New Pipe Organ Is Dedicated By Methodists

Ceremony of Acceptance and Dedication Held Sunday Morning; Gift of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Walker, Jr.

Impressive and beautiful in its simplicity, was the special service of dedication which took place in the Northville Methodist church Sunday morning.

The Marr-Colton pipe organ, a gift to the church from Mr. and Mrs. Wm. B. Walker, Jr., was formally presented by Mr. Walker and received on behalf of the church by Wm. H. Canfield. Then followed several organ selections, played by the church organist, Mrs. Barton Connors, illustrating the field of service for the organ, including the marriage rites, consolation to the bereaved, joy in God's world and music of thanksgiving. The vested adult choir, led by Leslie G. Lee, and the children's choir, directed by Miss Pearl Hensch, sang "Thanks Be to God" and "In The Temple," with organ accompaniment. Rev. W. Leslie Williams and his father, Rev. R. C. G. Williams of South Lyon, read the words of the service which included each number.

A short organ recital was then played by Mrs. Barton Connors, church organist, which consisted of six varied selections. Audience and leaders alike participated in the reading of the litany of dedication in the final consecration service. Prayer, benediction and organ postlude completed the program.

The channel of the church was beautifully decorated for the occasion with flowers contributed by organizations, members and friends of the church. A special staff of ushers were on hand to care for the crowd which filled the church proper, the parlors and the balcony room. Others were forced to leave because of lack of seating accommodations.

A great deal of work has been done in the past few months in the interior of the church in preparation for this event. The choir loft has been enlarged, new entrances made at either side of the loft and new lighting installed in the loft. These are the first major changes to be made in the local church sanctuary in the past sixty years.

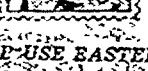

British War Bride Arrives

Mrs. Lloyd Spencer Sailed on Vulcania with 870 Other Brides Mar. 12; Arrive Here Tuesday

Northville's first English war bride arrived in town Tuesday morning, by train. She is the wife of Lloyd Spencer of Sunset Avenue, formerly a lieutenant in the army, who was at the depot to greet her.

Mrs. Spencer was one of a contingent of 870 British wives who sailed from England on the Vulcania, March 12, docking at New York on the twentieth. She reports a fine crossing with only two days of bad weather.

The new arrival was greatly impressed with this country and likes Northville very much.

The daughter of Mrs. Walter Woodman of Tiverton, Devonshire and the late Mr. Woodman Dorothy was born in England and had always lived in that country. During the war she entered service and was on duty for two years as a radar operator in an Ack-Ack Battery on Air Defense with a unit to which Lloyd was attached when he was sent to England. Their marriage occurred July 22, 1944.

In the U. S. army for four years, Lloyd spent twenty-seven months in England, France, Germany and Belgium and received the rank of lieutenant. He returned to his home in this village in January, having been placed on the army inactive service list.

For the present the young Spencers are residing with their parents, the Garry Spencers. Lloyd is employed by the Widmar Building Contractors at Plymouth.

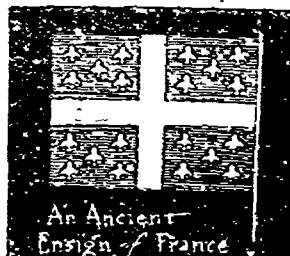

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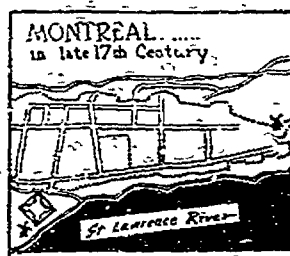

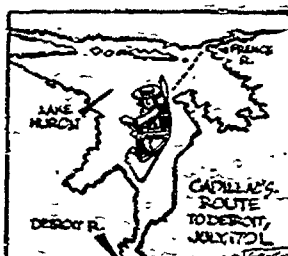
In France Cadillac gained support of Pontchartrain, minister of marine.
