Today's Shopping Problems Differ from Those of 1847

The Christmas shopper of a century ago who made out her shopping list from the newspaper advertisements would have had a difficult time.

The newspaper ads of 1847 made rather dull going for the reader, concentrating as they did on groceries, hardware and clothing essentials. Many of the advertisements used in weekly newspapers ran for several months without change.

Files of the Ann Arbor "True Democrat" for December, 1847, contained in the University of Michigan General Library, offer as their best advice to the Christmas shopper jewelry and musical instruments "direct from New York." Presumably the clocks and watches, rings and necklaces, accordeons and violins listed in this advertisement arrived via canal, lake steamer and railroad.

Other advertisers of the period pointed to their stocks of "large family Bibles," "hats and caps, Yankee notions, looking glasses," and "new goods for the winter trade."

But if it were prices on items needed for the Christmas dinner that caused concern, the 1947 food buyer can look with envy at the 1847 price list. According to the Ann Arbor market report, corrected weekly by the True Democrat editor, potatoes were selling for 38 cents a bushel, and wheat for 85 cents a bushel. Butter was not more than 16 cents per pound, and eggs sold for 12 cents a dozen. Beef by the hundredweight could be had for from \$2.50 to \$3.00.

Along with the advertisement of possible Christmas items was that inevitable call for military recruits. The Mexican War was then in progress, and the Marines were advertising "Who'll Go to the Halls of the Montezumas?"

Once again the pupils and teachers of the Northville schools are marking the Christmas season. Appropriate decorations have long been in place and programs prepared for presentation in both the Grade and High school buildings.

Windows on the Main street side of the Grade building have been adorned with cut-outs which portray the story of Christmas. Inside each class or home room are bright holiday decorations. A tree, resplendent in all its trimmings, graces the Senior Assembly Hall. A decorated Christmas tree has also held the place of honor in each grade room (all the trees having been fire-proofed).

Programs for each age group have been arranged by faculty and pupils to mark the culmination of the school holiday spirit.

Enthusiastic boys and girls from Kindergarten through the Sixth grade will hold three general assemblies on the dates of December 19th and 22nd. The first (Friday) will be for the Second and Third grade pupils while the Kindergartners and First graders will celebrate Monday morning and the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth graders that afternoon. All will be "student participation" programs, pupils in each room taking part in their particular assembly.

Senior and Junior High pupils will combine for an assembly program to take place Tuesday afternoon, December 23rd. A chapel service has been planned by the chapel committee (composed of faculty and pupils) and student council members. Christmas music, sung by the High school choir, and a play put on by the speech class are a few of the numbers scheduled for this event.

The general public will be welcome to attend the chapel program.

This event will also mark the closing of the Northville schools for the annual holiday vacation, which begins December 23rd, 1947, and continues to Monday, January 3rd, 1948.

The holiday program of the local schools was ushered in with the choral concert given December 11th by the High school choir and glee clubs.

A large crowd of music lovers filled the gymnasium to hear the eighty voice choir and glee clubs deliver sacred and secular music, many selections having to do with the Christmas season. June Boyd and Bob Campbell rendered several fine solos and Marcia Sparling and Corine Clark accompanied the group. The choir is directed by Leslie G. Lee.

Present 'Messiah' Here Next Sunday

With the Dec. 21st presentation of the celebrated "The Messiah" the citizens of the community who have seen this here in previous years and those who have seen it staged in other places across the country are anxiously looking forward to this, the greatest of all oratorios and one of Handel's most beloved works.

The little known fact about this widely known piece of work is that it was written by George Frederick Handel in London in 1741. The first presentation was in Fishamble Street Music Hall, Dublin, April 13, 1742, under direction of the composer.

At this first performance the ladies were requested to "refrain from wearing hoops," and the gentlemen were asked to "leave their swords at home," in order that a capacity crowd might swell the proceeds to relieve needy children and the inmates of debtors' prisons.

The English premiere of "The Messiah" was given at Covent Garden, in March, 1743. It is said that George II was so swept away by the grandeur of the music portraying the King of Kings that he sprang to his feet in reverent acclaim at the opening bars of the Hallelujah chorus, an action which led to the modern custom.

The local presentation of this oratorio is under the direction of Leslie G. Lee and will be staged in the Presbyterian Church on Sunday evening, Dec. 21, beginning at 7:45 o'clock.

Verna Buell has been selected to render soprano solo. Mrs. Buell has studied music in Arizona and New York City. Her husband is at present doing graduate work at the University of Michigan and she works in the library. Sally Mick, who will be the contralto soloist, is studying music at the University.

Chas. Taylor will be remembered by many local music lovers as he appeared here two years ago with another presentation of the Messiah. He will sing the tenor solo. William DeMaria, bass, is a student of Wayne University and is doing his practice teaching at Pershing. Mr. DeMaria has taken part in several other renditions of the Messiah this year.

Mrs. G. W. Harrison and Mrs. Batten Connors will serve as organist and pianist respectively.

Winter Arrives Officially at 11:43 A.M. Monday

December 22 will mark the official beginning of Winter and likewise be the shortest day of the year.

Although Michigan residents have had several previews of wintry weather, only what happens after 11:43 a. m. on the 22nd can really be put down as Old Man Winter's fault, according to Miss Hazel M. Losh, assistant professor of astronomy at the University of Michigan.

At that time, the sun will have reached its farthest point below the celestial equator, Professor Losh reports. She also points to an oddity in that the sun during the winter is actually about three million miles closer to the Northern Hemisphere than it is during the summer. It is the direct angle at which the sun's rays hit the Northern Hemisphere in the summer which produces warmer weather, Professor Losh says.

After December 22, days will become longer until about March 21 when days and nights will be equal, she reports. Then the days will gradually lengthen until June 21 when the longest day will occur. The shortest day will occur on December 22.

On Capital Hill

Foreign Demand For Food: According to the report of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce's Foreign Commerce Committee, recently returned from Europe, the direct foreign demand for farm products is not large with the exception of wheat. This demand for wheat operates to raise prices of other grains and eventually the whole range of farm products such as meats, dairy products and poultry.

The United States and other governments as have available dollars are planning to purchase for shipment abroad during the year ending June 30, 1948, approximately 450-million bushels of wheat and 70-million bushels of other grains. Over 300-million bushels of this amount have already been purchased.

American vs. Russian Travelers: Little more than a month ago, Russia refused to allow our Assistant Secretary of State and 15 of our Senators and Government officials to enter Russia for the purpose of inspecting the U. S. Embassy in Moscow. At the same time hundreds of citizens from Russia and her satellites, over half of whom are official representatives and agents of the Soviet Government, are permitted to travel freely through the United States. Accordingly, Congressman William Cole (R-Mo.) introduced a resolution in Congress to deport all citizens of Russia in excess of the number of our American citizens permitted in those countries. The situation should be equalized.

Export Of Scarce Goods: The Office of International Trade, Department of Commerce, reports (Nov. 1947) that during 1946 we exported to Soviet Russia goods in the amount of \$357,921,000; of which \$141,744,000 was under UNRRA; \$152,124,000, Lend Lease; with only \$53,379,000 of which were cash purchases. During the first seven months of 1947, we have exported to the Soviet goods in the amount of \$111,014,000. Russia has paid in cash for but \$61,113,000 of this amount. This means that we are exporting to Russia goods in the amount of \$641,388 per day.

President Truman is reported to have said in a recent press conference (November 21) that Russia had purchased 216 freight cars from the U. S. between April and October of this year and that he saw no reason why shipments of this type and of such other equipment as machine tools, tractors, farm machinery, and similar supplies should not be sent to Soviet Russia. We all know that these are scarce goods and that our Western States have been begging for freight cars for months and months, in which to move grain and other commodities.

Congressman Karl E. Mundt (R-S.Dakota) has introduced a measure asking for a full report on the goods shipped to Russia and the firms exporting same, as well as a report on the unfilled Soviet orders of this type of goods, so that our citizens may know the facts. Congressman Mundt states that his purpose in introducing his resolution is to stop all exports to Russia which might be used in building up war industries there. The shipment of strategic materials to Russia looks strangely like the plan carried out by the late President Franklin Roosevelt and his State Department in furnishing scrap iron to Japan, which later was used against us in a fighting war. In my "News and Comment" early in July of this year, I acquainted you with the fact that I had protested the shipment of oil to Russia while at the same time there were shortages of this commodity in the States. Michigan is already beginning to feel the pinch for fuel oil.

1948 Fishing Licenses on Way to Dealers

Shipping of a million and a half 1948 sport fishing licenses began this week, and conservation department officials hope to have consignments to 3,200 dealers in the mail before the Christmas rush reaches its peak.

The initial printing order is for 1,100,000 \$1.50 resident licenses, 240,000 \$2.10-day nonresident licenses and 225,000 \$5 annual nonresident licenses. The new licenses are needed on and after January 1; 600,000 \$1 trout fishing stamps not needed until later will be distributed separately early in the new year.

In the 12-page fish law digest that accompanies each license all changes from regulations of the previous season are set in bold-face or italic type, so the angler may find them easily and quickly.
