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Novi Blue Star Mothers Review Work of Last 5 Years

As Novi Chapter, No. 47 of the Blue Star Mothers, Incorporated, come to the close of their fifth year of existence they take pride in presenting the following accomplishments achieved during that time:

The Blue Star Mothers of Novi was organized in October, 1942. During the five years the ladies have taken in a total of \$2520.75. The money was expended by yearly tag days, games and card parties, paper demonstrations and through donations made at pot lucks and picnics and experience teas.

Over the period of five years \$370 has been given to the Rehabilitation Foundation at Indiana Lake; \$100 for Christmas and going-away gifts for service men; \$240 for hospital work, five wheel chairs and two walkers have been given to veterans at Percy Jones Hospital, Battle Creek, generous donations were made to the Community Chest, Sister Kennedy Foundation and Red Cross drives.

About \$200 has been spent for gifts for new babies of veterans. Help has also been given to needy veterans. During the war years cookies were sent each month to Novi servicemen stationed all over the world.

The chapter has an active flower committee; gold star pins were presented Gold Star Mothers. The ladies had charge of the first war fund and Red Cross drive for the Township; They have collected clothing, visited hospitals and the Foundation, attended conventions, collected fats and papers when needed during the war and are now helping with the Novi Community Hall drive.

The above facts were compiled and presented by the club historian, Mrs. Luther Rix.

20 Children Given 'Shots' at Clinic


Miss Francis Kauranen was reported on the sick list Sunday.





**Feeding Stimulants To Increase Weight Utilization of Feed Profits From Desage**

Evidence that tonics and stimulants are as effective for livestock and poultry as they are for humans is contained in research conducted by Washington experiment station.

A year ago the experiment station started a feeding trial with four groups of Hereford heifers (six in each group). One group (serving as a control) was fed a basal grain ration consisting of barley, oats, beet pulp, peas and bran.

The other three groups had the same grain ration, with these additions: Lot 2, Fowler's solution (18 grams arsenic trioxide per 1,000 pounds of grain); lot 3, 300 grams of nux vomica per 1,000 pounds of grain; lot 4, 2 pounds thioracil per 1,000 pounds of grain.

During the first two weeks of feeding, the heifers getting nux vomica (lot 3) gained 3.8 pounds per head daily; those getting Fowler's solution, 2.6 pounds; those getting thioracil, 2.4 pounds; control animals, only .6 pounds. During the following two-week period, nux vomica steers gained 4.1 pounds; Fowler's solution, 3.1; thioracil, 3; control, 3.

As the weeks went by, the average daily gains for all groups came closer together. Here are the rates of gain for the four groups at the end of 14 weeks: Control (no stimulant), 2.35 pounds; Fowler's solution, 2.6 pounds; nux vomica, 2.7 pounds; thioracil, 2.5 pounds.

The cost of feed per pound of weight gain was lowest in the nux vomica group. That is, they made better use of feed than the others.

**Soils Need Air for Total Crop Growth**

**Increasing Depth of Aeration Boosts Yield**

"Stuffy" soils that have little or no oxygen available to the plant roots that grow in them just are not able to support high crop yields. Hard working plant roots need oxygen if they are to do a good job of supporting the plant and collecting plant food for the above ground parts.

Working with muck soil, N. K. Ellis, Purdue University, and Richard Morris, U. S. soil conservation service, found that when liberal quantities of oxygen penetrated the soil only four inches the yield of red beets, sweet corn, onions and Chap...

peas, potatoes, was small. When the soils were "cultivated" to 18 inches the yields increased as much as 10 fold. When the depth of aeration was increased to 36 inches the yield of some of the crops was increased.

The yield of carrots went from 3 to 23 tons per acre when the depth of aeration was increased from 4 to 10 inches. Sweet corn yield went from 3 to 4.75 tons; onions from 45 to 275 50-pound bags; red beets from 3.75 to 13.5 tons and potatoes from 4 to 12 to 22 bushels per acre.

Oxygen in the soil is the key to the plant roots is the logical reason for the difference in crop yields. Adequate plant food was available in all the plots. Rainfall during the season was sufficient to eliminate water as a limiting crop production factor in the plots.

About 125 persons were seated around a long table at a Lansing hotel. Dr. Elliott arose, welcomed them and then proceeded to introduce each guest. He knew them by their first names. He injected humor. He said of Tom Wilson, director of civil service, "Here is a man we all love." Called by first name and given an accurate and semi-flattering reference, each person was in good spirits by the time the next speaker arose to talk.

Pete Hoffmaster, director of the state conservation department, knows his conservation. He lives it. He eats it. He sleeps it. He told about the state's 18 group camps whereby groups of five to 60 persons may be given overnight camp facilities and groups up to 250 persons may be accommodated for day use. From January to June of this year the total of persons thus served was 5,599; the summer season added 6,446, and the calendar year's total will be between 15,000 and 16,000.

Where are these camps? Pete didn't go into details, and so we inquired later. Three are in the Waterloo recreational area; two in the Yonke Springs area. One each at the following: Ludington, Mackinac, Steeper Hayes, Island Lake and Van Buren state parks. One at Allegan Lake, Oceana Lake in Presque Isle county, Ortonville and Highland recreational areas. And two in the Upper Peninsula.

Dr. Hoch Waters, educational director of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation, was next introduced. The foundation gives the state an annual grant of \$1,700 to provide group camps.

The final speaker was Governor Sigler.

### Our Village

**The Mill Pond**  
**By H. Hartley**

I have occasionally asked friends how they happened to choose Northville as a place of residence. One answered that he came here because it resembled his former New England home more closely than any other village in this area; another replied that he had found work here and wanted to be near his work, and still another said: "I was born here" ... a sufficient answer.

I asked a similar question I might say that I was attracted by its wooded hillside, its modern grade school building (so much like the architectural achievements at Cranbrook), its neat business section and pretty homes. Each of these things would be true but above all I was drawn to Northville by my first glimpse, from the hill above the athletic field, of the broad silent pond near Horton street; its tree-shaded dam and the smoothly falling water torn and whitened on the rocks below, and the creek weaving its way rapidly through a meadow starred with the blue flowers of the chicory.

"I like this," I thought then. Here was a village with a pond; and in my mind, a village with a pond was something like a garden without flowers. My decision was made.

Nor was it true that I no longer liked industrial, cosmopolitan Detroit where I lived previously. I did like it but I felt that this village was far more suitable for the expansive, imaginative and happy development of a child-my son I didn't want him to suffer the experience of the writer, Langston Hughes, who said he paddled city streets so long he associated green grass only with graveyards. Besides, I looked upon my approaching village life as an adventure. I had met and known and worked with and admired the people of several cities of our country, so I would have the opportunity of friendship with their great complement, the people of a village.

And the Mill pond appeared symbolic of this rural way of life; more easy-going perhaps, but varied and no less called upon to face and solve all problems affecting the remainder of the nation.

Varied too, is the mood of the pond itself; one day clear, fresh and sparkling; another day still, hot-looking, almost grey; now falling over the dam in a gentle wash; under the moonlight and again roaring over, brown and swollen, tearing down the too-narrow banks. I think I like it best in the cool of an early spring dawn. A thousand rising columns of vapor shroud its calm surface. The sky is dark overhead but the red sun, invisible, inflames the clouds behind the eastern bank.


LOCAL FOLKS MOVE
