### Judge to Speak at Lenten Service

Muskegon Judge Will Be Speaker at "School of World Friendship" Service.

The Presbyterian Church during Lent will continue the "School of World Friendship" on Sunday evenings. This week the subject is "Youth in Crisis."

Judge Stephen H. Clink of Muskegon is the speaker. Judge Clink is chairman of the governor's juvenile code committee and of the government's committee on maladjusted children. He is also a member of the legislative advisory committee of the Federal Children's Bureau and of the juvenile delinquency committee of Social Work. He is chairman for the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers, and president of the West Michigan Children's Center.

The public is invited to these meetings, and this week the Parent-Teacher's organization is especially invited. Supper at 6:00 o'clock. Film and discussion at 6:45. The talk will be followed by a discussion period.

### Candidates Answer Questionnaire Covering Five Village Projects

With Village elections just around the corner, the Board of Directors of the Northville Woman's Club has questioned the candidates as to their standing regarding issues with which the club has been concerned this last year. Their aim is to see that the voters have all the facts at their fingertips before they set pencil to ballot.

A questionnaire was sent to each of the candidates asking for a statement of position on the five points which the Woman's Club has been stressing in its panel discussions and in the resolutions recently sent to the Village Commission and the Wayne County Road Commission.

The following five questions were asked:

- 1) Do you favor Village Zoning?
- 2) Are you in favor of continuing the Community Building project?
- 3) Will you support an equalized tax re-assessment program?
- 4) Will you use your influence to further the Seven Mile Road Bypass to re-route commercial traffic?
- 5) Do you favor continuation of an adequate Recreation Program?

Here are the answers of the candidates.

For Village President:

G. A. Nichols

Replied, Yes, to four questions. Commented as follows on No. 5: "You have an adequate recreation facility for youth."

Yes in all four cases. In all four cases, he is in favor of the Village.

Forrest Doren

Replied YES to all five questions.

For Commissioner (three vacancies):

George Locke

Yes to all five questions.

Carl Scholtz

Yes to all five questions.

Jack Steubenvoll

Yes to all five questions. On village zoning, he commented "Yes, in principle." To the tax re-assessment program, he replied "Yes in all four cases. In all four cases, he is in favor of the Village."

Luther Lapham

An effort was made to reach Mr. Lapham in Florida, by telephone asking him to call back in order to get his views as yet not fully received.

For Assessor:

Frank L. Thompson

Commented as follows: "I am not in favor, at this time, of a tax re-assessment program due to the fact that property values at this time are above any normal price level. However, I would be in favor of cooperating with the Village Commission on equalizing property values in the Village of Northville for purposes of fair taxation."

It should be understood that the Board of Directors of the Northville Woman's Club presents this information purely in an attempt to ascertain how each candidate stands on these important issues, with a view to any way trying to influence the voter, who must make his own choice from the facts presented.

### Eagle Solicitor Held Under Bond

Secured Memberships in Northville, and is Charged with Embezzlement of Funds

Chas. Sawyer of Detroit was arrested March 4 by Macomb County sheriff on a charge of embezzlement. He was arraigned and the date for his examination was set for March 12. Sawyer was released on \$2000 bail.

The accused visited Northville about two weeks ago and solicited paid memberships in a proposed new local organization of the Eagles. He succeeded in signing up a number of men in this community.

### W. S. C. S. Invites Presbyterian Ladies

The W.S.C.S. and the Wesleyan Guild of the Methodist Church have invited the ladies of the Presbyterian Union and Nellie Verkes Auxiliary and the Methodist Service League to be their guests on Thursday evening, March 14.

The speaker of this important gathering will be Miss Mildred Ann Paine. Miss Paine was a missionary in Tokyo at the time of Pearl Harbor and was interned for a year before she was returned to this country.

The meeting will take place in the church house at 8 o'clock and refreshments will be served at the conclusion of the program.

### Offer Free X-Ray Chest Examinations

Residents of the Northville area who wish to prove themselves free from tuberculosis—as a protection to themselves and their families—will have opportunity to take advantage of a free chest X-ray service on May 6-7.

During that period the state department of health, 3500 X-ray unit will be assigned to Northville for mass surveys. Encouraged to participate are industrial employees, Negro and Mexican groups, high school students, and housewives.

Cooperating in the survey are the Wayne County Health Department, the TB and Health Society, public health and school nurses, private medical practitioners, school administrators, and public health officials.

The limited amount of time and place of the Northville survey will be forthcoming soon.

Dr. David Littlejohn, supervising the project, emphasizes that the family physician will be notified of all positive findings. He explained that tuberculosis can be cured if it is found in the early, symptomless stage and before it has become infectious to others.

### Plan Joint Easter Service of Baptist Churches

The First Baptist Church of Northville, in cooperation with the Gaylord Baptist Chapel of Redford, the Clarenceville Methodist Church, the Farmington Baptist Church, and the Elmhurst Baptist Church, will conduct special Easter Week services at the Farmington Baptist Church.

Dr. William Cushman, Pastor of the Highland Park Baptist Church, will bring a series of expository messages based on the prophecies of the Book of Revelation.

These services are planned in connection with the Evangelical Teacher Training Class being conducted on Monday evening in the Northville Baptist Church, with these churches participating.

### Atomic Bomb Is Subject at P.T.A.

Members of the Northville Parent-Teacher Ass'n. were guests of the local University of Michigan club at a meeting held in the grade school gym on Thursday evening of last week.

Guests and members were greeted by James Congo, president of the host club. Leslie G. Lee of the school faculty presented four music students, Barbara Stewart, Elaine Voglin, Mary Louise Lee and Florence McCluskie, who played two clarinet quartets.

Mr. Congo then introduced Dr. Harold Dorn of the department of American Government and Constitutional Law at the University.

In his talk concerning the problems of a permanent atomic bomb, England's empire difficulties, Russia's idea of security and a need for a clear statement of her intentions, also the necessity for clarity and consistency in our own foreign policies.

Dr. Dorn appeared before the Northville audience in place of the scheduled speaker, Prof. Dwight L. Diamond of the University, who was unable to appear.

### Receives Order of the British Empire for Gallantry

Mrs. Win. Duguid of Grace Ave. has received good news by letter from her brother in London, Col. W. Neilson Stewart, O.B.E., M.A., F.R.S.E., R.A.S.C. The letter stated that the Colonel has been awarded the Order of the British Empire for Gallantry, Meritorious and Distinguished service.

This is the highest honor the British Empire can award to an officer of his rank. He will be invested at Buckingham Palace by Royal Command sometime this summer or fall. Since the war in Europe ended, Col. Stewart has been stationed in Austria in charge of civil and military affairs, and was responsible for the new Austrian civil government. This work having been completed, he was called to London to receive the O.B.E. and a new appointment which reads:—

"You have been selected for appointment as S.O.I. (Staff officer first class) Economics, Military Government, Greater Britain, C. C. (Control Commission) for Germany." Col. Stewart was hoping he would be able to visit his sister and brothers in America this spring but the War Office in London is granting vacations for travel so the trip to America is again postponed.

There are many projects for the improvement of the living conditions in our Village. If it is the will of the community that these be carried out, then I shall do all in my power to further the best interests of the people.

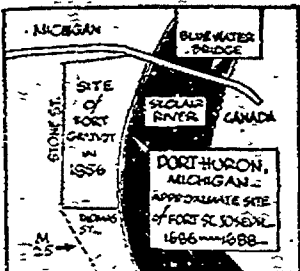

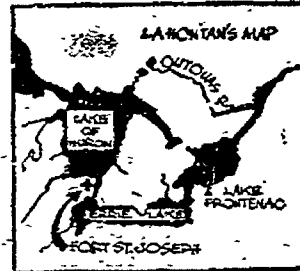
## "MICHIGAN AND THE OLD NORTHWEST" ... Port Huron: The Fort



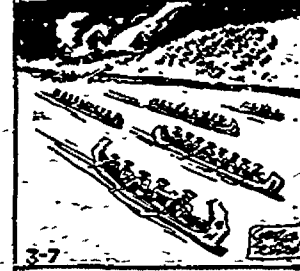
Fort St. Joseph at Niles was preceded by an earlier Fort St. Joseph, Port Huron.

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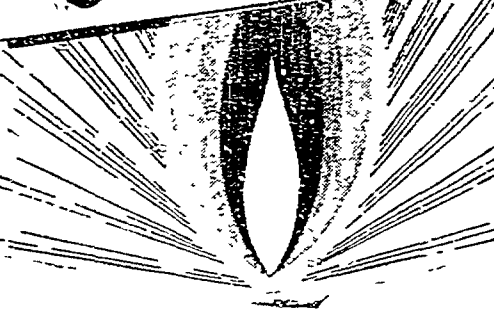

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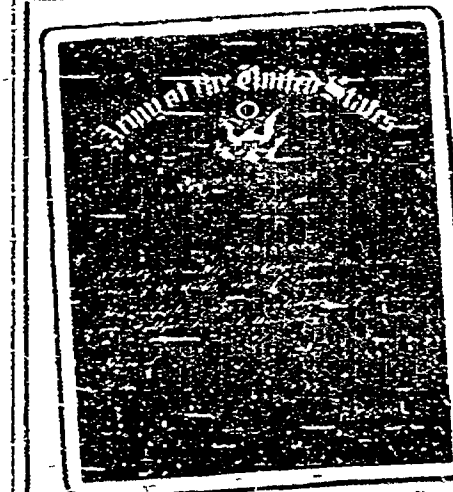

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Questions and  
Answers on Zoning

The Northville Woman's Club in the interests of Civic improvement in Northville has, in several issues of the Record, sponsored questions, and answers on the subject of zoning, which is to be voted on Monday, March 11th.

One of the old stumbling blocks of the question was whether existing houses and structures must be revamped to conform to the new zoning ordinance. This ordinance never intended; nor did it call for the change-over or revamping of any existing structures or home because they did not conform to the ordinance. They definitely are to be permitted to remain as non-conforming units from a zoning standpoint.

One of the conditions of the former zoning ordinance which was undesirable to many residents of Northville, has been corrected in that the only areas in Northville that are not open to two family dwellings are Oakwood subdivision and Orchard Heights. This then eliminates any obstacles to many residents with large homes in the older sections of town, from remodeling their homes into two families, if they so desire, so long as they conform to the health and fire protective sections of the zoning ordinance and the building code.

On March 11th it will be the privilege of every resident of Northville to vote for or against the zoning ordinance. We ask you to consider the matter seriously. If you have any further questions or doubts about the restrictions or protective measures of this ordinance please contact Mrs. Jack Blackburn, Chairman of our Civic Improvement Committee, and she will be glad to obtain the information necessary to clarify these questions for you.

At present Northville is the only village in Wayne County that does not enjoy the benefits and protection of a zoning ordinance. Adv.

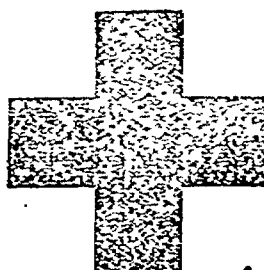

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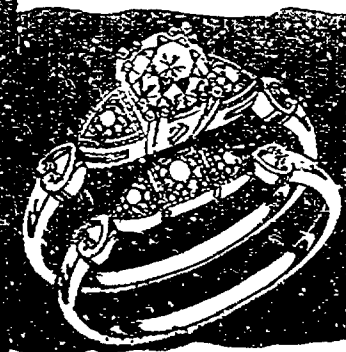

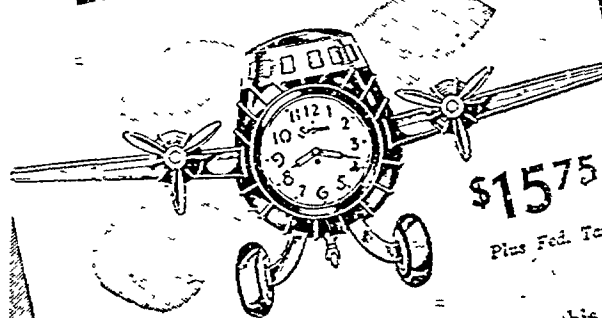
