Petition for Question on Ballot

A petition is being passed about the township asking for the submission to the voters of the township of the question "shall the sale of alcoholic liquors by the glass in addition to beer and wines be allowed in the township of Northville?" If the sufficient 500 names are secured on the petition the question will be voted upon in the April election. At the present time sale of liquor by the glass has not been allowed in the township outside of the Village since a resolution was passed in 1926. The present petition is instigated by a Northville resident seeking to build a restaurant on Seven Mile Road and has appealed to the township board for permission to sell liquors in the proposed structure to be built.

Bank Meeting Set for March 4th

Tuesday, March 4th a special meeting of the stockholders of the Depositors State Bank has been called to officially act upon the refinancing of the capital structure of the bank. (The date is March 4th, not March 3rd as stated last week). The purpose of the meeting will be to vote on the following proposals:

1. To increase the common capital stock of the Bank from \$90,000.00 to \$170,000.00 by the issuance and sale of \$80,000.00 par value of new common stock.
 2. To amend Article Four of the Articles of Incorporation of the Bank so as to reflect the new capital structure.
 3. To fix the value and price at which the \$80,000.00 new common stock shall be subscribed and paid for by the shareholders and purchasers of new stock.
- According to the statement of John A. Royer, president of the bank. In August, 1934 the bank was required to increase its capital by the issuance of \$150,000.00 preferred "A", and \$20,000.00 preferred "B" stock. The preferred "A" being held by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, and the "B" was sold and held by local stockholders, which stock drew interest at 3% and 4% respectively, even when common stockholders received no dividends. Since 1934, the bank has retired \$110,000.00 of "A" stock out of earnings, and now has approval of a plan to retire the \$40,000.00 preferred "A", and the \$20,000.00 preferred "B" by the issuance of \$80,000.00 common stock, the proceeds of which will be used to retire all preferred stock. This means that all stockholders will share alike in the earnings of the bank without any preferences to any class of stockholders, which is a distinct advantage to all owners of common stock.

For a number of years both services have been held on Easter Sunday and the program is now extended to facilitate the growing community. Ushers at the early service will be Robert Taggart, Horace W. Ford employees have been to practically every part of the inhabited world during their years of service with the armed forces of Uncle Sam, but it remained for Robert Gates, a Phoenix Regulator plant employee to get to uninhabited points as a member of the Admiral Byrd Expedition. Gates, 19, who went to work in September, 1944, as a stock handler at the Phoenix plant, took a leave of absence two months later to enlist in the Navy. After training, he was assigned to the carrier U.S.S. Phoenix Sea, and when this ship became part of the polar expedition task force, Robert was on hand to participate in the venture that could well change the course of history. Farm Topics Hike Potato Sales By New Packaging Paper Bags Provide Ideal Retail Units Millions of pounds of potatoes are getting a new ride to market this year. They are riding in new paper bags made of "wet strength" paper which



Wet strength paper bags meet with consumer acceptance. absorbs moisture without breaking. They are going in 10, 15 and 50 pound quantities which retail stores can sell immediately without further sorting, sacking or handling. At one time, not so long ago, all grades, sizes and quantities, including culls, were shipped in burlap bags. Merchants had to sort and package the vegetables. Today an ever-growing number of shippers are pre-packaging potatoes in the new paper bags. This means a little more work, but it pays in providing a better-selected, higher quality and more uniform product. The store gets clean, graded potatoes packaged in retail-size bags which can be sold at once.
