Hitting by Northville Boys Upsets Visitors in Tuesday's Game at Cass-Benton Park

Walled Lake High School (S.W. O.C. champs) took a severe drubbing from the Northville High school baseball team at Cass-Benton Park Tuesday afternoon. The score read N.H.S. 10-W.L. 2. This helps to erase the memory of Northville's recent defeat of Walled Lake when they lost to that team in a previous game by a score of 7 to 2.

A game played during short showers and at one time delayed by the severity of the rain making delivery of the ball by the pitchers hazardous, held the spectators who braved the storm.

Coaty, the Walled Lake ace moundman of 4 years standing kept Northville bats scattered until the sixth inning when their whole defense collapsed. Northville did to Coaty what no other team has been able to do for a long time.

Cole, the grant-armed, Northville moundman, had Walled Lake completely at his mercy following the first inning. His control was perfect. The team backed him with nine runs in the sixth inning. The climax came when Robinson drove a home run hit in the woods. Twelve men faced the opponents in this inning. With two men on bases and two out Cole drove out a nice double tying and winning the game before the deluge.

A high deep fly hit by Burt of Walled Lake had the appraisers looking for a home run but the fleet feet of Hanson, the Northville center fielder handled it flawlessly.

The third inning almost proved fatal when, with one out and the bases loaded, the Walled Lake third baseman managed a forced play at home.

School Election Next Monday

Voting on Millage and Board Member Will Be at Village Hall from 8 A.M. to 8 P.M.

The voters of the Northville School district will ballot at the regular election to be held June 10th upon the question of extra millage for school purposes. One member will be elected to the school board at the same time.

The millage question as it is worded reads as follows:—

Small the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against property in School District No. 2, Fractional Township of Northville and Novi, County of Wayne and State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1932, be increased for a period of five years, from 1946 to 1950, both inclusive, to 2.3% of the assessed valuation of all property in the district, as provided in Section 21, Article X of the Constitution of Michigan?

To vote at the school election every qualified elector of American citizenship, 21 years of age, residence of 6 months in Michigan, and 20 days in the district may vote (previous taxpayers, qualifications having been removed by recent legislation).

The purpose of above worded in legal language etc. provides for a net increase in school tax of 9 mills for 5 years. The Board of Education has increased the district's 3 mills to increase present school tax, 2 mills for needed improved instruction when replacing teachers; 1 mill for janitor, service, 2 mills instruction supplies and building improvement. This adds up to 8 mills, but as 2 mills previously raised for debt service has been canceled the net increase needed is 6 mills.

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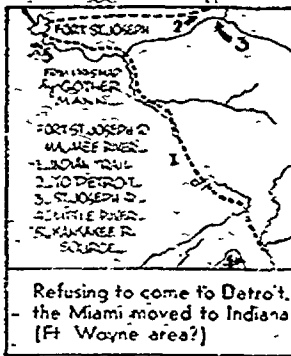

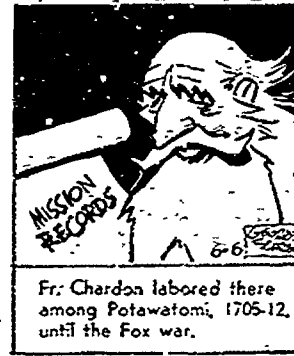
In 1702 the priests at St. Joseph mission reported Miami-English trade.

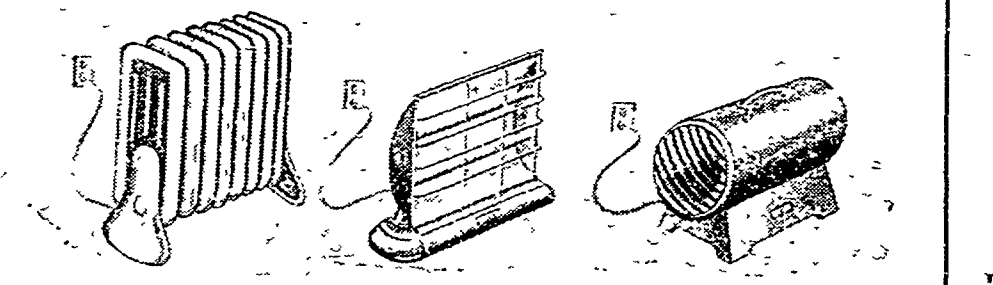

Practical Gardening

Plant Need of Proper Food

By W. J. DRYDEN, WNU Farm Editor.

Nearly every section of the United States has soil peculiarities which require the addition of plant food nutrients. Soil fertility has become an exact science and maximum results cannot be secured by the gardener without a knowledge of the plant food needs of his particular soil.

lar soil. Many seed dealers or county agricultural agents are equipped to analyze the soil. From these tests they can determine the exact type of fertilizer that will prove the most beneficial.

It is possible, however, to purchase a general purpose mixed fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potash, which is recommended for use on most garden crops.

No. 1 in France? I have the grave number and all information. Could it be done through the Red Cross and what would be the expense?—R. W. S., Scottsboro, Ala.

A. The army says there is no way at the present time due to lack of proper communications and other reasons. However, the quartermaster corps is providing a small American flag for every grave in the military cemetery for Memorial Day.

Q. My son spent 22 months in the navy and was discharged with a B.C. and me and my family are depending upon him. Is he eligible to draw this \$20 a week unemployment compensation?—Reader, Arab, Ala.

A. A B.C. discharge is a bad contract discharge and is considered other than honorable, but not dishonorable. His eligibility would depend upon a ruling of the Veterans' administration, which may or may not grant privileges of the G.I. Bill.

The determining factor might be whether his B.C. occurred through a general or a summary court martial. Apply for a ruling at your nearest Veterans' administration office.

Q. I have a son who was drafted in the army June 22, 1945, and he is 19 and has two points when the war ended. His points go up or will he have to wait until the medal get discharged with 2 points, or will

In the meantime, as of April 15, the point score was reduced from 30 to 22 for male enlisted personnel except yeoman, storekeepers and pharmacists. Points for these three remained at 24. Points were reduced from 27 to 19 with the new groups except 1st and 2nd class, a score of 22.

Reserve officers will be placed on inactive duty so that their terminal leave will have been completed by June 30. Since V-J Day, the board has released more than 117,000 men and 5,400 SPARS. It is possible that drastic need for trained personnel to man ships and to operate separation centers may keep some reserves on duty beyond the date established.

Se have to serve 18 months of two years?—Mrs. M. H., Chicago, Ill.

A. The army says the trend now is length of service for discharge instead of points. The latest regulations were issued by General Eisenhower when he announced that men with 15 points or 30 months service would be released by June 30. It may be the policy of the army to reduce the length of service after June 30 to 18 months or 21 months or some other figure.

Q. My son is in the navy reserves and has been in since February, 1945. He was overseas six months, a seaman 1st class. Will he get 1 point for leave to come home soon and what do they get leaves or furloughs for?—Mrs. T. L. W., Story, Pa.

A. The usual tour of duty in the navy is 24 months. Furloughs are granted at the pleasure of the commanding officer and are not earned.

Q. I have just been discharged from the navy. When I left the separation center at San Pedro, the chief in charge told me to leave my seabag and they would mail it home for me. I have been out 27 days and no seabag. To whom do I write to find out about it?—C. B. P., Fayette, Ala.

A. Write to the commanding officer of the separation center where you obtained your discharge.

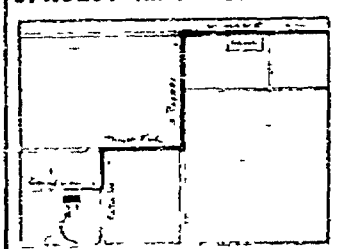
Q. Does the point system affect marines, service four years, voluntary enlistment?—A. D., Des Moines, Iowa.

A. No.

A. Yes, since our country is still at war, it is proper to put stars in the service flag and while there is no regulation, it is likely to be proper to leave stars representing discharges in the flag, as having saved their country.

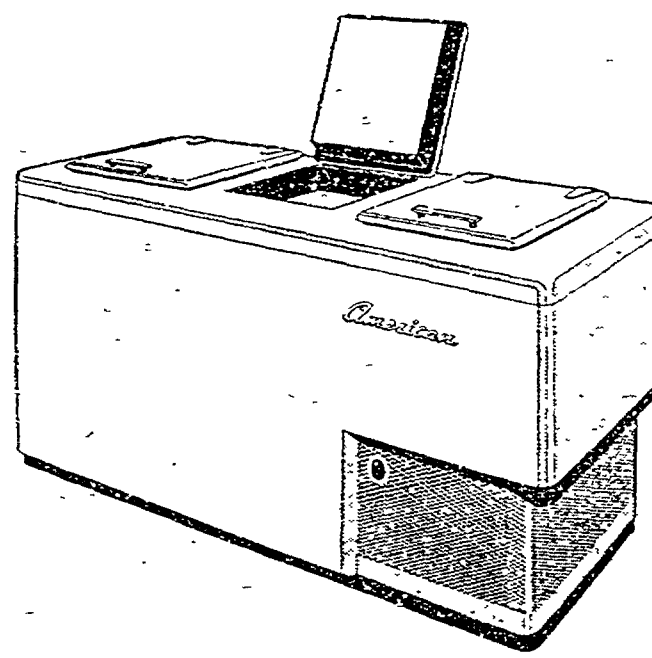

ORDINANCE NO. 124
AN ORDINANCE TO LICENSE AND REGULATE TAXICABS IN THE VILLAGE OF NORTHVILLE, MICHIGAN.
The People of the Village of Northville, Ordain:
Section 1. Definitions: The following terms shall be deemed to mean:
Person - shall mean, and include any person, firm, partnership, association, or corporation.
Taxicab - a taxicab is a motor vehicle driven by mechanical power carrying passengers for a fee or charge other than bus line.
Police Department - any reference to Police Department shall be construed to mean the Chief of Police or any of his patrolmen.
Section 2. Licenses for Vehicles: No person shall operate for hire upon the streets of the Village of Northville any taxicab without first obtaining a license therefor from the Village Clerk.
Section 3. Liability Insurance: It shall be unlawful to operate a taxicab or permit the same to be operated, nor shall any license be issued hereunder, until and unless the applicant for license, deposit with the Village Clerk a prepaid policy of liability insurance for each taxicab for which a license is sought, or a blanket policy covering all his cabs, said policy to be acceptable and approved by the Village Attorney and issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of Michigan, indemnifying the applicant in the sum of at least Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars for injury to one person or Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars for injury to more than one person, and Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for property damage in any one accident, through the operation of the taxicab of the applicant. The policy of insurance so deposited shall contain a clause, obligating the company issuing the same to give the Village Clerk written notice to the Village Clerk before cancellation thereof. Whereupon after Ten (10) days such licensee shall cease to operate or cause to be operated within the Village of Northville such taxicab and the license therefor shall be automatically revoked and the liability insurance policy shall cease and terminate, provided that the liability of the insurance company thereon for any act or omission of the licensee occurring prior to the effective date of cancellation shall not be thereby discharged or impaired.

Section 4. Application - How Made: Application for license under this ordinance shall be made under oath and in writing upon blanks to be furnished by the Village Clerk, and shall state applicant's full name, whether married or single, age and residence; the make, ownership, engine number and license number of the automobile to be used in said business, its seating capacity, the length of time the vehicle has been in use and the license power thereof; that the applicant is a citizen of the United States, and whether a voting resident of the Village of Northville. Each applicant shall be required to state at least five persons of the Village of Northville who have been personally acquainted with applicant for at least one year; that applicant is a person of good moral character and is not addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors. The Police Department shall make such inquiry as it shall deem necessary in regard to the applicant and within a reasonable length of time shall endorse upon the application its approval or rejection. In the event of such application being rejected, the Police Department shall note thereon its reasons. Thereupon said application shall be passed upon by the Village Council. No such license shall be issued to any person less than twenty-one years of age, or who has within the preceding twelve months been convicted of any violation or ordinance of the Village of Northville or laws of this State involving intoxication or moral turpitude, or three times convicted of a violation of any traffic ordinance of the Village of Northville.

Section 5. Issuance of License: Upon the approval of any application by the Village Council the Village Clerk shall issue a license to such applicant for operation of a taxicab under the provisions herein upon such applicant paying license fee and filing an insurance policy as herein provided. All of said licenses shall expire upon the 31st day of December after the date of issuance thereof.

Section 6. Fees: Before the Village Clerk shall issue a license, each applicant shall pay the sum of Fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars, provided, however, the license fees provided for in this section shall be prorated on a monthly basis from January 1st to December 31st.

Section 7. Inspection of Vehicles: No taxicab shall be licensed under this ordinance until it has been thoroughly and carefully inspected and examined and found to be in thoroughly safe condition for the transportation of passengers, clean, fit, of good appearance and well painted. The Police Department is hereby authorized and empowered to establish reasonable rules and regulations for the inspection of such vehicles and their appearance, construction and condition of fitness.

Section 8. Application for Licenses of Drivers: Every person driving a taxicab must be licensed as such. Each applicant for a driver's license must be (a) of

whether he has ever been convicted of a crime within the age of twenty-one (21) years or over; (b) a citizen of the United States; (c) of sound physique and mind; (d) able to read, write and speak the English language; (e) clean in dress and person and not addicted to the use of drugs or intoxicating liquors; (f) and must give three references as to good moral character. Each such applicant shall fill out, upon a form to be provided by the Police Department, a statement giving his full name, address, whether a citizen of the United States, name and address of a felony, whether he has been previously licensed as a driver or chauffeur, and, if so, when and where and whether his license has ever been revoked and for what cause; age, height, weight, color, color of eyes and hair, and finger prints, which statement shall be signed by the applicant and filed by the Police Department, as a permanent record. Each applicant for a driver's license under the provisions of this ordinance, (Continued on page 9)
