Telephone and telegraph facilities were available for first calls home. After their 30 days home, almost all members of the group will be leaving for overseas again—this time to the Pacific.

Lieutenant Sloan was inducted into the Army in January, 1943, and went overseas to a base in Italy in October, 1944. He has been awarded the following decorations: Air Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters, and two Bronze Battle Stars for his European Theatre Ribbon. He lived with his mother, Mrs. Nora Sloan, at No. 1144 at 114 Walnut street.

In a letter to his wife, First Lieut. Clyde Myers of the Army Air Corps said that he was in France awaiting passage to the States. He expects to be home the latter part of July or the first part of August. Lt. Myers was previously reported missing during the war in the Philippines.
