The various Northville churches were filled to capacity for the Good Friday and Easter services. Baptist, Presbyterian and Methodist members joined together on Good Friday at the Baptist church for worship. Large crowds also attended the separate services at the Lutheran and Catholic Churches.

Entire families and a number of visitors were noted at the Easter services, with some churches presenting two meetings to accommodate the crowds. Inspirational sermons and music were offered and church pulpits were made beautiful with plants and flowers dedicated to the memory of loved ones.

Racing Program Set Up for 1947

Favored by attractive summer dates, July 21 through Sept. 13, Northville Downs appears certain to move further ahead in national harness racing prominence with the presentation of the most fully developed program of stake races in its four-year history.

Announcement of Northville's stake program came last week from General Manager Sam Wedrick, who had just received the good news that the flood-lit half-mile plant, had been awarded racing dates which would make it possible to bring to the Downs many of the leading trotters and pacers in action today.

Three \$5,000 races top a list of 16 stakes announced for the eight-week meeting. The 15 events carry a total value of \$210,000 and represent an increase of more than \$20,000 over Northville's biggest previous stake offerings in a single meeting.

The only condition for an entrance to the three \$5,000 stakes is that a horse make one previous appearance here this summer. These races are:

1. The Michigan Pacing Derby, to be raced Friday night, August 22, in two dashes of 9-16 and 1-1/16th miles.
2. The Northville Driving Club Trot, to be raced on Friday night, Sept. 5, at the same distance as the pacing feature.
3. The Governor's Trophy, a free-for-all trot and pace, set for Sept. 12 with one dash at 9-16th mile and the other at 1-9/16th miles.

The Pacing Derby and the \$5,000 Trot were both held last year with Royal Men and Brantley's Guy Shining horses in the former, and proximity owned by Ralph and Gordon Vetter, of Rochester, N. Y. won both dashes in the Trot.

The Governor's Trophy race is the crowning of a brilliant overnight event staged at Northville last fall when four of the oldest trotters and a like number of pacers then in the grounds were brought together for a test. In the long race 1-9/16th miles, the free-lance pacer, Charming Scot, owned by Earl Menziesberger, of Garrett, Ind., set a world's record of 3:18 1/2 for the distance.

In view of the schedule worked out for the three big features by Racing Secretaries John Dailey and William C. Connors, it appears likely that the winners of the Pacing Derby and of the Driving Club Trot will clash in the Governor's Cup event to provide a spectacular climax to Northville's 43 night season which was approved last Monday by Governor Kim Sigler and announced on back page.

Motor Plants Closed in Memory of Henry Ford

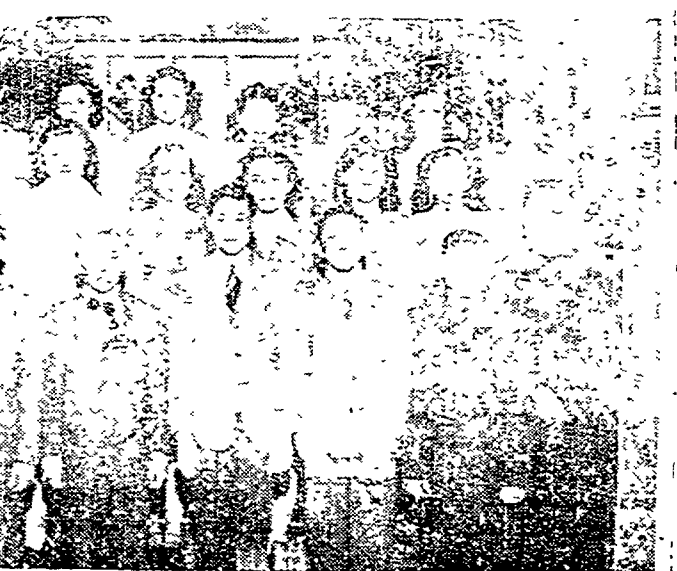
On Thursday all Ford plants in the area, Northville Phoenix and Waterford, joined with all motor-drum and closed in respect to the memory of Henry Ford, Founder of the Ford Motor Company. Mr. Ford died at his Dearborn estate Monday night and funeral services were held Tuesday.

Mr. Ford, the one man who has been given credit for putting the world on wheels, had a peculiar love for Northville and felt that smaller plants such as the local valve plant, allowed a man to work in industry and keep his feet in the soil thus giving stability to industry and security to employees. Many local people recall with a loving devotion and pride the many visits of Mr. Ford to Northville, and his joy in meeting people here and his apparent interest in the erection and operation of the Northville Valve Plant.

With a background of experience Val Clare is able to give his broadcasts and speeches a touch of reality that has been acquired by his actual observations during his many years of travel throughout the United States, Canada and Europe.

Born in England, Val Clare is the father of six children and has nine grandchildren. He is a veteran of World War I - having fought in France and Siberia.

Rouge Reaches Highest Point in 34 Years

Last weekend flood waters of the Rouge River, played havoc with roads and bridges and flooded vast areas of land through the immediate area. Water covered the Northville-Plymouth Road to a depth of almost two feet. Trucks were stalled and rested on their axles when drivers inadvertently drove to the side of roads where water had inundated the pavement and washed away the earthen banks.

Basements were flooded and in some instances first floors of residences were under water. In a few instances live stock had to be evacuated from their barns because of the rising tide of flood waters. Sid. roads were impassable and main highways dangerous and flooded.

The melting snow and the torrents of rain that fell in sheets from early Saturday morning until afternoon brought the waters of the Rouge to the highest point in 34 years. Workmen were busy keeping the water out of the local Ford Plant. The parking lot was a lake and the athletic field flooded up to the west bank. The water reached the high stage by mid-afternoon, Saturday. Damage to roads and property can not be estimated and it will take some time to repair the damage done throughout the area. A few emergency cases were reported to local authorities and cared for in quick order.

News and Comment from Office of Congressman George A. Dondero, Chairman, Committee on Public Works.

Republican Promises and Fulfillment: Despite rumors to the contrary, Congressional Republican leadership has not retreated from its original legislative program. This effort is already showing results. It is expected that Federal expenditures will be cut by four, five or six billion dollars; taxes will be reduced; the outlaying of postal to postal rates; far-reaching statutory provisions in connection with labor-management relations; there will be bureauary derobalization to the last possible man. Peace treaties will be ratified.

An amendment limiting the term of the President has already been passed by both Houses, signed by the President, and ratified by one-ninth of the requisite number of states to date.

The House of Representatives has passed a Tax Bill granting a 30% reduction to the low income groups and a 20% reduction to those in the higher brackets.

Both the House and Senate have passed bills to prevent irreparable damage to our economic structure threatened by the many suits for back pay under the so-called "portal-to-portal" principle. This legislation is now receiving attention in Conference between the two Houses.

Ridding the government of subversive or disloyal employees was one of the most important of the Republican Campaign promises in 1946. The Republican demands in this direction have brought forth an order by the President to remove from the government payrolls all persons whose loyalty to the United States is subject to question.

Substantial savings have been made on Appropriation Bill, already acted upon by the House of Representatives.

This Congress actually has made more rapid progress in the enactment of important legislation than any other Congress in recent years. It is expected that the end of this session is expected, it will be the greatest achievement in our legislative history.

Congressman Dondero President George Simon Dondero was recently honored by being selected to preside over the House of Representatives for two days last week while the \$2 billion Defense Appropriation Bill was under consideration.

Rent Control: According to the National Association of Real Estate Boards, rent control has been set at 12 million rental units from the national supply and discouraged the construction of new housing. These figures were compiled from reports from 475 cities in 45 states. The largest number was withdrawn from the rental market by holding same for sale only. In 1946, as reported it is indicated that a total of about 1,600,000 are taken off the rental market.

Communism: We all applaud Secretary of War Patterson for his efforts to raise the War Department of Communists, pinks and subversives. Congressman George A. Dondero stated in a speech in the House of Representatives, "This is encouraging and welcome news to the American people. However, it is most discouraging to learn that while the Secretary of War is attempting to rid his Department of such subversive elements, he is at the same time advertising in Communist newspapers for recruits for the U. S. Army. What kind of recruits could we expect to receive for the U. S. Army from the element in our country who takes and reads these newspapers? It provides a way in which they can infiltrate our armed forces, destroy its morale, and endanger the security of our nation. It is also subsidizing Communist newspapers with tax dollars of loyal Americans."

WHOOPIING COUGH ON RISE IN STATE

With 212 new cases of whooping cough reported in 14 counties of the state in the past week, the Michigan Department of Health today repeated its warning that all children should be vaccinated to prevent the disease.

A total of 659 new cases have been reported in the past three weeks to bring the total number of cases this year to 2693, in comparison with 1402 cases in the same period last year, and with the seven year median of 1543 cases.

Areas in which new cases were reported are Barry, Bay, Calhoun, Genesee, Hillsdale, Ingham, Kalamazoo, Kent, Muskegon, Oakland, St. Clair and Wayne counties, and the Michigan-Oscoda district.

Whooping cough and its complications are dangerous. The disease can be prevented by a series of four weekly injections of pertussis vaccine when the child is six months of age and a booster shot when the child enters school. However, all children who have not been protected should go to their family physicians for the vaccine.

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How the constantly growing financial needs of local governments can be met in the period of inflation is one of the aggravated, acute problems now confronting the Michigan State Legislature in its fourth month of sessions.

There appears to be two ways whereby additional funds could be raised through taxation.

The first would be new taxes, created by the State Legislature and collected by the State of Michigan. This has been the favorite way to finance new public services by local governments. Since the sales tax was adopted, state expenditures have increased \$168,000,000, of which \$138,000,000 were returned to local units of government and \$30,000,000

retained by the State for direct state services to the people.

As these new needs have developed from time to time, the State Legislature has been in the habit of seeking new or added taxes such as the intangible tax, the 10% liquor tax, the tax on horse racing, and other levies whereby substantial revenues could be derived to finance the new public services by local units of government. For every \$100 of new taxes collected, the State of Michigan retained \$13 and turned over \$82 to local governments for their needs.

A second way whereby local public services by home governments are financed in other states is that of special local taxes.

The local collection of local taxes has a peculiar virtue of bringing the taxpayer close to the agency which is expending his tax dollar. Much of the breakdown in tax responsibility has been due to the fact that an increasing large amount of taxes has been received from sources not within the community, either from Lansing or from Washington, and hence had the illusion of being money from someone else's pocketbook and not our own.

This aspect was crystallized recently by Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York who declared "Without close coordination between the spending of public money and the responsibility for collecting it through taxes, local responsibility for government will degenerate rapidly and we shall have an all powerful, centralized government. That prospect is a grave threat to the decentralized government."

Governor Dewey has had the courage and daring to propose specific new taxes for local units of government whereby these governments might finance their increased cost of public services at the present time.

For example, county governments in New York State would be empowered to levy a real estate tax of not more than 2% on tangible personal property. Owners of motor vehicles would pay a tax of not more than \$1 per

passenger vehicle and not more than \$10 for a commercial vehicle. Trucks used exclusively for farming would be exempted.

The county government would be authorized to levy a tax of 3% on restaurant meals and drinks over \$1. Counties could tax alcoholic beverage licenses at not more than 25% of the amount of the state license fee. Counties could tax admissions to theatres not more than 5%. Vending machines would be licensed by the county at not more than \$10 per machine per year.

It is the conviction of Governor Dewey that the above taxes, if levied on county governments in New York State, would realize a total of more than \$85,000,000 per year to make possible some improvements such as higher salaries for teachers, new or improved school buildings, and other public benefits.

Cities of at least 100,000 population or more would be given new additional tax powers, and New York City would be segregated and given additional taxes could be levied on meals, admissions to amusement, liquor licenses, ownership of motor vehicles, including commercial trucks.

Governor Dewey summed up the problem of new taxes for local governments by pointing out there is no magic to the production of government revenue. The only way from being extracted from the pockets of the taxpayer.

In one of the two above ways, the Michigan State Legislature had worked out some solution to financing new needs of the State of Michigan and of local governments. The problem is great and the solution is not easy.

RESEMBLES BUTTER

The mild flavor of chicken fat more nearly resembles butter than any other fat except margarine, according to May E. Foley, extension nutritionist at Massachusetts State College. This is good news to housewives during these fat short days, particularly now that plenty of "fat hens" are on their way to market. It can be used in many foods, says Miss Foley, and is excellent in white sauce, both quick and yeast breads, add pie crusts. The proportions for pie crust are 3/4 cup chicken fat to 1 cup of flour.

A Few Don'ts

Never place an empty glass utensil over a flame. Use a wire rack or asbestos pad to protect the vessel from direct contact with heat. Do not let glass containers boil dry. Do not set a hot utensil on a wet surface, plunge it into water or let it come in contact with a wet cloth. Do not use for deep fat frying.

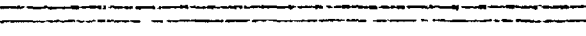

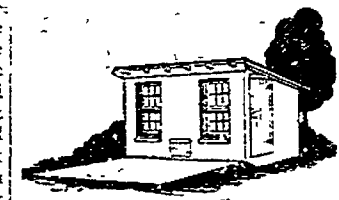
Newcastle Outbreaks Continue to Increase

New outbreaks of Newcastle disease, the serious chicken ailment which had appeared in 21 states, must be detected promptly if further rapid spread is to be checked.

The American Foundation for Animal Health has urged farmers to be constantly on the alert for signs of nerve disorders in their flocks, such as trembling, throwing the head backward, or pulling the head down between the legs. Ruffled feathers, difficult breathing, or a condition that looks like a "cold" may also be danger signs.

Because this is a virus disease, and the symptoms may often be obscure, the veterinarian generally has to resort to laboratory tests to be certain that the disease is present.

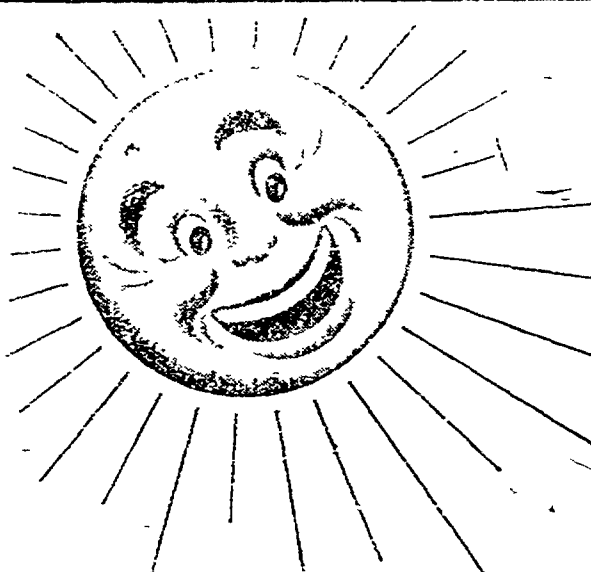
