Suggests Local Fire Inspection

Wednesday noon Detective Davis of the State Fire Marshal's Dept. was the guest speaker at the Exchange Club luncheon. Mr. Davis was introduced by Cy Pierce, principal of the Northville High School.

Mr. Davis told of the duties and services of his department as they were available for communities of the state. He especially stressed the need of a village fire prevention and inspection ordinance, as being just as essential as a fire department itself. He listed the heavy fire loss of the last year as over three million dollars more than 1945. He told of 108 lives lost, of which 50% were children, many of whom were at home alone while parents were frequenting beer taverns and places of amusement. The hazards of cleaning fluids, smoking in bed, and overloading wires are the chief cause of disaster.

Mr. Davis lamented the fact that Michigan had no law compelling its department to inspect school buildings in Michigan.

MSC Caravan At Pontiac Jan. 29

People live that they may farm — not farm that they may live. If they live poor, they are poor — no matter how much they may harvest.

That's the brief story behind the Michigan State college 1947 Rural Progress Caravan which features "The Farm and Home." It will show in Oakland county at the armory in Pontiac on Jan. 29th.

Exhibits from 22 departments in the school of agriculture and home economics at MSC will be open to the public from 10 a. m. to 3:30 p. m.

Different from the first Caravan which toured Michigan a year ago, the 1947 caravan will serve more as a clinic for farmers and homemakers. From 15 to 20 specialists in agriculture and home economics expect to be with the caravan on each of its one-day stops throughout counties in lower Michigan.

Last year it was the novelty of new labor-saving machinery that caught the eye of the farmer visitor. This year the farmstead is being stressed — not just from the homemaker's standpoint, but from the farmers' angle as well.

Many farmers have put away some wartime income for certain remodeling or new construction on the farmstead. Michigan State college extension specialists know that building material is still scarce and the labor is still high and hard to find. But they recommend that those who plan to build or remodel do some paper planning before they begin with the hammer and saw.

Arrangement of kitchens, use of the frozen food locker, a children's corner, clothing storage, lighting, water systems, remodeling of the barn and other farm buildings and landscaping will all get attention. And the "back forty" will not be left out. Specialists will be on hand to discuss their exhibits on farm crops, poultry, dairy management, animal production, vegetable gardening and to answer most any problem the farmer may have to offer.

The Northville Fire Department was one of six summoned to Farmington Tuesday night to combat a raging fire that destroyed two buildings in the business section and damaged a third. The area razed was in the block just west of Farmington Road on Grand River. The post office and apparel and beauty shop were destroyed, and water and smoke damaged the hardware on the corner. The second floors of both buildings were occupied. All residents escaped but lost most of their furniture and belongings. The loss has not been determined.

Vets, Feb. 1 Is Final Date for G. I. Insurance

Veterans are reminded that February 1, 1947 is the deadline for reinstatement of G. I. Insurance (National Service Life Insurance) without physical examination.

If a veteran has allowed his term insurance to lapse, he may reinstate it without a physical examination merely by submitting a signed statement that he is in as good health as at the time of lapsing of his policy, regardless of how long the insurance has lapsed. This privilege will only be in effect until February 1, 1947. He will be required to pay two monthly premiums in reinstating his term insurance.

However, if application is made for reinstatement after February 1, 1947 but within six months after the date of lapse of the policy, he may reinstate by paying two premiums, and by submitting a statement that his health is as good as it was on the due date of the first premium in default.

If reinstatement is desired and the veterans has failed to comply with either of the above he may be asked to have a physical examination. As yet no date has been set when no reinstatement will be allowed.

Veterans having insurance or other problems are urged to use the facilities offered at the Veterans' Counseling Center in the Village Hall, Northville.

Seek Fire Truck for Local Area

The joint committee of the Village of Northville and the Township of Northville which has been working on the purchase of a new fire engine is very favorably impressed with the equipment bid upon by the John Bean Mfg. Co., of Lansing, Michigan. The truck would cost \$5169.25 plus the cost of the chassis, \$1623.89. Delivery could be had on or about April 1st.

The new truck would have a GMC fog high pressure fire fighter equipment, mounting a 420 gallon tank, two reels of hose, and three ladders. The pump will rate 850 high pressure delivering 600-650 pounds pressure at the fog nozzles. The chassis will be a 2-ton Ford of 152 wheelbase, with dual rear wheels. This outfit is the latest thing in fire fighting equipment with high pressure fog nozzles. Local firemen would take delivery after two days instruction at the factory at Lansing.

The purchase would be made under contractual arrangements in which the Village and the Township each pay one half of the cost of the truck. Manning and operation costs have been worked out to the satisfaction of both parties to the purchase agreement.

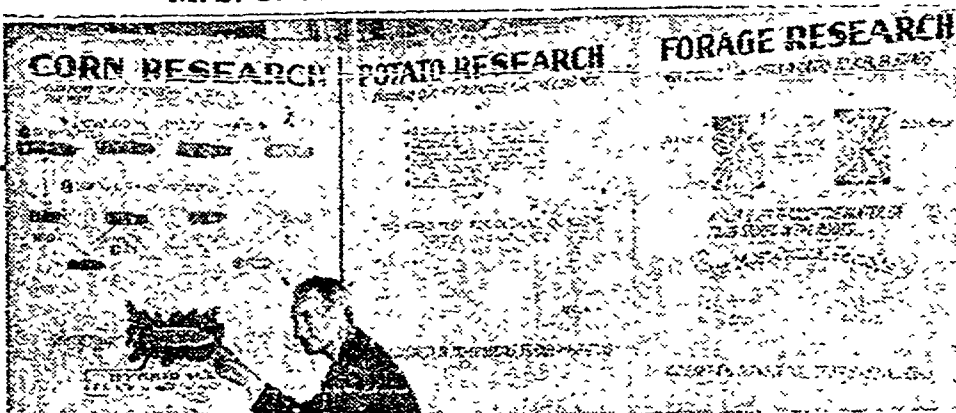
