

## Postal Receipts Up 15% for 1947

The local Postmaster, Fred E. Van Vickle reports 1947 to be the most successful year in the history of the post office, postage stamp sales coming within \$1,823 of the \$6,000 required for a first class license. This is a 15% increase over stamp sales in 1946.

A 15% increase in all first, second and third class mail, incoming and outgoing, and parcel post was also recorded in the Northville office for the entire year. The general Christmas increase was also estimated to be about 15% higher than 1946.

Money order receipts this year (1947) are up almost 20%. The 1947 figures of \$395,941.83 show an increase of \$65,381.58 over the \$330,563.25 total of 1946. This figure does not include monies received from the new postal rate business which was \$8,552.63 for 1947.

Since this increase of volume sales does not represent any unusual business growth it is assumed that the growth of the post office is due to the growth of Northville itself and when the first class mark is reached it will remain stationary.

## Radar Explained to Exchangeites

W. J. Banks of the public relations department of the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. was the guest speaker at Exchange Wednesday.

In a most interesting and informative manner he presented a breakdown of wave frequency to the one inch length of the radar beam. He even demonstrated the function of the transmitter and the receiver. He showed the varying effects of non-conductors and conductors on the reception and breaking of the beams, as well as the turning of the waves through metallic tubes, and with lucite. Many questions

were asked and answered in satisfying the inquisitive members of the club.



VETERANS' AFFAIRS  
LANSING

Michigan veterans who are re-  
ceiving federal compensation or  
pension payments from the  
Veterans Administration may  
make arrangements for deduction  
of G.I. life insurance premiums  
from their monthly checks.

By making this arrangement  
the veteran is relieved of all de-  
tails in keeping the policy in  
force, and thus does not run the  
risk of having his insurance lapse  
because of overlooking a premium  
payment.

All that is necessary to arrange  
for the deduction of premiums  
is to file an authorization on the  
proper form (8-887) in duplicate.  
The original goes to the Insurance  
Service, Veterans Administra-  
tion Branch, Columbus, Ohio,  
and the duplicate to the Regional  
Office of the Veterans Adminis-  
tration in Detroit.

Assistance in completing the  
necessary forms may be obtained  
at community counseling centers.

Laws of the U.S. Ignored by United Nations: Congressman George Dondero brought to the attention of the House of Representatives a recent newspaper item to the effect that Abraham H. Feller, United Nations General Counsel, stated that the United Nations would be the judge of alien correspondents accredited to that body, and that even if the United States denied entry of such correspondents the U.N. representatives had the power to insist on their entry.

The arrest of Nicholas Kyriazis, U.N. Correspondent for a Greek Communist paper, and S. Syed Nasan, U.N. Correspondent for a Communist Bombay weekly, and their detention by United States Immigration authorities brought forth this statement.

Dondero stated that Abraham Feller, is an American who, according to Plain Talk Magazine of October, 1947, "has been a member of the Committee on International Law of the National Lawyers Guild, which was repudiated as Communist-controlled by such liberal attorneys as Frank P. Walsh, Ferdinand Peccora, et al." According to this

magazine, Feller's pro-Russian sympathies are well known to his former associates in Federal agencies. The Congressman pointed out: "This is the man who apparently has been given a super authority above the Congress of the United States on matters vital to our national safety."

Small Business Men's Convention: A large group of representatives of the Small Business Men's Association from Michigan and the 17th Congressional District, in Washington, attending their national convention, called on Congressman George A. Dondero, who is in accord with the aims and objectives of the organization. This group provides employment to a major portion of the people of the United States.

The Congressman believes that no group in America is more keenly alert to the dangers men-

acing the American way of life than these small business men.

He, together with other Members of the Michigan Delegation, attended their annual dinner.

How the Taft-Hartley Labor Law Has Worked: The end of the year 1947 has established the fact that the Taft-Hartley Labor Law has brought about a marked step toward peaceful relations between labor and management and, more important, between the elements of labor itself. For the first time in many months, the nation was enjoying comparative quiet. The average worker earned \$72 more in 1947 due to this industrial peace.

In 1947 there was a loss of only 16 days' employment to the average worker because of strikes, as compared with 25 days in 1946. There were 81 million less man-days lost in 1947 than in 1946. At \$8 a day, the loss in wages for 1946 amounted to \$902 million while at the same rate the loss in wages for 1947 would amount to \$81,600,000. In other words, fewer strikes in 1947 saved the American workers \$638,400,000. There were 1,335 less work stoppages in 1947 than in 1946.

The Labor Board has on file 29,418 anti-Communist affidavits. This has been signed by 20,934 AFL, 6,715 Independent, and 1,769 CIO union officers. Many Communists were dismissed from union leadership because they refused to sign affidavits.

Stream Pollution: George A. Dondero, Chairman of the Public Works Committee of the House of Representatives announces that hearings on Stream Pollution probably will be resumed by that Committee this week. This is a measure which is vital to industry, sportsmen, and laymen alike.



With the expected egg price, high feed costs may keep poultrymen from getting greater returns than last year. Poultry producers advise farmers to strive for meat eggs, particularly for market. High improved strains, which feed more efficiently, have high quality and quantity for market. Quality is the key to quality.


