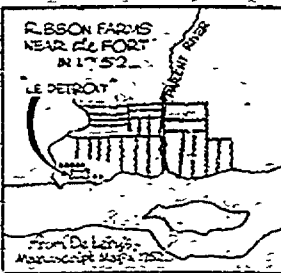

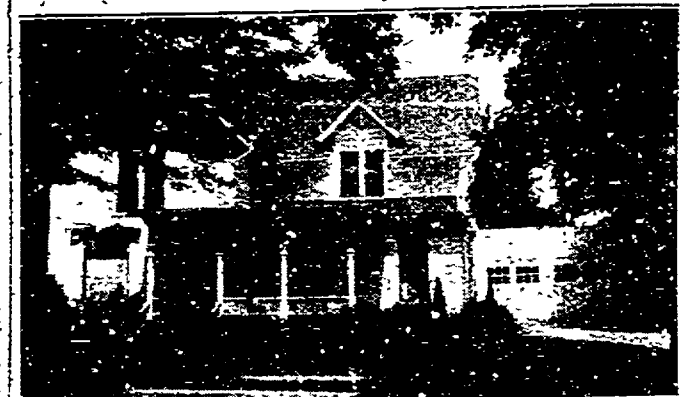

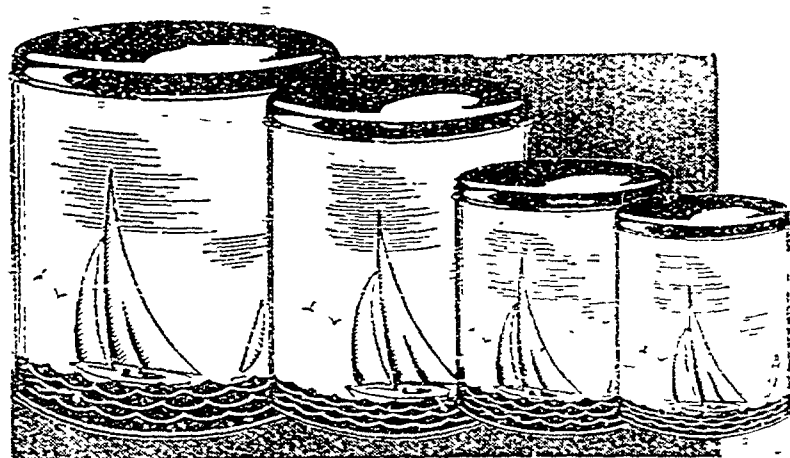

where the tests are to be conducted. There is no cost for the test. Motorists with cars that have several thousand miles on them should avail themselves of the opportunity for such a test. It might mean the difference between killing a child or being able to stop safely, and keep death off Northville's streets. Results of the tests will be invaluable because of the equipment to be used. It is state equipment which rules out any errors and gives a true picture of the condition of any car's brakes.

Chief Denton is emphasizing the fact that many local autos are of the vintage which makes the condition of their brakes questionable. The war has forced

many cars to operate beyond the limit for which they were originally built.

In general the safety record on Northville streets is an enviable one, but Chief Denton intends to maintain it, and the brake test campaign is one of the factors by which he hopes to do just that. Northville motorists should compliment Chief Denton on his foresight in planning such a test in the village. Motorists who have their cars tested will know whether or not they are driving a "safe" car. That in itself should be a great comfort to local drivers.

Cars that are found to have defective brakes will be ordered repaired. Thus will Northville become a safer place for children and the general motoring public. A ticket on your windshield indicating your brakes to be work-

ing properly will become a badge of honor to Northville motorists.

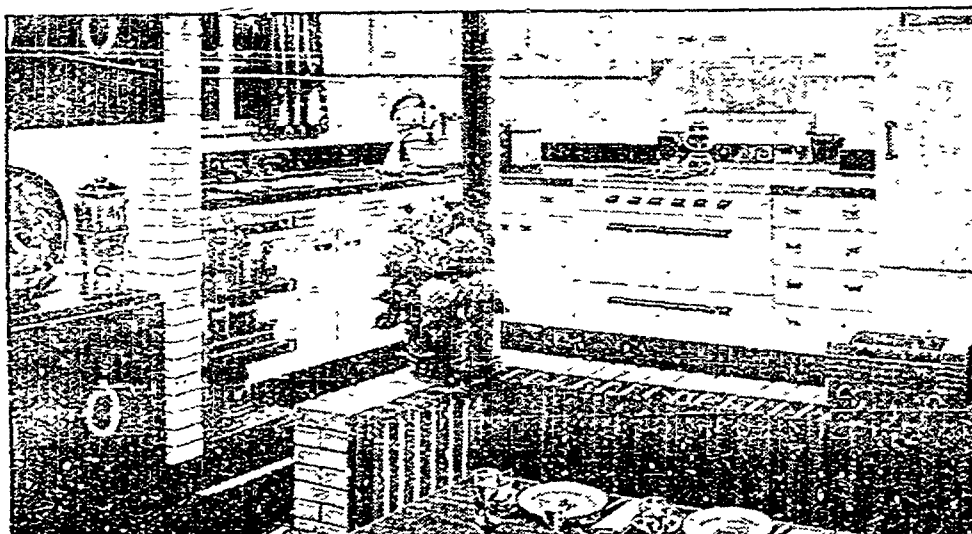
