

Hale Briscoe, state treasurer, becomes the veteran in the political ring, with the exception of Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, state superintendent of public instruction, whose office has always been associated with party politics.

Because of the new leadership at Lansing and the almost unprecedented financial crisis just ahead, the 1947 general session of the state legislature promises to be one of the most interesting in years.

The big question is this: How is the State of Michigan going to avert the prospective \$70,000,000 deficit?

John A. Perkins, acting budget director, has been holding hearings at Lansing. It's the old, old story of the high cost of living and a resultant need for more funds. Hospitals and institutions which treat mental patients report a need during the next fiscal year of \$22,950,085 as compared with \$15,726,334 actually spent in the past fiscal year.

Last week we quoted state officials as estimating the prospective tax deficit at \$55,000,000 to \$68,000,000. Perkins' guess: \$70,000,000. The new budget director is secretary of the University of Michigan's Institute of

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

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

Charles Nacker passed away Sunday morning at the home of Mrs. Jennie Scheatnocker, 310 Dullap street, where he had been residing at the age of eighty-five.
