Northville Ford Valve Plant Is Division's Oldest Factory

The Ford Motor Company Valve Plant, 235 E. Main, Northville, is the oldest plant in the Ford Motor Company's Parts and Equipment Division. The plant was established September 8, 1919 on the site occupied, for about 50 years by the Union Manufacturing Company, a wood-working concern, according to Carl Bryan, Plant Accountant. The Ford Company began production in Northville early in 1920. Tractor valves were the first product, but in March of that year, the manufacture of Model T valves was begun, and continued for eight years turning out 1,500,000 per month.

In 1936 the present building was erected and production began in August, on V-8 valves. The manufacture of valve guide bushings was begun in 1941, and these are the two products now produced by the Northville plant.

The plant employs 475 people at the present time. Edmon M. Flaherty is the plant superintendent. He is assisted by Joseph Bajak and Claude Baker, Plant Accountant. C. G. Byron and John Barry are the Chief Inspectors. The Company grounds cover seven acres, which include the recreation field, used by the Northville Recreation Club. The valve plant manufactures valves for use in six and eight cylinder motors, tractors, Autolines and Lincoln automobiles and valve guide bushings.

The plant uses a silicon chrom steel casting furnished by the Rouge Plant foundry. They also keep a supply of valves from the Eaton Manufacturing Company. The company is experimenting with an extruded valve.

The employees work on two shifts, from 7:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. and from 3:30 to 12:00 p. m.

The plant operates on 1200 horse power, 35-H.P. of which is supplied by a waterwheel and the rest by the Detroit Edison Company. The water turns the wheel comes through an underground aqueduct from a dam down the creek from the plant. A steamotive engine was installed when the new building was constructed. This source of power was replaced by Detroit Edison in 1946.

When the rough castings come to the plant, they are in the shape of the valves, and the Northville workers trim them to the necessary size and exact shape.

The first operation in the work is a rough inspection in which workers examine the castings for visible defects before grinding is begun. The rough grinding is an automatic process done by special machines. This step requires a liquid coolant which also acts as a lubricating agent. This coolant is supplied to all the machines by one pump. In the straightening process, the red hot valves are picked up by a machine which puts them through a dye and straightens the head with the stem.

Another grinding process is the semi-grind which is done by hand. Following the grindings, the Ford mark is rolled onto the head of the valve. The last step is cutting off of the stems to within 1/1000 of an inch and the size is marked on.

The final inspections include testing the valves with a machine for concentricity, cracks and other defects. Then they are gauged for length and marked with the proper color to show what size they are. These inspections take place in a room in which the temperature is kept at 78 degrees.

The valves are put in bins and packed in boxes with special

racks. The boxes are put on a pallet and wrapped with tape and shipped by trucks to the Rouge Plant which distributes them over the

The process of grinding and inspections.

The plant keeps 15 men busy with a machine repair shop in the rear of the building. They have a laboratory where they test the water each morning.

The stockroom keeps a record of approximately 3,000 articles, with complete descriptions. Once each week an auditor comes to the plant and gives the stock a spot-check of every 50 pieces. There have been no errors in the room for the six months and Mr. Bryan reports that their record has been so good that there will be no annual inventory this year. A record is kept of all pieces come in out of the plant.

A time keeper checks the time of the workers with the time they punch on their time cards. She reconciles these figures and keeps them in order.

During the World War II the Ford plant ran three full shifts seven days a week, turning out as many as 100 persons. Among the many new articles, they manufactured during that period were valve guide bushings, used in replacement tank parts, and Pratt and Whitney Whirlwind motor parts. A special creation was received by the plant personnel from the War Department for the work.

Rotary Horse Show Hailed a Success

Northville's enterprising Rotary Club, under the leadership of general chairman, Roy Elliott, put on one of the best horse shows seen this year in Michigan. The huge entry and their riders were top quality in all classes. From the preliminary class to the final championships, the show was reported a huge success.

Given a flawless ride over the jumps by young Dick Gray, Lady Luck, the beautiful 8 year-old bay mare of Cloud Gray, Bloomfield Hills, took top honors at the show when she won the Junior Championship. This is the eighth consecutive championship for Lady Luck and Dick Gray.

Teen-age Donna DiMarco, the daughter of the Rocco DiMarcos of Bloomfield Hills, took her chestnut gelding, Jack Lee over the hurdles to win the Hunter Championship and brought the capacity crowd at the show to their feet with her superb exhibition of horsemanship.

The third most popular event of the championship finals was the five gaited championship class. This event carried, in addition to the \$500.00 prize money the William Cansfield Memorial Trophy, donated by the Northville Rotary Club in memory of the late William H. Cansfield. Mr. McGillicuddy, owned and ridden by Stanley Kirk, stepped off his gaites in perfect style to nose out Wells Adair for the coveted trophy and the championship in this class.

In the Junior three gaited class, Vanya Herself, owned by Mrs. Pearl Newton was declared the champion. In this champion fine harness stake, Sweater Girl, owned and driven by J. A. Byerly took the crown. The big flat foot Trotter, Wilbur, owned by Don McMillan took the Walking horse championship. The three gaited champion was the beautiful "Queen of the Ring" Rose Denmark, owned by Dana Farms and handled by Howard Dickey.

Northville came into its own when the Morgan class entered the ring. This was the largest and finest Morgan class shown in this part of the country this year. This was very closely contested, Verma's Laddie, owned by Milo Dugan finally getting the blue ribbon in the million division, and Gerald Taft's Spangbrook Farm taking honors in the mare class with Rosella. Verran's Lady and Rosella also placed one, two, in Morgans under saddle. These Morgans, along with practically the entire entry, were Northville owned and bred horses.

The show, under the management of the general chairman, Roy Elliott of Northville, was smoothly run from start to finish and was an unqualified success. The show, with a record breaking entry of 501 contestants throughout the three days was the greatest horse show in Northville's long history of horse shows. Mr. Elliott, speaking for the Northville Rotary Club, states that the outstanding cooperation of the entire village made this show almost a civic enterprise.

The Rotary Club, with its usual generosity to charitable undertakings, are donating most of the profits to the Detroit Institute of Cancer Research.

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Detroit Edison Grants Pay Raise

Wages and salaries of employees of The Detroit Edison Company will be raised, effective July 26, 1948. This general increase applies to both represented and non-represented employees and provides for an 11c an hour increase for trades and operating employees and a 9c increase for weekly salaried employees.

Wage increases for union-represented employees were negotiated with three local unions representing about one-half of the company's 10,000 employees. The locals are B-17 and B-1325 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, AFL, and Local 223 Unity Workers of America, CIO.

Walker L. Cislser, executive vice president, stated that these increases will add about \$9,000,000 a year to the present payroll of \$36,000,000.

Mr. Chanteleis had spent the greater share of his life as a trainer and driver of horses. He had driven horses at the Downs for several years.

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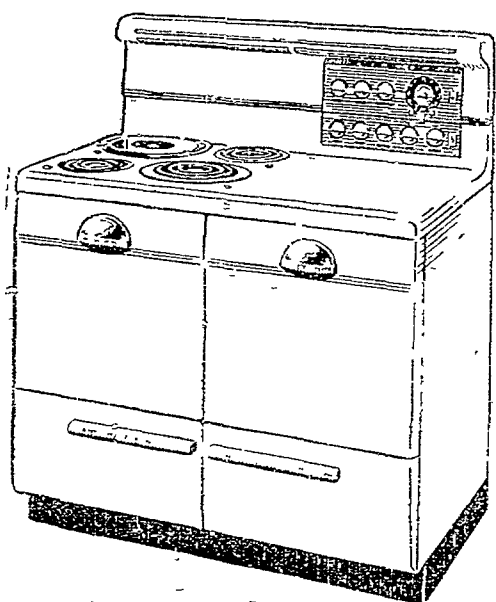
