

 Edison under the farmer's supervision made a study on experimental farms of how electric power could be efficiently and economically used on the farm. It was found that electricity could be applied to nearly every operation on the farm and when used for productive purposes could be a self-supporting servant for the farmer and his wife as well. Farmers were quick to realize the value of electricity on the farm, and by the end of 1928, there were 7,707 farms in the Company's territory served by means of 1,719 miles of power lines. By 1945, 35,728 farms were electrified and the Company had 9,671 miles of farm lines in operation. Detroit Edison engineers developed new methods of line construction which would enable it to build farm lines on an economically sound basis for both the farmer and the Company so, from 1923 to 1945, it was able to make several reductions in its customer contribution requirements for the extension of electric service to farms. This low cost development was an important factor in the rapid expansion of electric service in the rural areas during this period.

Completing the extension of electric power lines to all farms in the territory at the middle of 1948 will not mark an end to the Company's activities in the farm field but rather the beginning of an intensive program to expand the uses of electricity on the farm. Farmers are assisted in selecting economical application of electricity for their operations by a staff of experienced and specially trained Detroit Edison Farm Representatives, who work with and assist the farmer without charge. Increased use of electricity on farms will mean increased efficiency, more profits and better leisure for the farmer and his helpers. Mr. German added

Parasite Control Necessary for Poultry Health

Fall weather and the housing of the flocks means that poultry men should be on the lookout for parasite infestation. Dr. Clarence E. Hardin, extension specialist in poultry diseases at Michigan State College, says:

Symptoms of it are not reliable indicators of worm infestation. Post-mortem examinations should be made preferably by a qualified veterinarian to determine whether or not intestinal worms may be the cause of an outbreak of disease. Sometimes the poultry flock is wormy when there is no indication of the need of worming. This practice often proves harmful to the flock and is not recommended.

Roundworm control is based on the proper disposal of egg-meat, dead droppings. Other important practices are the screening of droppings, frequent cleaning and disinfection of poultry houses, rotation of yards and ranges, and the safe disposal of droppings. Careful attention to these measures is necessary to control parasite infestation in the flock.

In addition to these precautions, Dr. Hardin points out that beetles, slugs, snails, and flies which serve as intermediate hosts for the tapeworm should be controlled as well as possible. Fly control may be accomplished by the use of DDT and also by restricted use of such fly-attracting products as liquid milk.

The removal of boards, leafy materials, and similar objects forming hiding places for slugs and snails will control the spread of tapeworms.

America will have lost its traditional character if it refuses (fuel and famine) relief under proper auspices," said Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg in an address at the University of Michigan.

The senator's remarks, favoring additional food and coal for Western Europe, were expressed at Ann Arbor in ceremonies commemorating the Dutch settlement of Michigan 100 years ago. Simultaneously, and by coincidence, Governor Kim Sigler announced the Michigan Citizens' Food Committee led by Prof. Herman J. Wyngarden, head of the Michigan State College economics department.

Senator Vandenberg added an important "if." "We must frankly canvass our own resources lest we impair our own economy and thus vindicate the sinister hopes of those who expect our economic collapse to end all democracy for keeps. . . . We must know the total bill."

Vandenberg declared he should strive for an "unpartisan American foreign policy." Governor Sigler stressed our patriotic obligation. "It is not a question of whether we agree with the President's program. The President of the United States has asked the people to cooperate. Those responsible should know the food situation in Europe. We in Michigan should as in the past, do what is necessary to cooperate."

During World War II, more than a half million Michigan young men — and a thousand or so young women — left their homes for military duty. Most of them returned home safely. Some did not.

Our arming military conscripts was done in part at Washington was General George C. Marshall. Marshall is now secretary of state.

Quoting Secretary Marshall: "During the critical period in world affairs, food is a vital factor in our foreign policy. The attitude of Americans towards food can make or break our efforts to achieve peace and security throughout the world."

Why did General Marshall and Senator Vandenberg both stress the importance of food and fuel?

by 200 million bushels. The U. S. wheat crop was a record 1,450 million bushels, while our corn yield was down 900 million bushels.
