

#### Band Concert Again Next Week


Darkness Causes Curtailment of Program; Will Start Earlier Next Week

Michigan's Lake Huron shore region, from Bay City north to Cheboygan, is bustling with activity this summer.

City dealers are buying lake shore lots—all with a fine sandy beach and a clear view of the famous Blue Waters of Lake Huron.

Rustic cottages and cabins are going up—that is, as fast as supply and labor are found. A full-fledged "boom" is under way.

This East Michigan section, just about the last in the Lower Peninsula to be developed by summer tourists, is served by a truly scenic shore highway—U.S. No. 23, the Taft Memorial highway whose southern terminus is

Atlanta, Georgia. From Bay City through Pinconning and Standish, the road swings inland beyond sight of the lake. The highway begins to skirt the shore at Au Gres and continues in almost continuous view of the lake (with a few exceptions) until the traveler reaches Cheboygan, the northern terminus of the Taft Memorial highway.

While camel hump-like dunes obscure a view of the Michigan west coast as travelers go north and south over U.S. 31, the Michigan east shore along Lake Huron has no such characteristic.

Land is fairly level. It slopes gradually to the water's edge.

As you drive north from Au Gres, you can see the Blue Water of Lake Huron most of the time. From our personal observation, U.S. 23 offers one of the most delightful motor tours in Michigan.

A happy decision when it located the route so close to Lake Huron. Not only does this concrete ribbon with slow curves serve the needs of lake shore residents, both summer and winter, but it provides an interesting, scenic route for travelers who are going into Northern Michigan or the Upper Peninsula.

Harrisville has a fine state park on Lake Huron. Lacking an entrance from U.S. 23, many travelers go by the 12-acre park, unaware of its existence. A good business spot is nearby, ready to serve summer visitors.

**BACK TO SCHOOL**

"Their Privilege - Our Duty"

This is a message to those whose high school and college years are behind them. It is a message to the parents of boys and girls of high school age. It is a message to every citizen who loves the United States of America and who wants to see that under the next generation this nation shall continue on its path of greatness.

Lets head north from Bay City to a week-end spin.

Proceeding to the Indiana name range Opemuncion, meaning the "place of the potato," offers an opportunity to get some choice cheese. Pinconning has several cheese stores along U.S. 23. They market the daily industry of the region.

Standish, your next stop, is a trading center for a large farm area which specializes chiefly in sugar beets and dairymen. Saginaw Bay, seven miles away, provides lots of fine duck shooting each fall.

It is at Au Gres, French-named settlement marked by Point Au Gres that U.S. 23 returns to Lake Huron shores. Fourteen miles north is Alabaster where the U.S. Gypsum Corporation operates a large gypsum quarry. It is said that the quarry land was once purchased for \$50 a gun and a dog. When gypsum was discovered, its value was pumped over-  
head to \$10,000.

The twin towns of Tawas—Tawas and East Tawas—offer a variety of food and lodging accommodations. We stopped at the Berens Hotel—chiefly to see the 1000 to Kenneth Barnes. It is the first time on a motor sport bus tour sponsored in February by the East Michigan Tourist Association. Barnes has lost to the group of a dinner at the Berens Hotel. It was too late to go to the restaurant and credit for any Michigan town.

The state park at Fort Tawas is bisected by the one lake pier in a community town where the Lake Huron Pier, directed by Bill Bennett of Searsville, are the only pier company in the U.S. The pier, which is 1,000 feet long, plus the two boat features, is a magnet for tourists. The canoeing spots were well talked. By the way, Tawas is derived from the Indian word for "water."

Going north, we next visit Au Gres and Au Gres, where the Au Gres Hotel, a fine establishment, is located. On a half-hour drive, we reach the Au Gres river—75 miles west of town—is the famous Lombard's Memorial, modeled by Robert A. H. of New York and

Alpena has a strong tourist boom under way. Cabins are being built on Lake Huron. Thunder Bay River and several inland lakes—Grand Long and Hubbard. The Besser Manufacturing Company, which was started in a ship yard here by Jesse H. Herring, has been producing concrete machinery at a much increased capacity and payroll.

From Presque Isle Point, to Rogers City, the lake shore lands are owned by the Michigan Limestone and Chemical Company, subsidiary of the U.S. Steel. (Cape) Lake transportation and an abundance of industry has made Rogers City the home of 500 employees of this company.

By courtesy of the company, we visited its five-mile long quarry. We saw a \$300,000 electric shovel scoop up limestone and fill a railway car in only a



application form. It is inevitable that some will be lost; Veterans should send them by registered mail.

If the veteran does not know how much unused furlough time he should be paid for, he may leave this space blank and the finance officer will compute it for him.

Sums under \$50 will be paid in cash. Larger sums will be paid in \$25 bonds or multiples thereof, with odd balances in cash. A veteran having \$196 due him would receive five \$25 bonds and \$11 in cash. Bonds will be dated 30 days after date of discharge.

If the veteran has been out of service, the sooner he can cash in his bonds...

Furlough time accumulates at the rate of 2 1/2 days per month for all former enlisted personnel starting from 8 September 1939.

Number of days of furlough actually taken (not to exceed 120 days) should be deducted and the balance multiplied by the daily pay rate (base pay plus incentive pay). To this should be added 70 per cent for subsistence and, in the case of the top three enlisted grades (Mr. Sgt. Tech. Sgt. and Staff Sgt. in army and CPO, PO 1st class and PO 2d class in navy)

and additional \$1.25 per day should be added for allowance in lieu of quarters.

Veterans are urged to consult with local veterans' counselors who will be possessed with full and complete information, currently and will assist veterans in filing claims for terminal leave pay.

INFORMATION REGARDING TERMINAL LEAVE PAY The Armed Forces Leave Act of 1945 has been passed by the Congress and signed by the President.

It now appears definite that all application blanks will be distributed through local post offices and will be mailed to the Finance Office at the stations where discharge was effected (separation papers for the most part). Payment in cash and/or bonds will be sent to the veteran from the Finance Office.

When a final discharge certificate will undoubtedly be ready and promptly for distribution.
