





The various waters operated by the County have places that are cleared for skating. The water is just as deep or deeper than the skaters are skating over as the local pond is.

The tragedy of this fall prior to safe skating should not penalize the children from having a good time close to home and with a minimum of danger as is now present.

I do not think I am alone in my opinion of this subject: A lot of time has been lost for the enjoyment of our children this season and it can now be corrected - at least without waiting for completion of other projects, which are entirely worthy, but still do not provide this healthful sport at this time.






