write new lines which I should have written a long time ago. I am now some where in Belgium but the address is the same as always. You don't know how much I want to thank you for sending me the paper. It is some times a little late but I always look forward to getting it. Thru it I know pretty well where all my friends are and what they are doing. There is also the home news that I don't get in letters. In other words your whole paper is interesting. I have been over seas quite a while and I haven't found any thing that makes you feel better than news from home. Well I am not much at writing and I guess you are busy so I will close thanking you again for the paper. Your friend Bill.

When we were relieved at Walhain we pulled back for a couple of days and then farther back to a French village for Christmas. A 1½ hour ride followed our Christmas dinner, to Reims, France. A few days there in strategic reserve, in the woods, then up to the Ardennes (Moeray) to help push back the Bulge. What followed after Moeray is apparently still restricted, so I'll tell you about it later. This was during the bitter cold in Ardennes, which you read about in the papers when we were ill-clad. A lady who lives in the house where we are now, used to live in the States. She speaks perfect English and it sure seems good to hear some one besides us G.I.'s. She came here to visit and is anxious to get back. We are supposed to get clean clothes and a shower tomorrow. I sure hope so. Also a movie tomorrow evening. Imagine a bunch of dirty G.I.'s walking into a show back-home-in full regalia. (Continued on back page)

Ordinance No. 121 DISTURBING THE PUBLIC PEACE

The People of the Village of Northville, Ordain:

SECTION 1. Any persons who shall make or assist in making any noise, disturbance, or improper diversion,

any row or riot in any tavern, store or grocery, manufacturing

establishment or any other business place, or any street, lane, alley, highway, public building,

grounds or park, or at any election or other meeting,

where citizens are peacefully and lawfully assembled, shall be punished as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2. Any person found drunk or intoxicated, on any street, lane or public place

within the Village of Northville, shall be deemed a disorderly person and guilty of disorderly conduct, and on conviction thereof, after provided.

SECTION 3. Any person of sufficient age, who shall refuse or neglect to support his family, shall be deemed a disorderly person, and guilty of disorderly conduct, and on conviction thereof, shall be punished as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 4. Any person who shall talk, laugh or otherwise interrupt the services in any place of divine worship, shall be punished as hereinbefore provided.

SECTION 5. Persons shall not collect, stand in crowds, or remain loitering or sidewalk, or at street corners or in front of any church, any public hall or place.

SECTION 6. No person shall show, sell or offer for sale or exhibit any indecent or obscene picture, drawing, engraving, book or pamphlet within the corporate limits of this Village.

SECTION 7. Any person found drunk or intoxicated, on any street, lane or public place

within the Village of Northville, shall be deemed a disorderly person and guilty of disorderly conduct, and on conviction thereof, after provided.
