Voting on Millage and Board Member Will Be at Village Hall from 8 A.M. to 8 P.M.

The voters of the Northville School district will ballot at the regular election to be held June 10th upon the question of extra millage for school purposes.

The millage question as it is worded reads as follows:— Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against property in Township of Northville and Novi, County of Wayne and State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1932, be increased for a period of five years, from 1946 to 1950, both inclusive, to 2.3% of the assessed valuation of all property in the district, as provided in Section 21, Article X of the Constitution of Michigan?

Tighter enforcement of Michigan liquor control regulations is resulting in a new campaign by wets to get the state out of the liquor business. Robert D. Wardell, former Detroit state representative who led a drive against the 18th amendment, is spearheading the 1946 movement. Wardell proposes a super-state commission of 17 members,

each getting \$7,500 salary and \$2,500 expenses. Liquor dealers would buy direct from the distillers instead of from the state of Michigan which now takes a 30 to 35% "cut" of profits. The retailers' profit would be boosted about 100 per cent, and the consumer would pay more for each bottle—estimated now at 67 cents.

A far-reaching of the enforcement campaign of the state liquor control commission. Licensees cannot transfer their liquor license to another person for a period of one year after they have been obtained.

New applicants must take a written examination—first of its kind in the nation.

A minimum 30-day investigation period now prevails for transfer requests.

The assessment to defray cost of investigation into license

transfer is raised from \$10 to \$35.

More strikes in Michigan are in the offing as a result of the 18 1/2 cents per hour pay boost given to automotive, steel, electrical, railroad and coal mining workers. John P. Boyce, chairman of the regional wage stabilization board at Detroit, recently completed a survey of post-war wage increases in Michigan.

A study of 1680 applications involving 200,000 workers revealed that only 15 per cent asked for 18 1/2 cent increases. Why only 15 per cent? Employers had already upped wages and a less amount was required to equal the rise in cost of living. That is where the trouble will begin.

Coal prices are expected to rise from 35 to 60 cents a ton. Wage increases must be paid by the consumer. The Republic theory of wage increases being based out of industrial profits is an economic fallacy. Ask the O.P.A.



Practical Gardening

Plant Need of Proper Food By W. J. DRYDEN, WNU-Farm Editor.
Nearly every section of the United States has soil peculiarities which require the addition of plant food nutrients. Soil fertility has become an exact science and maximum results cannot be secured by the gardener without a knowledge of the plant food needs of his particular soil.



Apply plant food in rows near seed trench or plant row.
Large seed dealers or county agricultural agents are equipped to analyze the soil. From these tests they can determine the exact type of fertilizer that will give the most beneficial results.

It must be remembered that the essential elements, carried in the plant food must reach the plant roots in order to be effective. Some of the elements will not travel far, others stuck to the soil particles. It is because of this condition that the fertilizer should be placed in a convenient location for the roots.

The gardener should first stake out his rows in which seeds or plants are to be inserted. Then about two inches on each side of each row make a trench about four inches deep. Into the trench the fertilizer should be added at the rate of one pound of plant per 50-foot row. It is then covered with soil. Additional plant food should be added at five or six week intervals in order to keep the plants growing well.

As the plant approaches maturity, an additional application should be given to insure continued rapid growth of highest quality vegetables or flowers. A slow-growing plant will be a tough one. This is largely remedied by the speeding up of growth by the proper application of plant food.

A. A B.C. discharge is a bad contract discharge and is considered other than honorable, but not dishonorable. His eligibility would depend upon a ruling of the Veterans' administration, which may or may not grant privileges of the G.I. Bill. The determining factor might be whether his B.C. record through a general or a summary court martial. Apply for a ruling at your nearest Veterans' administration office.

Q. I have a son who was drafted in the army June 22, 1945, and he is 19 and had two points when the war ended. His points go up or will he have to wait until the next get discharged with 2 points, or will







ORDINANCE NO. 124 AN ORDINANCE TO LICENSE AND REGULATE TAXICABS IN THE VILLAGE OF NORTHVILLE, MICHIGAN.

Section 3. License Insurance. It shall be unlawful to operate a taxicab or permit the same to be operated, nor shall any license be issued hereunder, until and unless the applicant for license, deposit with the Village Clerk a prepaid policy of liability insurance for each taxicab for which a license is sought.

Section 4. Application - How Made. Application for license under this ordinance shall be made under oath and in writing upon blanks to be furnished by the Village Clerk.

Section 5. Issuance of License: Upon the approval of any application by the Village Council the Village Clerk shall issue a license to such applicant for operation of a taxicab under the provisions herein upon such applicant paying license fee and filing an insurance policy as herein provided.

shall be examined by a person designated by the Police Department as to his knowledge of the provisions of this ordinance, the traffic regulations and his ability to drive an automobile. All applications for licenses under the provisions of this ordinance shall be investigated by the Police Department and, if approved, the approval shall be stamped thereon and the application shall be forwarded to the Village Clerk. Provided, however, that any temporary license may be issued by the Police Department pending such investigation, but not to exceed twenty (20) days. Every driver's license which shall be issued, shall be upon the condition that while acting as a public driver, the licensee shall comply with the laws of the State of Michigan, the charter and ordinances of the Village of Northville, that he will not charge any person a greater or lesser rate of fare than that allowed by law and that he will return any property left by any person in the taxicab operated by him.

Each applicant for a driver's license shall file with his application two recent photographs of himself of a size which may be easily attached to the license card—one of which shall be attached to the license card when issued and the other shall be filed with the application, with the Police Department. The photographs shall be so attached to the license card that it cannot be removed without detection.

Upon application for a driver's license said applicant shall furnish a certificate from an accredited physician that he or she is not suffering from any contagious or infectious disease.

Section 8. Issuance of Driver's License. Upon satisfactory fulfillment of the foregoing requirements and upon payment to the Village Clerk the fee of \$1.00, there shall be issued by the Village Clerk to the applicant a license to be placed in a conspicuous place in the taxicab upon which shall be placed a photograph of the applicant, a copy of the operator's license and such license shall always be carried in the vehicle that said driver is operating. Such driver's license shall expire at the end of the calendar year.

Section 10. Fined and Driven. No license or permit thereof shall be issued to any driver of a taxicab until such license has been checked or suspended to operate in a cab in the Village of Northville.

Section 11. Record of License. The Police Department shall keep a complete and public record of the issuance of a license. The record shall contain the name of the licensee, the date of issuance, when the license shall be kept on file with the original application for such license. If a number of any cooperative association that the licensee shall give the name of the association and shall notify the Police Department of any change in his residential address within thirty (30) days after such change.

Section 12. Driver's Consent. Every driver of a taxicab shall have the right to decline employment and may refuse employment until so prepaid, but to drive a taxicab shall otherwise release or neglect to convey any order, person or persons upon request of any driver in the Village of Northville unless previously engaged or unable to do so. It shall be the duty of every person driving or operating a taxicab to be courteous and gentlemanly, to refrain from swearing, loud talking or boisterous conduct, to drive his motor vehicle carefully and in full compliance with all traffic laws and ordinances and regulations or orders of the Police Department or any police officer and to deal honestly with the public. No driver of a taxicab shall carry any other person than the person first employing such taxicab without the consent of such passenger.

Section 13. Lost Articles. All lost articles found in taxicabs by the owners or drivers of said taxicabs shall be turned over to the Police Department within twenty-four hours of the finding thereof, unless the lost property in the meantime be claimed by the owner thereof. Receipt shall be given therefor and if not claimed within thirty days such property shall be returned to the owner of such taxicab.

Section 14. Receiving and Discharging Passengers. It shall be unlawful to stop any taxicab upon a street for the purpose of taking on or discharging passengers if the side of such taxicab is more than two feet distant from the curb on the right side thereof.

Section 15. Public Taxicab Stands. The Village Commission shall have power by resolution to locate and designate public taxicab stands and the number of public taxicabs that shall be permitted to stand at any one time. All taxicabs waiting at taxicab stands must be parked in single file.

Section 16. Rates of Fare. The Village Commission shall by resolution establish the rates of fare to be charged by taxicabs engaged in the transportation of passengers, and no greater rate of fare shall at any time be charged by the operators thereof than that fixed by the Commission. A printed schedule of rates shall be conspicuously posted on the front door of each taxicab, together with the company name.

Section 17. Advertising on Taxicabs. Subject to the rules and regulations of the Police Department it shall not be lawful for

Throughout the years, this organization has held to the belief that its own best interests are inseparably interwoven with the best interests of the milk consuming public.

From its inception, this organization has always adhered to a policy of promising only what it could deliver, and of delivering what it promised.

So well have these basic principles served the vast majority of producers and consumers that we pledge continuance of them in the conviction that they will prove as satisfactory in the future as they have for 30 years.
