Local Church To Seek \$18,000

Restoration Fund Embraces
War Casualties and Re-
storing Foundation of Old
Church

The First Presbyterian Church of Northville, which is taking part in the National Restoration Fund, is to make a two-fold appeal to the community in seeking to restore Presbyterian work in the nation and on the Mission field, and also to face the need of a new foundation under the old church building on East Main street.

For over one hundred years the present church has rested on hand-hewn timbers and stone supports. It is now deemed necessary to replace these with reinforced steel girders. To allow for a more adequate youth program six additional Sunday School classrooms will be provided, a choir room and sanitary facilities which will be accessible from the church proper. An outside entrance to the new classrooms and interior stairways will unify the entire building. Both the elders and trustees have voted unanimously to undertake this project with the support of the church at large. The month of October is to be set aside for the making of this united appeal.

The Restoration Fund embraces the work formerly carried on by the Camp and Church activities through which the church has ministered to men in the armed forces in the country.

She resides at 304 Lake Street and was employed at the Bomber plant at Willow Run before she entered the service.






