Expect Worst Spring Breakup

Henry C. Smith County Highway Engineer, today predicted that the spring breakup will cause grave consequences to home owners on secondary roads and subdivisions that throughout Wayne County. Many of these roads and tracts will become impassable within the next six weeks, he said.

Mr. Smith pointed out that there is at least an inch of frost in the ground and that ditches and culverts are blocked with snow and ice. The inevitable result of this condition is that with the melting of the snow and ice, and the frost coming out of the ground, ditches and culverts will be unable to carry the water away, causing it to back up thereby creating flood conditions and the break-up of secondary roads and subdivisions streets.

The severity of the winter and the depth of frost in the ground will cause worse conditions than prevailed 2 years ago, when the spring breakup was the worst in the history of the Wayne County Road Commission, he said.

The Road Commission is doing everything within its power to alleviate this condition by using portable steam boilers to force steam through the culverts in an endeavor to free them so that they may function in carrying the water away. He said that he is very much afraid that the best efforts will be unable to cope with the situation. The only remedy to prevent these conditions occurring annually is an adequate sewer system, which would cost millions of dollars, and there is no way of presently financing the construction of such a sewer system he said.

E. D. Farwell, animal husbandry specialist at Michigan State college, warns that farmers shouldn't wait until it is too warm to keep fresh meat without spoilage. With spring not far away and the planting rush that comes with it, there is no better time to slaughter than now.

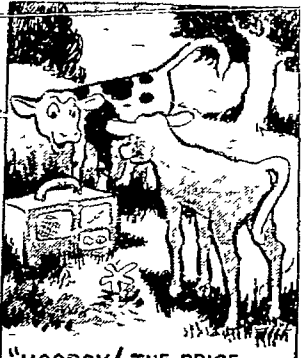

House-to-house mail delivery in Milford will be a reality July 1, Postmaster John C. Fremlin announced this Wednesday morning. He just received authorization by the First Assistant Postmaster General to establish delivery by mail effective this date.

A community show using a large cast of local people ranging in age from 4 to 80 years old will open a ten night run on March 4th and 5th at Quack Hall under the sponsorship of the Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Local 4111 Post 2502 of South Lyon.

South Lyon lawyer were called to the William Allen residence, 1609 Grand River, near Naper road Thursday night with the City's response, in an endeavor to save the life of the Allen's fourteen months old son, Tommy who had been ill for two days. The infant died while the men were trying to save it.

Bids for a new postoffice building for Walled Lake closed Feb. 22. A new bridge is being constructed at the point to permit the raising of the water level of the river by the Huron-Clinton authority to create a new lake. The

bridge costing \$193,206, was scheduled for completion Oct. 1.

A jury of six men acquitted Ezra Beachy, a teacher at the Farmington school, on Saturday, February 14th, of the charge of assault and battery, brought against him in the justice court at Brighton. The jury deliberated less than 30 minutes. Beachy was charged with committing assault and battery upon Richard Schaner, age 13 September 25, 1947. At the time it was alleged that Beachy injured the boy when he administered a sound paddling to him for "improper conduct in school."

The menace of hunting within the boundaries of Farmington Township was brought to the attention of the Farmington Township Board at their regular meeting held Tuesday evening by residents of the Township. One citizen appearing before the Board stated that not only had he suffered property loss because of hunters, but his wife actually had been shot at, and guns had been fired at his home. He stated that he did not consider it safe to go out of doors during hunting season.

Be On Lookout for Measles

Many communities in Wayne County are due for a red measles epidemic this Spring. This disease which is so serious, especially for children under three, usually hits each community during the Spring months at two or three year intervals. Occasionally an outbreak occurs earlier in that season. Those areas that have had the least measles over the last two or three year period are most likely to have a severe outbreak this year.

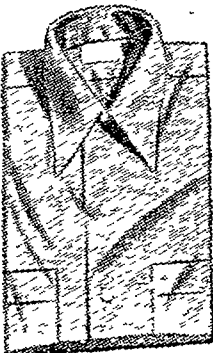
Here's what you can do—Be On The Alert. Remember that the first symptoms of measles are cough, runny nose, red eyes—just like a cold—also that measles is most contagious during this stage—before the rash appears. Children (and adults as well) with symptoms of an acute cold should remain at home and away from others.

Parents should keep babies and young children away from crowds and public places where they are unknowingly exposed during the next three or four days. Even if it is the only exposure which you will not be aware of until your child starts to cough. It is then too late for your doctor to modify or lessen the severity of the disease by giving a serum.

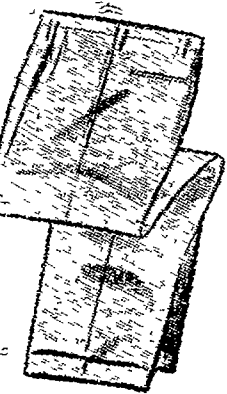
Young children may be protected from a severe attack if it is known that the child was exposed and if the child is taken to the family physician before the first symptoms appear. The Wayne County Health Department has available from the Michigan Department of Health a limited supply of immune globulin and will furnish it free to physicians as long as it lasts for the modification of measles in children under three years of age or older children who are debilitated. The public health nurse assigned to the community will gladly consult with and advise anyone regarding measles or other health matters.

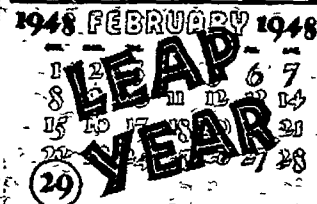
