Biennial Spring Election Comes Next Monday

Sgt. David L. Kenneth and Corp. Harold Martens are the three sons of Mrs. Martha Martens of Cady street. They were all born in Canada but came to Northville when very small. They attended the Northville Grade and High schools, graduating in the class of 1939, 1939 and 1941, respectively. Sgt. David is married to the former Ann Troast and has a baby girl born this Jan. 25. David entered service in June, 1942, went overseas, was wounded in the African campaign in 1943, returned to the United States and went overseas again in October, 1944 and is now with the 7th Army in Germany with the Engineer combat group. Lt. Kenneth enlisted in March, 1941, trained at Camp Grant, Ill. in the Medical Corps but transferred into the Air Corps. He went overseas this January and is a pilot of a B-24 Bomber in the European Theater of War. Corp. Martens entered service in March, 1943, and has been stationed at various places with the Army Band. He went overseas this January and is also in the European Theater.

Sgt. David Hay arrived home Friday evening on furlough from Brownsville Army Air Field. He has until April 10th. Sgt. Hay met Ted Watts in Kansas City the latter part of February.

Pfc. Ben Duguid of this village who entered the service March 31st, 1943, and at the present time is stationed at a supply base in the North Carolina area, has recently had his first furlough, which he spent in South Carolina. Sgt. Duguid's uncle, Ben, travelled by plane to England then by train to Scotland and he writes of having a wonderful time with relatives and friends of his mother. He also speaks of the wonderful scenery of that beautiful country. The town he visited is near the sea, surrounded on the east, south, and west by a beautiful rugged coast, with high cliffs and two very old castles high up on the rocks. On his return journey to Ireland, he had to stay overnight in Glasgow.

While conversing with a gentleman in the hotel lobby, he found the man had known his father when the latter lived on the estate of Balmoral castle, years ago. Ben went back to Ireland the next day by plane. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Duguid of Grace avenue.

It's been ages I know since I last wrote a letter to you. I've been pretty busy these past months and do hope you will excuse me this time. I am getting along fine and like all the rest, would like this war to finish soon, so we can get back home.

Just recently received a few editions of the Northville Record and was glad to hear that some of the boys arrived back for a well earned leave after spending many months overseas. I can well imagine how happy they must have been when they arrived home. I too have hopes of the same experience in the near future. Was surprised a little over a month ago when my brother (Walter) wrote me that he was over here somewhere. He had tried to locate him, but so far luck has been against me. Would sure like to see him as the last time we saw each other was in 1942. I understand there are quite a few Northville boys over here, but haven't been fortunate enough to meet any yet. The news from all fronts has been wonderful these past few weeks and we are hoping they continue until the finish.

Would like to take this time to thank you for all the Record. I've received in the past, and although mail arrives pretty slow, I still look forward to the coming paper. Wishing all of you the best of health and good luck always. Sincerely, Robert W. Ross.

I just received your card concerning any change of address and it made me realize just how long it has been since I last wrote. I have really enjoyed the copies of the Record that I have gotten in the past. I will let you know as soon as I get back where it doesn't take so long for the paper to get to me. I have hopes that that time won't be in the distant future. We've been having quite a bit of rain lately and I understand that the rainy season is still a month or so away. Sincerely, Robert W. It was quite some time ago that I wrote you a lot of things. I think the last I wrote was on the Anzo Beaches. I won't try to make excuses for not writing, because there are none. But I will try to see that it doesn't happen again. I have met several of my old buddies in the past year. I met Don Kimmel on the push to Rome. Don and I have been in the same Co. ever since. Rome was a wonderful place, as some of the fellows have already told you.

When we left Rome to go back and train for the landing in France, Don and I met some more fellows from Northville. Two of them are in the same Division we are in, that's Bill and Walt Nafranowich in Naples and I think Don met Lloyd Clark there also.

We've seen quite a bit of France, we haven't seen Paris yet. I am sorry to hear about so many of the fellows from Northville being wounded. My deepest sympathy to those families that have lost their loved ones in this war.

I want to thank you an awful lot for the Record. Sincerely, Art Karschnick.

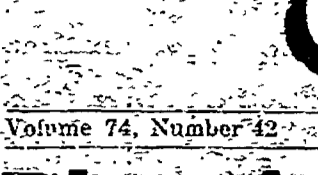

Awarded 2nd Oak Leaf Cluster

T/S Donald J. Wilber, 21 yr. old E-17 Radio Operator and Gunner Cited Again

An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England—A veteran of more than 150 hours of aerial combat, Technical Sergeant Donald J. Wilber, 21-year-old B-17 Flying Fortress radio operator and gunner from Northville, has been awarded a second Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal for meritorious achievement during Eighth Air Force bombing attacks on Nazi military and industrial installations.

Flying with the 482d Bomb Group, commanded by Colonel Robert B. Lindy of New Orleans, La., has participated in a large number of aerial assaults against the enemy, including an attack on the city of Berlin at Meuseburg, Germany, where he said, "you could practically walk on the Hah." His group is a unit of the Third Air Division, the division cited by the President for its England-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt aircraft plants at Regensburg.

Rev. Lord served in the Northville Methodist church from the summer of 1935 until November, 1941, when he left to take over the Flint pastorate. He was also director of religious education for the Ann Arbor District of the Methodist conference during a portion of that period. With Mrs. Lord and their daughter, Laura Marie, he occupied the parsonage here. Laura Marie graduated from N. H. S. and later from Albion college, she is now teaching music in a school near Albion.

Most Business Places Will Close During Hours of Services. Local Churches Plan Easter Services

The final events of the annual Lenten season, observed in all places of worship in this village, are the Good Friday and Easter Sunday services. Scriptures, music and flowers will set these two religious observances apart from those of other times.

Sgt. Cecil Nizder Wounded in Italy. Tom Martino Back in U. S. Hospital

Pfc. Tom Martino and Sgt. Cecil Nizder are two more Northville Servicemen who have been hospitalized.

Pfc. Tom Martino, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul I. Martino of Randolph street is now stationed at the Mayo Brothers General Hospital at Galesburg, Illinois. Tom arrived in the United States the first part of March from Italy, where he was wounded in October.

Tom graduated from Northville High school in the class of 1939. He has lived in Northville for about fifteen years. Previous to entering the service in October, 1942, he worked at the Kroger store and at the Northville.

Township and State Ticket Amendments

Four Ballots Will Be Handled. Voters Watch Time Schedule for Hours of Opening of the Polls

Monday, April 2nd the qualified electors will be handed four ballots upon which to register their wishes in the Biennial Spring election. The state ticket (partisan) lists candidates for state offices on both tickets. The non-partisan ticket lists justices of the supreme court and circuit court judges. The official amendment ballot lists two proposals for the township ticket and township candidates for election.

The state ticket—in both Novi and Northville the following state candidates will be voted on:

Members of the University—Otto E. Eckert and Chas. E. Kennedy, Republicans and J. Walter Orr and Edward M. Welch, Democrats.

Supt. of Public Instruction—Eugene B. Elliott, Republican and E. Burr Sherwood, Democrat.

Member Board of Education—Charles G. Burns, Republican is opposed by Carl O. Smith, Democrat.

For Members of State Board of Agriculture—Forest H. Akers and Melville B. McPherson, Republicans are opposed by George Cahill and Frank J. Wagoner, Democrats.

Chas. M. Ziegler (R) and George A. Dingman (D) seek the State Highway Commissioner's post.

For County Auditor (in Wayne) an independent (R) and James D. Ford (D) seek preference.

Two Justices of the Supreme Court—Walter H. North, Republican and Walter W. Caplan, Democrat are in the race.

For Circuit Court Judge in Wayne County, John V. Brennan and John R. McLaughlin are in the race.

In Novi and Northville the following candidates will be voted on:

Two proposals to amend the state constitution are to be voted on. Proposal No. 1 seeks increase in millage, and the other No. 2 seeks further control of rivers, lakes and stream levels.

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Michigan local governments which now receive more than three-fifths of all money collected by the State of Michigan, have not fast faith in Santa Claus.

On the assumption that Washington or Lansing subsidies will be forthcoming during the postwar deflation period, many local units of government have prepared blueprint plans for job-creating public works of various kinds, such as sewage and sanitation facilities, water works and water mains, schools, and roads and bridges.

In fact, the State has encouraged local governments to do this. Through a \$5,000,000 appropriation by the 1944 special session of the state legislature, the State offered to prorate state aid to pay up to 50 per cent of the blueprint planning cost of such projects, if submitted to the State Planning Commission by Dec. 15, 1944.

Don Weeks, director, says the commission staff is now classifying the projects. He expects to have a detailed breakdown within a week or so.

Having experienced recently a lengthy depression, Michigan governments appear to be well set for a postwar slump.

That is, as far as PLANS are concerned.

Local governments' projects, as submitted to the State planning commission by last Dec. 15, involve a total of \$408 million, estimated at 1944 prices. Approximately one-half of this sum would be spent in Wayne county.

County road commissions (not included in the above \$408 million) submitted highway and bridge projects calling for \$64 million more.

And then the state highway department's postwar program would utilize an additional \$140 million. Thus the road building plans of cities, counties and the state, as already projected for the postwar employment period, involve a total of approximately \$550 million.

It is this amount that local governments' non-road projects, and you arrive at the cheerful figure of around \$950 million which would come from somewhere, somehow, sometime.

Last week's column told about the postwar needs of the state government, and the problem of whether these needs were to be financed out of revenue "savings" (treasury surplus) or financed by long-term bonds with a 200 per cent additional cost because of the interest on bonds.

We concede the annual surplus is going to be grabbed by someone—either the state or for its own postwar needs of by the ever-constant parade of deserving human needs sponsored by well-wishing pressure groups.

For example, the state board of aeronautics is asking the legislature for \$5,000,000 in state aid for local airport improvements—another postwar project of acknowledged merit.

The state planning commission has two estimates of the cost of the state's postwar projects—\$60 and \$80 millions—depending upon prices. To date the state legislature has segregated \$12 million from current wartime savings as a part payment on the above \$60-to-\$80 program, leaving a balance of \$48-to-\$68 million yet to go. If the minimum sum (\$48) were to be added to the local governments' projects, the overall total goes up to around \$100 million.

But as Al Johnson, state tax "You ain't heard nothing yet!"

In the 1945 session of the state legislature a total of \$116 million of deserving operating needs has been EXCLUDED from the state's 1945-46 operating budget, now set at \$135 million. Here they are:

If a Michigan taxpayer were to travel to Washington and carefully survey the postwar planning being done there, he would be impressed further.

National planning, financed mostly out of federal funds, calls for a great variety of worthy enterprises.

The list is lengthy, the cost would run into many billions.

And when the Michigan taxpayer recalls the March 15 figures of his 1944 federal income tax and then dares to think about the national debt, which has soared from \$40 to nearly \$233 billion (Feb. 28) since June 30, 1939, the combined accumulative effect is one of mental intoxication. Our national debt June 30, 1932—about 15 years ago—was a modest \$19.4 billion!

When you get into postwar planning, hold on to your hat! There HAS to be a Santa Claus!

Post War Plans for County Gov't

If Wayne County officials and departments are to function efficiently and economically, they must have more room and that means a new modern office building, says Archie Leadbetter, the Republican nominee for County Auditor. Offices are now so jammed for want of work space that efficiency and service to the public is impossible. He points out that the present County building is well adapted for court purposes. This new office building to take care of the departments now scattered over the downtown area should be sited now to be constructed in the post war period. Apparently, what a Wayne County needs is a Chief Executive, a Business Manager, selected by the Supervisors, to see that the departments co-ordinate and conduct public affairs to benefit taxpayers and at the same time render the service to which they are entitled.

Archie Leadbetter has been a resident of Detroit for forty years except while overseas during World War I. His business experience in our commercial and industrial life gives to Leadbetter the training now so badly needed in the government of Wayne County.—Adv.
