Cattermole Bldg. Being Remodeled

Workmen are busy this week wrecking parts of the old Cattermole building on North Center Street, preparatory to a modernization program now in blueprint stage. Andrew Sambrook, formerly of Northville, now of Plymouth, has had the property vacated by the Griswold Restaurant and Conroy Poolroom so that the new plans may be accomplished as soon as possible.

The 38-foot front on Center Street, with a modern style with center door and stairway to the second floor. The building, 38 by 80 feet, will accommodate two stories on the first floor, according to Mr. Sambrook, and several suites of offices on the second floor. At present no definite plans affect the third floor of the structure. No statement was made as to time of completion and probable occupancy.

The building, erected by W. H. Cattermole, now of Ypsilanti about 1901, first housed the implement and harness business of Mr. Cattermole, and the blacksmithing partnership of Cattermole and Sheer (John). The harness business was in the south half, the implement storage in the rear, and the blacksmithing in the north side. Previous to this business venture, Mr. Cattermole was with the Globe Furniture Co., and also had a business of finishing Hamilton rifle stocks in the building now occupied by the Webber Co.

It is said that this building housed the first garage and automobile agency in the Village. Ward Pettibone had the garage and Reo agency. Northville's first lowing alley was on the second floor of this building. Of recent years the property has been owned by Sam Peckard, Nelson Schrader and Jas. Spagnuolo, and was occupied by a number of businesses including a restaurant, recreational parlor, shoe repair and furniture store.

The day morning at one of the fire department was called to extinguish a stubborn fire in the accumulated rubbish and used lumber at the rear of this building. Apparently fire in a pile of debris supposedly put out, was the cause of the flames. The firemen had a real struggle to prevent the flames from spreading into the upper floors of the building.

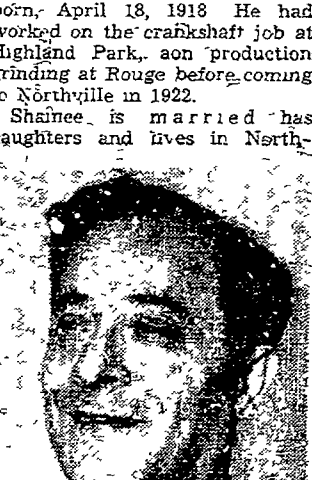

Discuss Public Health Nurse Here

The Village Commission, in regular session Monday evening, heard the recreation report, request for smoke nuisance abatement, approved election of fire chief, studied insurance, planned for dog vaccination, discussed walks, water, curbs and gutters, and heard request for public health nurse.

George Locke occupied the chair in the absence of President Langfield. Representing the Recreation Committee, Wilson Funk presented the report of the work of the department. Mr. and Mrs. Westphal of Cady Street, representing their area, asked for relief from the smoke nuisance in that section.

The election of Clayton Walker to be chief of the fire department was approved and the appointment made effective immediately. Plans were set in motion to purchase the necessary pumps for the new well as soon as specifications were available. The insurance of all Village property was reviewed in the light of present values. The conditions of walks was discussed and charter provisions reviewed with the thought of repairing many of the broken walks. This service, according to the charter, may be done and paid for by the property owner or the village will do same and charge it to the owner, and if not paid, will be charged back on the tax roll. Curbs and gutter and resurfacing quotations on certain streets were requested.

Dr. Chabot, health commissioner, and Superintendent Armstrong of the Northville Schools, appeared before the commission requesting the consideration of a full time public health nurse for the Village and School District to work in conjunction with the school system and the Village Health Department. The nurse should be paid for under the proposed by the school and the Village under the township if interested. This would allow for more complete check and supervision of health projects with more home visitation and help than is possible under the present school nurse setup. The matter is to be taken up before the board of education and the proposal reviewed by cooperating units later.

Questions relating to the legal status of a modern, well regulated and equipped trailer camp in the Village were presented for future thought and clarification.
