Two \$5,000 Stake Events Set for Week-End at Local Downs

The greatest "double header" in the history of harness racing is scheduled for Northville Downs Friday and Saturday nights with a \$5,000 stake event scheduled for each of those evenings as a result of the consistent rains which forced a postponement of last week's Michigan Pacing Derby.

They'll run the \$5,000 Northville Driving Club Trot Friday night in two heats and will follow with the Michigan Pacing Derby as the feature of that race card.

The attendance total may well set a record for two consecutive nights at Northville with the post-maternal handle also approaching record breaking proportions.

The Driving Club trot has a won 12 of the nation best, led by Presently, owned by Ralph and Gordon Verhulst of Victor, N. Y. Presently won this race a year ago and never recently raced away with the American Trotting Derby. \$25,000 championship feature of New York's Roosevelt Racetrack in that race previously covered a mile in 2:02.275, fastest ever recorded by a trotting mare on a half-mile track.

Leaders among the other 11 contenders are Glengate, holder of the world and Northville track records of 1:57.31 for one-half and 1:46.14 for a mile and one-eighth. Mrs. Josephine De's great sprinter, Runaway Girl from Detroit, the powerful Mu, owned by Glen Barker of Chicago, and the Joe Luck entry, familiar to all Northville goers this season, of Peter Day and Gypsy Prince.

The Michigan Pacing Derby has attracted a field of eight headed by Lindy Fraser's fabulous Dr. Stanton, winner of 23 of 22 starts this year including the \$10,000 Chicago Pacing Derby.

In contention will be Perry Williams' Brat's Guy, winner of the event in 1946; Grattan McKivo, who raced a mile in 2:04.45 two weeks ago; Jimmy Creed, holder of one world record for pacers and who established two new Northville track records earlier in the meeting; and Miss Ruby, also a world record holder.

Dr. Hart, Merty England, Hal Fraco and Blue Agam also will be in the Pacing Derby field. Post time each night will be 8:30 p.m.







Social Security Benefit Payments Due Survivors of World War II Veterans

Federal old age and survivors insurance protection is a sizable to families of qualified veterans of World War II for a period of three years following the veteran's discharge from the armed services.

In order for his survivors to be qualified a veteran must:

(1) Have been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable within four years and one day after the official end of World War II.

(2) Have served in the armed forces at some time on or after September 16, 1940 and before the official end of the war.

(3) Have had at least ninety days of active service or have been discharged because of a disability incurred or aggravated while in service.

(4) Have died within three years of date of his discharge.

The minimum monthly benefit under this amendment is to a widow and one child is \$34.14 paid monthly until the child is eighteen years of age. The maximum benefit to a widow with three children or to four children alone of a veteran with five years service could be \$65.10 a month.

Benefits like other old age and survivors insurance benefits are payable only when claims for them have been filed, and are payable retroactively only for three months prior to the date of filing.

Social Security benefits are not payable in case where compensation or pension are paid by the Veterans Administration.

Survivors should contact the nearest Social Security Administration field office.
