Scholarships Are Announced

Supt. Russell H. Amerman awarded seventy diplomas at last Thursday evening's graduation exercises held in the High school gymnasium.

Scholarship awards were presented to Albert Black, Albert Bidwell, Albert Lees, Hugh Lockhart, and Helen Ann Canfield.

Albert Black was awarded the Northville Women's Club Scholarship by Mrs. Harvey Whipple. Dolores Glaser was named the alternate. Albert was also named the winner of the scholarship given by the Exchange Club. Mrs. Robert Powers on behalf of the local University of Michigan Alumni Club, presented to Albert Sidwell the U. of M. Alumni and Regents scholarship.

Principal C. E. Pierce presented to Albert Lees the Wayne University Board of Education Scholarship and to Helen Ann Canfield and Hugh Lockhart the Danford Foundation Scholarship, awarded on the basis of leadership and scholarship abilities.

Shirley Way, Valedictorian, was awarded a year's subscription to the Reader's Digest by Principal Pierce.

Principal speaker for the evening was Dr. Earl Kelly of the Wayne University College of Education who stressed the inheritance that the graduating class receives from the present generation. Dr. Kelly pointed out that the graduates inherit hatreds and fears by virtue of the situation in which the world finds itself today. We need to supplement that fear with courage, he said, if we are to have peace in our time. Mental discipline originally, creative abilities, he said, need to be exercised by today's youth, if we are to keep pace with technological advancements. There is plenty for all, he said, but a solution needs to be found to distribute what we have if the world is to live comfortably and happily.

After the exercises, the faculty of Northville High school invited the parents of the graduates to a reception in their honor.

Receive Degrees at University

At the 103rd annual commencement of the University of Michigan held June 14th four Northville people received degrees. 2966 candidates were presented for degrees. The commencement address was given by the Honorable Paul Martin, minister of National Health and Welfare of the Dominion of Canada.

Among other forms of recognition, Dr. Kerr was made instructor in pathology for dental students as a member of the medical faculty in 1941. Recreation Now Underway Here

The summer recreation program is gradually getting underway. Supervision has been provided for about 150 children from the Vacation Bible School each morning and for 35 or 40 youngsters in the afternoon. Starting with next Monday, June 23, equipment will be available for persons of all ages until 6:00 at the school playgrounds. On Monday, June 23, the Mothers Pre-School group committee will start a supervised program for youngsters, aged 2 and 4, at the Kindergarten room.

If enough Junior and Senior High School girls are interested, a four team girls' softball league can be started. Any further developments will be published in following issues of the Record.

New Minister Comes to Village

The Northville Methodist Church is to have a new minister, Rev. Wm. Hughes of St. Paul's Methodist church in Highland Park will have charge of the local pastorate preaching his first sermon here Sunday, June 29. Rev. W. Leslie Williams will take over the latter minister's parish according to an announcement made by Bishop Raymond J. Wade at the close of the Methodist Conference in Detroit.

G. Williams, who for several years was pastor of that congregation. Rev. J. M. McLaren was re-appointed to the North Lyon for another year. He serves the church in connection with the First Methodist church in Brighton and is beginning his fourth year at North Lyon.

Village Tax Lower This Year

The Village Commission in session Monday evening approved the assessment roll as presented by Assessor Rackham, which provided for fire inspection in the business district and fees therefore; asked survey of the street signs and tallied about the improvement of Village streets.

As presented, the tax roll totalled \$2,763,760.00, and the rate as set for this year's taxes at \$15.38 per \$1000 as compared with \$17.38 last year. Taxes will become payable July 1st. Chief Mitchell was granted added compensation for fire inspection. The Building Inspector's pay was upped to \$75.00 for six months and \$50.00 for six months of the year.

Another speculation is that the Governor does not expect to run for a second term. He is enjoying the power of office and prestige that goes with it.

CRITICS OF SIGLER feel that the governor, faced with an unsuccessful legislative record, has sought to "cover up" his failures by seeking to make others the scapegoat. The McKay "forces", for example, were charged by the governor with attempting to scuttle the program. Then Keyes was blamed in the Higgins Lake statements.

Our own observation is that there is some truth to both sides of the above situation. We will not go into details. We observe also, that the administration has 18 months left to complete its record. When you check over what the legislature did during its five-month 1947 session, you will agree with Douglas Graham, chief of the Lansing bureau of the United Press: "Sigler came out of his first legislative bout in fair shape. Most of his program was adopted, although he had to wait until almost the last minute for some of it."

AS FOR THE DEFICIT, variously estimated and sure to run into millions, that's a horse of another color. The governor feels that a deficit may help to convince voters that "the surplus" at Lansing is largely fiction and that the sales tax diversion amendment was only another way to force new and higher tax on the taxpayer.

At least, the sales tax issue is still alive. The legislature voted to resubmit the amendment to the voters in November, 1948, along with a move to revise the state constitution.


