Independence Day Parade is Planned

A parade will begin the activities being planned by the local American Legion Post for the gala celebration of Independence Day on July 4. The parade will form at Veterans' Memorial Hall at 1:00 p. m. and with the high school band leading, will proceed to Ford Field for the many remaining events on the program. At 2:00 the judging of pets will take place and field events for young and old will commence at 2:30. The softball game, scheduled between young and old men will begin at 4:00. At 5:00 the Plymouth, Farmington, South Lyon and Northville fire departments will all participate in a water battle. A full evening of fun is also being planned, including a street dance. Further details will be given at a later date.

Motor City Open Set for July 1 to 4

Meadowbrook Country Club is being made ready to receive the nation's best professional golfers in the Motor City Tournament, July 1-4, according to Jim Cornelius, the Club's manager. Grounds are being put into shape and visitors galleries are being planned in readiness for the biggest golfing event of the year for the club. The Motor City Open has a total purse of \$16,500 being offered by the Club, which will be sought after by the country's top-ranking golfers. One hundred seventy-five golfers are expected to enter the tournament, Cornelius said. Preceding the tournament Monday and Tuesday, June 29 and 30, the golf pros will spend these days practicing and in qualifying rounds. Wednesday, June 30, 44 of the country's leading professionals will team with 44 Detroit Automobile Dealers Association members in the pro-amateur competition. The top prize for the professionals is a \$3,600 Lincoln convertible, donated by the Lincoln-Mercury dealers of Detroit. Season tickets for the Motor City Open may be purchased in advance at the Clubhouse, said Cornelius. Tickets for each day may be gotten at the gate, he said.

Korean Situation Told at Exchange

Dr. Insung Kwak addressed the Exchange Club meeting Wednesday noon. A native of Korea, he was introduced by Dr. Leonard Howard of the Maybury Sanatorium. Dr. Kwak, previous to his arrival at Maybury Sanatorium in November 1947 in connection with the World Health Organization, had served as Superintendent of the Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Masan, Korea. Dr. Kwak gave a brief outline of Korea's history and then discussed his country's economical situation. Since the conclusion of World War II, he said, Korea has been divided into two spheres of influence between Russia and the United States. Behind the tragedy of this country caught in the net of international power politics, he said, lies the most hopeful potential of any nation of Asia. Korea is one of the rich areas of the earth's surface. Dr. Kwak climbed, and with the inherent qualities of its people, it could provide the Orient with an example of democratic and prosperous living. The effects of the two years of divided rule have set back Korean economic development, he said, and its future status is still untried. Korea's foreign trade is an important factor in her economy, he noted. Before the second World War, 90 per cent of it was between Japan and Manchuria. This has been wiped out, he said, and in order to raise the country's standard of living foreign trade must be increased. Dr. Kwak recommended that a Korean sovereign government be established, the prompt admission of Korean currency to international exchange, and that Korea be a member of the World Bank and the United Nations.

J. Shaw Awarded Harvard Scholarship

Joseph Herbert Shaw, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Alden Shaw of Nine Mile Road, was recently awarded a Harvard College freshman scholarship by the Harvard Club of Michigan. The scholarship amounts to the tuition for Harvard for one year. If a high scholastic average is maintained the scholarship is renewable. Joseph has attended Detroit Country Day school and was graduated from there in June. Joseph's father and brother, Charles, are alumni of Harvard University. The latter was graduated cum laude from there and is now employed by General Electric Co. in Syracuse, New York as a test engineer in electronics. Another brother of Joseph's, Daniel is going to be a junior at Harvard in the fall.

Cleaners Lease Space from Boyd Brothers

Famous Cleaners of Detroit have signed a five year lease with the Boyd Brothers Roofing and Heating Company for store space to establish a pick-up dry cleaning store. It is reported that the cleaners hope to occupy their new quarters by about July 1. The Boyd Brothers are partitioning their building and their entrance will be the north door of the building. Their displays will be arranged in the rear of the building.

Denton Reports Small Child Bitten by Dog

Five-year old Charles Hix of 114 Rayson street last Friday was bitten in the ear by a black and white dog of an unknown owner, according to Chief of Police Joe Denton. The child is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Hix and is being treated by Dr. V. George Chabot. The dog is in the pound under observation. Chief of Police Denton is asking that parents warn their children not to play on street corners, as it is hazardous to drivers when they are trying to make right hand turns. The Chief also asks that bicyclists observe the same rules that motorists do to avoid accidents. They are urged to give the same signals as operators of cars.

The Northville Recreation baseball team, composed of seventh and eighth grade boys, took two games in a row during the past week, winning from Salem and South Lyon. The Salem team, which was defeated by the score of 4-7, will seek revenge today. Friday, on their home field in a return game with the local team. A well played game which provided plenty of thrills took place Saturday with the South Lyon team. Northville scored two runs in the first inning and one in the third but during the fourth inning South Lyon boys put across three runs tying up the ball game. The score remained tied at 3 all until the eighth, when a local hit in the winning run, making the score 4-3.

Two Northville Men Get Masters' Degrees

Northville people who received degrees from the University of Michigan last Saturday were Samuel Kingsley Stephens Jr. of Orchard Drive and Wayne Arnold Falan of Six Mile Road. A Master of Business Administration degree was awarded Kay Stephens, and a Master of Arts degree was given Wayne Falan. U. of M. conferred 326 degrees in Saturday's exercises, which was the largest graduating class in its history. Students were graduated from every state in the Union except Delaware, and from 35 foreign countries. Due to the rain, the exercises were held indoors at Yost Field House, where a capacity crowd gathered to hear Senator James Fulbright of Arkansas deliver the Commencement address.

Number of Rural Phones Increased

Installation of the 50,000th rural telephone in its territory since VJ-Day was announced today by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company. J. R. Saxton, manager for the company, said the gain since 1945, has brought the total number of telephones in Michigan Bell's rural area to the 130,000 mark. Pointing out that the 50,000 gain since VJ-Day equaled the company's entire rural "telephone population" before the war, Saxton said the relative demand for service in farm areas today is ahead of that in urban centers.

The extent of that demand is shown by the fact that we started the year 1947 with 12,000 on the waiting list in our rural territory and ended the year with 13,000—despite an increase of 16,000 in the number of rural telephones in service during the year," Saxton said.

The heavy rural demand was attributed by Theodore H. Dawson, head of Michigan Bell's farm line development program, to the company's liberal construction plan under which farm lines are being built and to improve rural service, together with the known increase in farm income.

Under a plan established in 1940 and further liberalized two years ago, no charge is made for construction up to one-half mile of arm line. Thus, telephone service is available to 95 per cent of the rural families in the company's territory without any construction charge.

Dawson also cited the extension of dial service in rural areas as a reduction in overloaded farm lines. The company's twin objective, he said, is to achieve 100 per cent dial operation and to reduce the number of parties on rural lines to a maximum of eight. Today, only 74 per cent of Michigan Bell rural lines have more than that number.

In addition to its own lines, Michigan Bell provides switching service for some 480 user-owned companies with 6,450 telephones in rural areas. Their facilities are gradually being improved in a cooperative program in which Michigan Bell provides technical counsel.

Coolman, Stalker Named to Board

Robert Coolman and George Stalker were elected to serve as trustees on the Northville school board for a three year term in Monday's annual school election. A total of 112 ballots were cast at the Village Hall. The voting was as follows—Robert Coolman 92, George Stalker 69, and Dr. V. George Chabot 43. Robert Coolman replaces Eural Clark who has served nine years on the board, both as a trustee and as treasurer. George Stalker was re-elected to the board. The annual school meeting, presided over by George Stalker, was held in the High school gymnasium Monday evening with a very small crowd in attendance. Motions were made to accept the Secretary and Treasurer's reports and to have them printed in the Northville Record. These will appear in a later issue of the Record.

Russell H. Amerman, school superintendent, gave an oral report of conditions in the school district.

Mr. Amerman stated that seventy per cent of the income for the next school year or about \$145,000 will be from state funds. The remaining thirty per cent, or about \$55,000 is to come from local taxation. Elementary tuition under the new state act, Mr. Amerman explained, will amount to \$18,500 and the High school tuition will total about \$46,000.

Church School To Open Monday

The Community Vacation Church School opens Monday, June 21 at 9:00 a. m. and continues through July 2. Registration will be completed on the first day at the church house. Parents of nursery and beginning age children are asked to remain until their child is registered or pin a name tag to the child's coat or dress. Children in the Primary department will meet at the Methodist Church House after the first day.

All boys and girls from three to fourteen years of age may attend the school. The program includes Bible study, craft work, recreation and worship. Miss Marcella Ladd will direct the school.

VFW Delegates at State Convention

The new driver training course to the High school was discussed. Fifty teen-agers and adults were trained, with all of them receiving their driver permits at the conclusion of the course of instruction. Mr. Amerman announced that due to the popular demand for the course, it would again be offered next fall. Three recent trends in education were pointed out by Mr. Amerman. They were: 1. Schools are now employing teachers on a twelve month basis. Two of these months, he explained, are given over to curricula planning, school camps, and in-service training of teachers. 2. Schools are now beginning to operate their own radio stations. 3. Teachers are beginning to serve in the capacity of advisors for recruiting young men and women for the teaching profession.

At the conclusion of the meeting the new members of the board, together with the old members decided to hold an organizational meeting of the board within the next ten days for the purpose of electing new officers for the new year, beginning July 1st.

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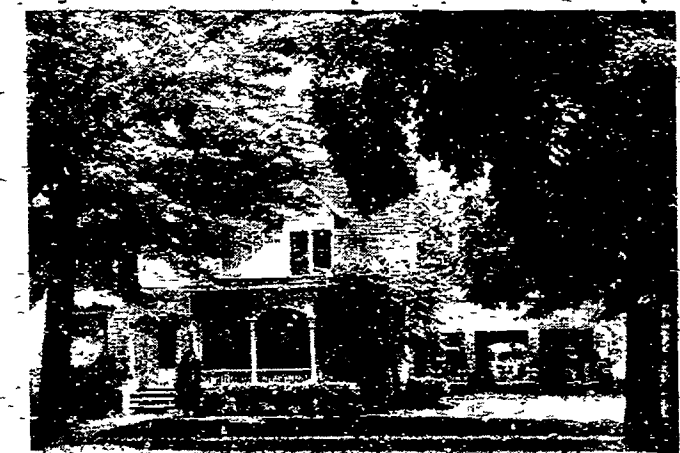
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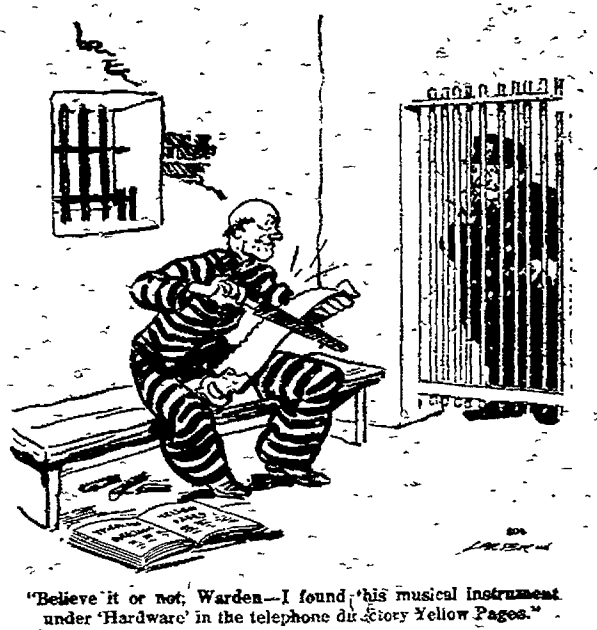

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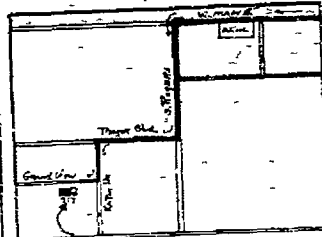
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Northville's Yesterdays

A handful of Michigan's 100-plus state governmental units, targets recently of the crusading Governor Kirt Siger, are about to be merged into a new state department of administration at Lansing.

Therein lies predicament for John A. Perkins.

Perkins, capable budget director, will become head of the new department at a salary of \$12,000 a year. An appointee of the governor, subject to confirmation by the State Senate, he will have considerable authority as state controller.

Perkins' predicament is a result of several public illusions. He is expected to perform a miracle, and he can't do it.

As evidenced by the voters' diversion of state sales tax money to local governments by constitutional amendment, the public apparently persists in a belief that the State of Michigan is rolling in money and a parallel belief that consolidation of 100 state units into 18 or 20 would automatically save a lot of money.

Perkins, like Governor Siger, knows well that the state government is not blessed with an abundance of dollars. In fact, a deficit of \$14,000,000 is clearly forecast.

for the end of the 1948-49 fiscal year. Only another rise in the post-war inflation, boosting prices still higher, can avert a deficit.

Perkins also has no illusion that he can deliver the miracle of economy.

The state legislature authorizes public services. His department will administer only a few of them, and all within appropriations as made by legislators.

It is the belief of Perkins that the chief benefit of the new department will be greater efficiency. He does not expect to achieve economy through reduction of legislative appropriations. In this, he is very much a realist.

"Greater value received for the tax dollar is our chief objective," Perkins explains. "If anything, we probably shall need more money than heretofore. The budget staff has been notably understaffed for years. We should test products which the state buys to make sure we get our money's worth in quality.

"Michigan's administration department is almost an exact duplicate of the principal reform achieved by Stassen when he was governor of Minnesota. The Minnesota department is a model which we may well follow."

The new department takes over some of the duties formerly administered by the state administrative board comprising eight elective state officials, each with his own primary responsibilities. It will have five divisions: Budget, purchasing, accounting, building, engineering - management, motor transport, and office services.

Purchasing of all state supplies, equipment, and printing will be handled by the department. Warrants for disbursement of state funds to buy for goods or services shall be drawn and issued by the auditor general upon the certification by the controller. The auditor general will handle post-audit spot checks to determine how departments and institutions are spending money as appropriate to the legislature.

"More for your money" is perhaps the best way to illustrate what Perkins hopes to accomplish. Don't expect any magic of economy through reduction of legislative appropriations.
