## Publish Recipe In National Magazine

The September issue of Better Homes and Gardens offers among the "Seven Anniversary Recipes" the recipe of Mrs. Roy Matheson of Northville for Grandma's Chocolate Cake. Mrs. Matheson lives at 322 North Rogers street.

The magazine states: "From the Tasting-Test Kitchen, which has now tallied 25 years of service, at the pan and spoon, a recipe hit parade! All the recipes—recipes you, our readers, have sent us simmered down to seven favorites. The chocolate cake is the all time favorite of 14,000 cake recipes."

Mrs. Matheson's recipe is as follows: Grandma's Chocolate Cake—1 cup shortening, 1 cup white sugar, 1 cup brown sugar, 2 well-beaten eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 3-1 oz. squares unsweetened chocolate, melted, 1 cup hot water, 2 cups cake flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 2/3 cup sweet or sour milk.

Thoroughly cream shortening and sugars; add eggs and vanilla, beat till fluffy. Melt chocolate in hot water over low heat; blend thoroughly and cool slightly. Gradually add to creamed mixture, alternately with milk; after each addition, mix just until smooth. Pour into 3 waxed-paper lined 8 inch round layer cake pans. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 25 minutes. Frost layers with Mocha Chocolate Frosting. Combine 6 tablespoons cocoa and 6 tablespoons hot coffee. Add 6 tablespoons butter and one teaspoon vanilla, beating until smooth. Gradually add 3 cups confectioners' sugar, beating until of spreading consistency. Garnish with chopped California walnuts.

## Veterans Urged To Play Safe

Recent rulings of the Veterans Administration provide that disability payments for malaria will be cut off at the end of a year without a physical examination, unless evidence has been submitted to prove the veteran suffered a relapse or recurrence during the twelve month period.

Veterans are advised to report to a physician every three to four months, securing the doctor's statement indicating the attack was malaria, together with treatment records and evidence of a positive blood smear.

Affidavits from other persons who have seen the attack and also be helpful. All this evidence should be submitted to the Federal Veterans' Administration immediately following each attack.

## Village Employees Given \$20 Bonus

The Village Commission in session Monday evening discussed a planing inspection, ordered a test well, named a Superintendent of Public Works and authorized cost of living bonuses to village employees.

Upon recommendation of President Doren Herman Hartner was appointed Supt. of Public Works to succeed Dan Lafluy, deceased, at \$3100.00 per annum. A test well was ordered driven at the location of the spring on Orchard Drive and Seven Mile. Village employees of the Public Works Dept., the Police Dept., the Caretaker and Clerk were given a cost-of-living bonus of \$20.00 a month effective October 1st. Tax time was extended to Nov. 4th. A letter was read from the Coordinating Council asking for life preservers for use at the pond.

Work has begun on the storm sewers in Beal town. The installation of a fire hydrant near the barns at the Fairgrounds was also discussed at this meeting.

The Village Treasurer's report showed balances as follows: General Fund, \$82,356.20. Water Fund, \$11,900.61. Sinking Fund, \$11,530.64. Building Fund, \$511.06. Investments, \$51,000.00.

## Yvonne Van Hellemont Tells of Foreign Travelling

Yvonne Van Hellemont returned to Northville last week after spending nearly a year visiting with relatives in Belgium. Yvonne is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Prosper Van Hellemont, formerly of Seven Mile Road. She graduated from Northville High School in June, 1946 and the first of December of the same year set sail for Belgium aboard the S. S. Washington. She came home on the Queen Elizabeth, which took five days to reach New York after leaving England.

Yvonne visited many spots in Belgium, including Brussels and the Ardennes. She also traveled through France and spent a week in London, England.

When questioned about the food situation in Belgium, she reported that conditions were much worse in England and France as far as food is concerned. Some foods are rationed in Belgium but are not hard to obtain. Yvonne says that housewives in that country are very economical, buying only the basic foods.

Yvonne states the cost of food there is approximately the same as here but clothing is much higher. The average working man in Belgium earns about \$75 a month, some more and others much less. The styles in clothing are much the same as here, Yvonne said, but the women do not present such a smart appearance.

The main means of transportation is the railroad. For short distances the bicycle is used. Yvonne says that the bicycle means much the same to the Belgium people as automobiles do to the Americans. Transportation is not a problem as Belgium is thickly populated and vil-

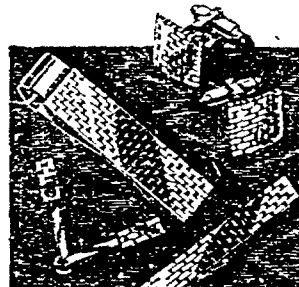

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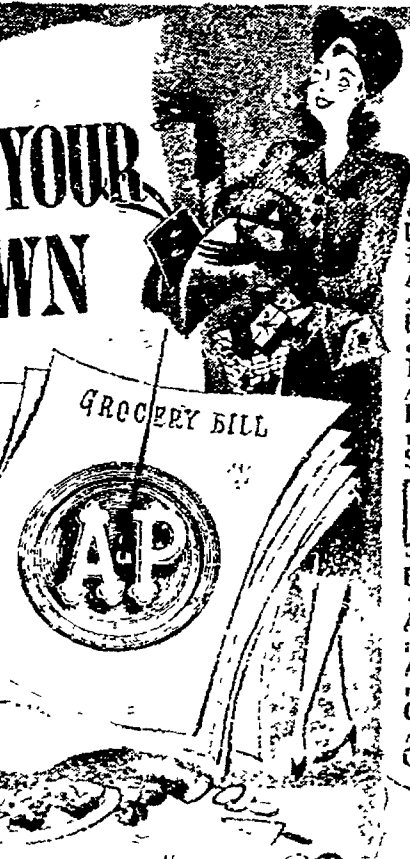

Wake up, mister, it's time to get up! The hour is 3:30 a. m. First, get the sand out of your eyes and start a quick fire under the boiler. The boiler generates steam, and steam pasteurizes milk so it will be safe for public use.

Next, plug in two milking machines. Into your spick and span white parlor—and such is its name—come 40 placid, temperamental, valuable and much pampered cows, four at a time, for their regular morning "giving" of milk. You don't milk the cows; the cows let down their milk. If a stranger is in the parlor, the cows won't enter. Feminine temperament, they say.

At the rate of about 20 cows an hour, you're through the first of two milking bees during your work-day. And then, of course, throw in for good-measure to keep you awake, are such miscellaneous chores as getting feed to the managers in the pen or loafing barn, bedding down the barn for the herd, feeding the heifers and a couple hundred chickens, and other odds and ends until it's milking time again at 4 p. m.

Such is the daily routine of Earl Parks, husky and energetic, one of four men employed by Ernest W. Reubs who owns and operates the Rosemont dairy farm at Caledonia. Caledonia is 17 miles southeast of Grand Rapids in Kent county.

Mr. Reubs, one of Michigan's outstanding dairy farmers, is president of the Michigan Guernsey Breeders' Association. He began farming in 1913, nearly 30 years ago. He started the Rosemont dairy farm in 1921, added a second farm in 1927 and a third farm in 1946, making 368 acres in all. He sells his own bottled milk in his own store in Grand Rapids—90,000 gallons a year!

All this we learned a few days ago when we pulled our 18-foot house trailer into the farm yard adjoining the Rosemont Farm. We spent part of a day and two nights there. We learned much about life on a Michigan dairy farm and some of its problems.

Michigan's dairy industry—eventh among all the states—grossed \$207 millions last year. That is aside from the investment of cows and buildings and land. More so than the average Midwest state, Michigan has made rapid gains in dairying. Rosemont at Caledonia is a symbol of this growth.

"The cows keep us. We don't keep the cows," said Mr. Reubs.

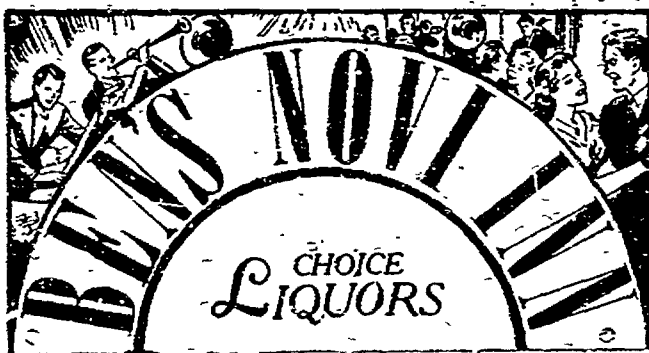

The housewives in Belgium do most of their housework by hand. Houses are wired for electricity but current is so expensive that they use it only for lights, according to Yvonne. There are a few telephones, also, owned mostly by doctors or businessmen.

In the large Belgium cities one finds plenty of entertainment but little in small towns. Yvonne says the Belgians average a dance a month and maybe a football game, the latter much like soccer played in this country. Little interest is evidenced in sports. The movies shown in the larger cities feature American or English actors and actresses but the dialogue has been translated into the French language. Two languages, French and Flemish, are spoken in Belgium.

Yvonne is now making her home with her sister, Mrs. J. J. Zayt of Vans Road, Farmington, her parents having remained in their homeland for a longer visit.

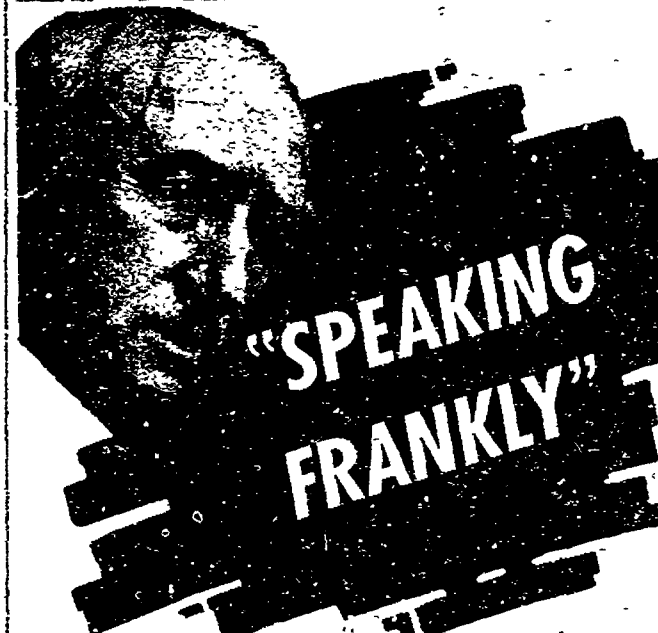

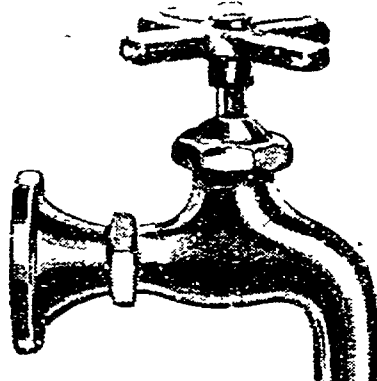
