#### X-Ray Unit Here 3 Days Next Week

The Northville doctors, including Drs. Anderson, Chabot, Atchison, Snow, Sparling and Handorf, are cooperating in the visit to Northville of the Mobile X-Ray Unit. They urge:

"This community will be visited June 11th, 12th and 13th by the TB Chest X-Ray service. An X-Ray will show tuberculosis long before you feel sick. As your family doctors, we suggest that this new service is a practical way of discovering tuberculosis early. Early discoveries are usually followed by effective cures. Make sure your chest is healthy. You need only spend a moment of your time, and the X-Ray is free of charge.

Plan now to have every adult in your family stop in for a chest picture during the visit of the mobile unit in Northville.

The mobile unit will be located on the sidewalk in front of the Detroit Edison Co., building on North Center street, according to Lynn Sullivan who is chairman of the project, sponsored by the Northville Coordinating Council. The next week will see the unit on the grounds of the local Ford Factory for convenience of workers there and in other factories located in the eastern part of town.

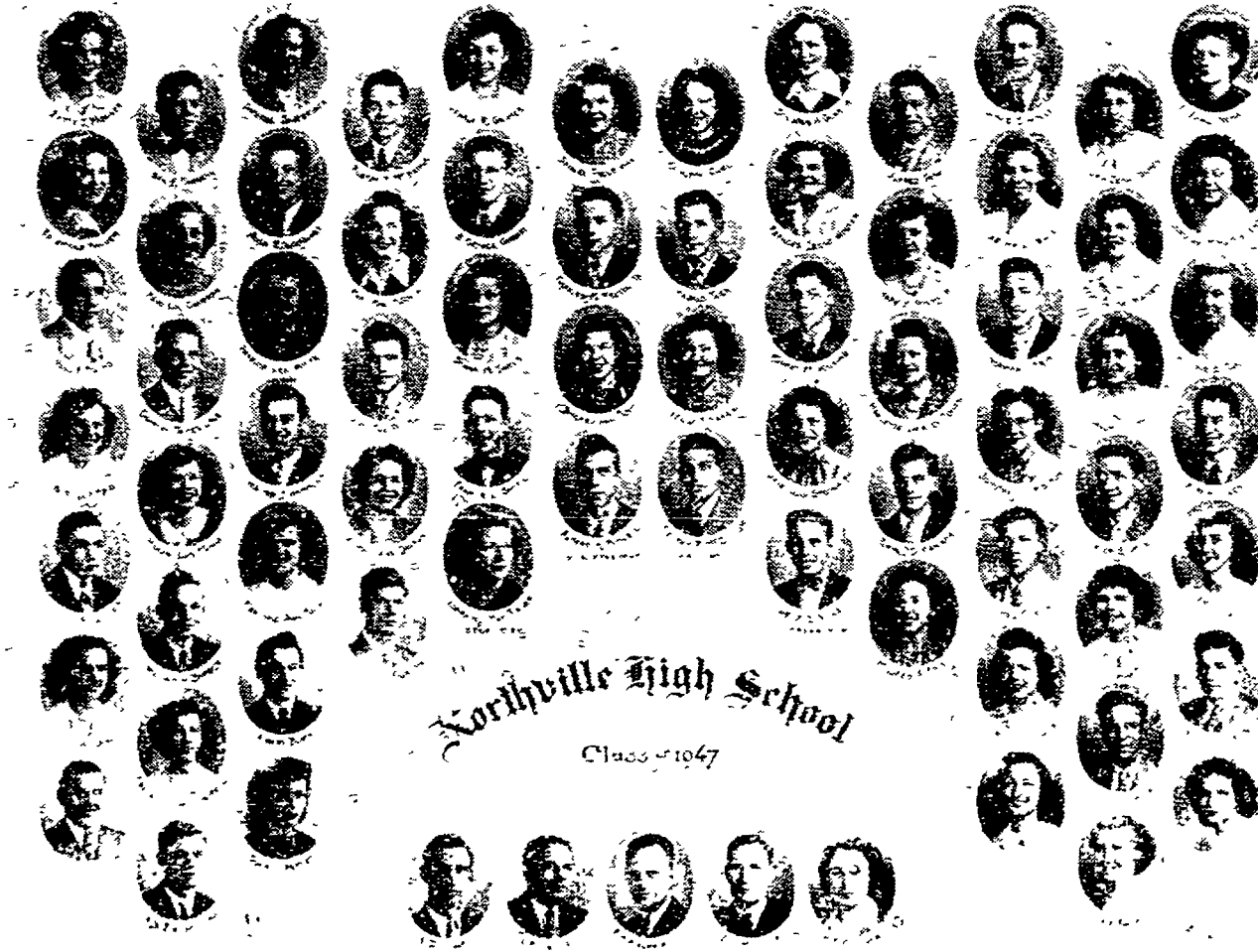
#### Blood Bank Set for June 18th

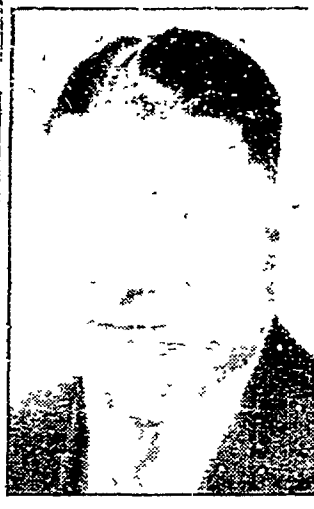

#### Dr. L. Howard Now at Maybury

Dr. W. Leonard Howard arrived in town, June 1st, from Battle Creek to take over his new duties as superintendent of the Maybury Sanatorium. He will be joined here by Mrs. Howard and their two children about July 15th.

The doctor assumes the office formerly filled by Dr. H. S. Willis, who resigned recently to take a similar position in a sanatorium in North Carolina.

Dr. Howard was born near Delta, Ont., in 1901, the same year in which the Atlantic cable was laid. He is of English, Scotch and Welsh descent and comes from a long line of physicians, an uncle, cousin and great grandfather all being medical men. One ancestor came from England to take the first chair of medicine at Johns Hopkins University when that chair was first established. Dr. Howard, attended Queen's University at Kingston, Ont., and in 1923 after a year's internship in tuberculosis work, he went to Muskoka Hospital for Consumptives at Gravenhurst, Ont.

Having chosen tuberculosis as his specialty because two of his college classmates had died of that disease, his career has been entirely with that type of work, with the exception of one year of industrial medicine at Ste. Fe Hospital in Topeka, Kansas. He has practically grown up with the modern treatment of tuberculosis. At Gravenhurst they formerly used the sun cure, principally, and while Dr. Howard was there he observed the first thoracoplasty, the operation being done by Dr. Archibald, who had just returned from Europe and who selected one case at Gravenhurst as suitable for demonstration. In 1926 Dr. Howard went to the State Sanatorium at Howell where they were just beginning the use of X-Rays in

tuberculosis diagnosis. While at Howell the doctor demonstrated the pneumothorax for a group from the State Health Department, that department not being familiar with the procedure at that time.

From Howell Dr. Howard came to Maybury San, where he served on the staff for two years. Here, in 1923, he took postgraduate work under Dr. Max Plummer, in 1925, he went to New York where he spent a year with Dr. G. G. Ornstein. His next connection was with the Herman Kiefer Hospital in Detroit. In 1932 he went to the American Legion Hospital at Battle Creek, where he remained until May, 1942 at which time he became superintendent of the Calhoun County Hospital, the name of which was shortly changed to the A.
