




**Extends Racing 12 More Days**


Northville Woman's Club to Present Dr. Zimmerman, Former Jap Prisoner, at Annual Reception

It adopted more than a decade ago the base-and-excess plan which authorities on milk marketing have called the best year-in, year-out program ever devised for the advantage and protection of both milk consumer and milk producer.

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



## Scout Leaders To Hold Annual District Meeting



**State Amendment Ballot**  
This ballot lists three proposals to amend the constitution of the State of Michigan.

**PROPOSAL NO. 1** While not generally understood and debated proposals to allow sales tax received from the sale of aviation gasoline, etc. to be used for airport construction purposes. At present the gas tax goes to roads only.

**PROPOSAL NO. 2** Would return one-third of the sales tax to cities, townships and villages, and the schools of the state. Schools to get one-half of the tax returned and the other one-half of the one percent to cities, villages and townships.

**PROPOSAL NO. 3** This is the soldier bonus amendment. This would authorize the state to borrow 500 million dollars for interest payments to survivors or soldiers of the World War. Full payment to be on the basis of \$10.00 a month for service in the U.S.A. and \$15.00 a month outside of the U.S.A. But not to exceed \$500.00 to any one person.

**Wayne County Referendum Ballot**  
To ask permission to increase the tax limitation of the county for 5 years for the city of Detroit. Wayne County, Mich. This is for an increase of 10 cents per \$100.00 of assessed value.

**Wayne County Bond Issue**  
The Board of Commissioners of the county to authorize a five million dollar bond issue to be repaid in 5 years for a Detroit-Wayne County Airport.

**Northville Village Charter Ballot**  
The Village Commission is asking for the adoption of the first, second and third choice village ballot and the institution of the regular ballot used in other townships, county and state elections. The commission also asks for the lengthening of the time from filing date to election day. The present time is 10 days. The requests are for 21 days.


