## Obsequies Held for Rev. J. J. Link

Just one day after attaining his eighty-eighth birthday, Rev. Jacob J. Link of Fairbrook Road, passed away Saturday, January 3rd, at Beyer Memorial Hospital, Ypsilanti. Rev. Link was the father of Mrs. Leslie G. Lee and had made his home with the Lees for the past thirteen years.

Funeral services were conducted Monday morning in the Schrader Chapel by Rev. Wm. Hughes of the Northville Methodist Church and Rev. Harry Lord of Lansing, formerly a local pastor. Burial services took place later that day in the family plot at Allegan where Rev. Link had served during his early ministry.

Rev. Link's family who survive him includes besides Mrs. Lee, two other daughters, Fersis (Mrs. P. R. Morgan) of Tucson, Ariz., and Hildigarde (Mrs. C. E. Besser) of Detroit; son, Milton, of Flint, and eleven grandchildren.

J. J. Link was united in marriage with Edith Johnson Kenziehausen of Hopkins, Mich., on April 8th, 1897. Mrs. Link died January 1st, 1935 at Flint and was laid to rest in Allegan, beside four of their children who had preceded her in death.

Jacob Link, the fourth of five children was born on a farm near Saginaw, in the year 1860. His parents, Casper and Margarete Link, had set forth in a sailboat ten years before from Hamburg, Bavaria, Germany, to the United States. The sea voyage consumed fifty-six days.

Mr. Link's first active connection with the German-Mетодist Church began when, at the age of fifteen years, he united with the Saginaw - Kochville Church (the adopted church of his parents), the family having

## At Salem Meeting



## To Show "God of Atom" at Salem Church

Rev. J. W. McCabrell of Moody Bible Institute will show his sound-color film, "God of the Atom," at 7:30 p.m. Saturday (January 13), at the Salem Federated Church.

Dr. Moon demonstrated the Barkhausen effect, by which the audience is able to hear the movement of groups of molecules within a magnetized steel bar, in the movie.

A drastically different approach to the atomic bomb problem will be presented at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday (January 3), at the Salem Federated Church, when the new color film, "God of the Atom," is shown. The picture has been produced by Dr. Irvin A. Moon, director of Moody Institute of Science in Los Angeles and noted originator of "Sermons from Science," according to the Rev. C. M. Pennell, pastor of the church.

"God of the Atom" points out that the discovery of atomic energy has brought man's consciousness of religion more sharply into focus. The problem, Dr. Moon declares, is not what man has but what man is.

Three branches of service were represented by the veterans, Marines, Navy SeaBees and regular Navy. The get-together was planned for this time to coincide with the leave of Harold Tuck, who expects to leave soon for overseas duty. Harold is the only one of the five to re-enlist in the armed forces, the others having taken their places in the world.

The building was occupied by the Voorhees Insurance Agency, Herman A. Roth, attorney; the Stock Drug Store, the Vickery Restaurant and Mrs. Laura Givens Ladies Wearing Apparel Shop. The apartment above the stores was occupied by Mrs. Alis Wilhite, and at the time of the fire, her brother and sister, Mrs. Ross Smith, were staying with her.

The fire was discovered by Mrs. Wilhite and her alarm en-  
gaged the occupants to escape.

The Nov. 16 Walled Lake Fire Department fought the blaze from 4:50 a.m. to 8:30. A fire wall saved part of the building.

The building was once a famous resort hotel which burned about five years ago.

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





## Local Ford Dealers Sponsor Fred Allen

A 1948 construction and system expansion program amounting to \$40,681,600 has been approved by the board of directors of Consumers Power Company. D. E. Barn, vice president and general manager, announced today. It is the largest one-year construction program in the company's history.

"Use of electricity and gas in the territory served by the company has been increasing rapidly," Mr. Barn said. "Expansion of our electric and gas system has been restrained from keeping pace. For several years wartime restrictions prevented expansion.

Since then, construction work has been slowed by material shortages and other conditions. That means that our construction program during 1948 and each of the next few years must be much larger."

It is planned as a part of this 1948 program to invest a total of \$17,529,200 in the construction, enlargement and improvement of power plants. Much of this money will go into the new B. C. Cobb Plant, now under construction in Muskegon. The Cobb Plant is scheduled to go into service in September. At first it will have two 60,000-kilowatt generating units. Construction work will continue at the plant, and late in 1948 another 60,000-kilowatt unit is scheduled to go into operation.

Consumers already serves more than 90,000 farm customers—a larger number than any other company in America—and the 1948 program will bring the total to more than 100,000. The company operates 20,000 miles of rural distribution lines and will add 1,300 more in 1948.

Gas department projects, including many distribution system improvements and extensions in various areas, are estimated at \$2,227,600. These do not include the storage field and transmission line projects of the Michigan Gas Storage Company, a subsidiary of Consumers, which is developing one of the country's largest storage field projects in Clare, Oscoda and Missaukee counties.

"This overall program," Mr. Barn said, "is a challenge both in providing the necessary funds and in completing it on time so as to take care of our customers' requirements."

first been of the Lutheran faith.) The call to preach came early to young Link. He was authorized to conduct meetings of prayer and exhortation in the Saginaw-Kochville Church soon after his affiliation with that group.

At the age of twenty the young man went to Baldwin Wallace College in Berea. On the last college year he accepted a preaching charge at Rockport, Ohio, near Cleveland. From there he was sent to Freeport, Michigan. During the following years Rev. Link served a number of charges, among them Perryburg, Toledo, West Unity and Cincinnati, Ohio, and in Loring, Lowell, Detroit, Saginaw, Petoskey, Muskegon, Flint, Alpena and other Michigan cities.

Rev. Link's notable life became a member of the Dutch Conference in 1943 upon the dissolution of the Central German Conference and its merger with the more English-speaking conferences.

The Links had made their home in Flint following the pastor's retirement in 1930 at the age of seventy years. However, even then his service to the church did not end. Due to his ability to preach in both the German and English languages, Rev. Link was invited to act as supply minister in the Flint charge for the next three years. He preached his last sermon in Flint when more than one hundred years of age. During his residence in Northville Rev. Link was often called upon to assist in the local M. E. and Baptist Churches, as well as in the churches of Novi.
