

SET YOUR SIGHTS

It takes planning to achieve a goal



Some young men know what they want and plan for it. Others are still looking for their niche. The new Regular Army can help both.

Honorably discharged after a three-year enlistment, you are eligible for 48 months of education at any college, trade, or business school for which you can qualify. The Government will pay your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$396 per ordinary school year, plus \$63 a month living allowance—\$90 a month if you have dependents.

HIGHLIGHTS OF REGULAR ARMY ENLISTMENT

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 year (1-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service).
2. Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may enlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
3. A reenlistment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service a recruit has served in the Army, plus \$100 for each year of service provided a recruit enlists within 12 months after last honorable discharge.
4. A furlough for men who reenlist within 20 days. Full details of other furlough privileges, etc., are obtained from Recruiting Offices.
5. Mustering-out pay based upon length of service (to all men who are discharged in relation to reenlistment).
6. Option to receive an 80% pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
7. Choice of branch of service and overseas transfer (if desired) upon 3-year enlistment.

Seek To Form Breeder's Ass'n.

Artificial breeding for dairy cows will soon be available in this area. Many farm herds are already signed up to the local association which will serve this area.

The main objective of the program is to grade up cattle on farms to make for more efficient production. Bulls being used in the association are the Holstein, guernsey and Jersey breeds and are either proven sires or sons of proven sires. Records on these animals indicate that for herds producing less than 400 pounds of butter per year, use of these good bulls or sires would increase the production of the daughter is compared to their dams.





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

- Loss of liquid in a jar does not affect the keeping quality, provided the seal is perfect.
