Phone Changes Are Anticipated

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company today announced plans to change all telephone numbers in Northville in the next 4 to 5 years, along with 250,000 in Detroit and nearly all in 18 other nearby exchanges.

President Thomas N. Lacy said the changes will lead to the introduction of two of the most far-reaching improvements in telephone service of modern times. The changes ultimately will bring about the inauguration of:

1. Suburban-dialing service that will permit Northville telephone users to dial Detroit numbers direct and also enable Detroiters to dial Northville numbers. Special equipment will record the charges automatically on such calls.

2. Nationwide toll-dialing service that will permit direct-dialing of numbers in every section of the country by long distance operators. This service will further speed the handling of long distance calls.

The changes will put Northville, Detroit, and other nearby exchanges on a 7-digit numbering-code basis as now operates in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia.

Repeat Junior Play Tonight



In Lumber Business



Monday night on the heels of a down pour of rain, a strong northward wind brought the worst blizzard of the winter to the immediate area. Drifts and heavy snow paralyzed all activity on roads and buses, and at schools.

Tuesday no buses entered or left the Village Schools with an attendance of less than 15% closed at noon. Long distance hauling was standstill. Roads in every direction were reaped high with drifts of heavy snow that stalled cars for hours. The northbound train on the P. M. was the last train in the Village until late Wednesday afternoon. Mail left on the star route Tuesday morning and skipped the following day. Rural mail carriers got a few miles from town and were stalled. Cars were stuck in every part of the area and wrecks became stalled in trying to pull out stalled cars. Local milk deliveries were made with difficulty.

On Wing street a large tree just north of Main street, fell and crushed a car parked nearby. Roger Christensen had a window blown out. Telephone lines were down with some 200 phones out of order and Wednesday only emergency long distance calls were accepted until about eleven o'clock. The local exchange was flooded with calls, and some of the operators were unable to get to work.

Wednesday the community regained some of its semblance of normalcy, and traffic moved again, and he soon began to eat.

It was furnished by the Wayne Out-County Chapter, supplemented by a generous donation by the parent organization, the Michigan Society for Crippled Children and Disabled Adults, Inc.

This station wagon has proven to be an indispensable piece of equipment in serving the needs of the community.

Home tutoring has also been arranged by the Out-County Chapter for these handicapped children. This part of the program carries the education of the child right into the home of the patient during confinement. The tutoring is approved by Eugene Eliot, superintendent of Michigan public instruction and Fred C. Fischer, Wayne County Rural Schools Superintendent.

Besides these cases there may be some other child in the community who is crippled or some disabled adult who is not receiving medical attention. If these cases are reported to the local chapter they will be given the necessary attention and arrangements made for medical care.

The Chapter's headquarters is located at the Wayne County Health Department phone Department 3322. Transportation will be provided if it is not otherwise available by the patient.

Seals are being mailed out this week. "Your dollar will give crippled children their chance to get well, to go to school, to earn a job to earn a living," says President Charles Erskine, the local chapter, and Dr. T. G. Hayes, chairman of the Northville Easter Seal Committee.





(Continued from Front Page) phia, and their suburbs. The entire program, which calls for nearly 365,000 lumber changes in the metropolitan area, will cost more than \$3,000,000.

Lacy, emphasized that, when the changes are made in Northville, they will appear immediately in the telephone directory. Northville numbers have to be changed anyway when the present manual system is replaced by dial operations, so the number changes in Northville will occur at that time.

In addition to Northville and Detroit, other exchanges involved in the impending number changes will be Birmingham, Center Line, Royal Oak, Pontiac, Roseville, Trenton, Wyandotte, Farmington, Plymouth, Wayne, Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor, Mt. Clemens, Middlebury, Livonia, Southfield, Rockwood, and Warren.

When suburban dialing is introduced, a Detroit subscriber will merely dial the proper number to reach a Northville subscriber.

The "NO" of the Northville prefix should conflict with other codes, the Detroit subscriber will dial whatever prefix is selected to designate the exchange.

For nationwide long distance dialing, Lacy explained, the United States will be divided into some 75 numbering-plan areas, including at least two and possibly three for Michigan. Each such area in Michigan will be identified with a 3-digit code. A New York operator desiring to reach a Northville number would dial ten digits - three to reach the Northville-Detroit numbering code area and seven more to reach the Northville subscriber.

"The prospective number changes," Lacy continued, "probably all would have been made perhaps on a more gradual basis, had not the war interfered with our expansion and development plans. If Detroit and nearby exchanges are to be accorded the advantages of these two new developments in the telephone, the necessary number changes must get under way at this time in order that they may result in a general and orderly basis."
