Body Returned for Military Re-Burial

Remains of 5,801 American who in Union lives during World War II have been returned to the United States from Europe aboard the United States Army transport, L. W. C. Victory, the Department of the Army announced. Among the remains returned to the United States at the request of next of kin for reburial was 2nd Lieutenant Elmer P. Koontz, of the Army Infantry.

Second Lieutenant Koontz was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lark E. Koontz of 610 Randolph Street, and he was twenty-four years of age when he lost his life somewhere in Germany, November 23, 1944. Upon arrival of Lieut. Koontz's body at Newark, Ohio, reburial services will be conducted there and interment will be made in the family plot.

Surviving besides his parents are three brothers of the home, William, George, and Richard Koontz.

Armed forces dead originally interred in temporary military cemeteries in France are among those brought back to this country.

A total of 222 remains were returned upon instructions of next of kin residing in Michigan.

The Army stated that each next of kin was notified in advance of the arrival of the vessel, and will be notified again after arrival of the remains at the regional Distribution Centers of the American Graves Registration Service.

Under the program for final burial of World War II dead next of kin may elect to have remains returned to the United States for burial in a private or national cemetery or may request interment in a permanent American Military cemetery overseas or a private cemetery in a foreign country which is the home of the deceased or of the next of kin.

New Records Are Set at the Downs

Harness racing under the lights rapidly is becoming one of the popular major sports in Michigan, and is bringing new fame to this section of the country, as well as making it the center of the standard-bred horse industry.

Proof of this is seen in the new popularity of Northville Downs, which this season is breaking all records. For the first three weeks of the season the mutual wagering, as recorded by the American Totalisator System, first used in Michigan, was \$3,248,067. For the "similar" period of the 1947 season the "handle" was but \$2,794,192, according to John J. Carroll, secretary and treasurer.

Much of the increased popularity of the sport here is due to the favorable public comment on the new improvements this year. The press throughout the state is heralding the track as the most attractive and best equipped racing course in this entire section of the country.

The trappers are proving a gold mine to the State of Michigan, too. For the first three weeks of the 10-week meeting under the lights, Northville Downs contributed \$95,052.26 to the state coffers.

The average daily handle this year through the American tote system is \$182,449, about \$30,000 a night ahead of last year's average.

An additional 1500 new seats have been installed to care for the increased crowds.

Scottish Visitors Depict Conditions

Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Woodworth of Plymouth are entertaining Mr. and Mrs. Alex St. Clair of Scotland, who report that economic conditions there are still very serious. Mrs. Woodworth will be remembered here in the village as the daughter of Frank H. Hall of North Center Street.

The St. Clairs, who are distant relatives of the Woodworths and Lamills, came from Scotland, Scotland which is some six hundred miles north of London. They report that food is still scarce and clothing is still rationed.

The ration book is valid to the store each week and had on the counter for the clerk who reports the week's points. Points for that period will buy 2 oz. bacon, 1 egg, 1 pound sugar, 1 oz. tea, 2 oz. butter or 4 oz. oil, 1 oz. lard, 3 1/2 pounds potatoes, and 1 lb. meat.

Thirty-six points for clothing is allowed for a six month's period. It takes 21 to 26 points for a man's suit, 7 for shoes, 7 for overalls, and 7 for a house dress. The St. Clairs say that the average man's salary is forty-three cents an hour or \$20.00 a week. Corn on the cob is unknown in Scotland, they say. Tomatoes and fruit are a luxury; a peach cost more than a dollar.

"Wonderful, wonderful", is the only way Mr. and Mrs. St. Clair can express their surprise and amazement at the United States' large stores. They say that there is nothing like it, even in London.

Each member brought ten of their prize chickens to the fair and they were auctioned off Saturday evening. With the money 1000 more will be purchased and given to 10 more members next year. Kahlbauer Bros. plan to give 1000 besides this so 2000 baby chicks will be given to 20 4-H members next year. Kahlbauer Bros. gave special prizes. James Anderson from Northville received first place and was awarded a gold cup and \$20.00. William Krueger from Romulus, 2nd place \$10.00; Roberts Schmidts from Northville 3rd place \$5.00. Philip Dingeldey from Wayne 4th place \$2.50. Mildred Dwyer from Wayne 5th place 2.50.

Wayne county will be represented at the State 4-H Club Show by 23 4-H boys and girls, Marie Wolfe, County 4-H Club Agent announced this week. Northville will be represented by James Anderson who will exhibit his prize leghorn chickens.

This show, scheduled from August 31 to September 3 will be held at Michigan State College in East Lansing.

Officials estimate a record number of exhibits and more than 1,400 animals which the 4-H members will bring to the show.

The Northville school system will begin its fall term Friday, September 10 at 8:30 a. m.

Grade School Registration. Registration for the Grade school will be held next Monday and Tuesday, August 30 and 31 from 9:00 a. m. to 12 noon, and from 1:00 p. m. to 4:00 p. m.

Only those youngsters who have never before attended Grade school in Northville from grades one through six, states E. V. Ellison, principal should register.

Parents whose children will enter kindergarten and have not registered should do so at this time. These parents should bring their child's birth certificate with them.

High School Registration. Registration for grades nine through 12 will take place Monday and Tuesday, August 30 and 31, from 9:00 to 12 noon and from 1:00 to 4:00 p. m. All new students to Northville High school should register Monday and all others are asked to register on Tuesday.

Students who will attend the seventh and eighth grades need not register until the first day of school, September 10, according to Mrs. Ida B. Cocke, Junior High school principal.

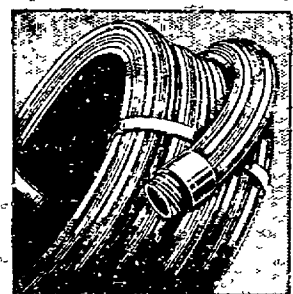

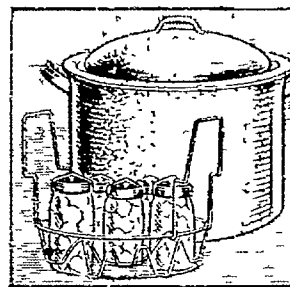

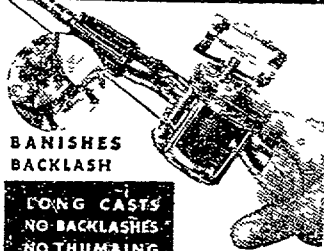

It was on that day that American and Japanese officers gathered on the deck of the Battleship "Missouri" in Tokyo bay to sign the articles of surrender.

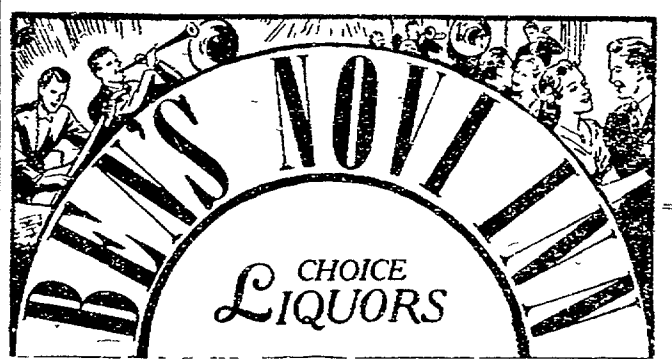

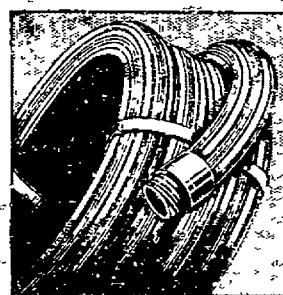

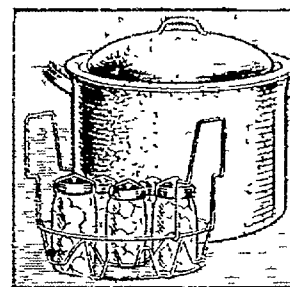

It was on that day that American and Japanese officers gathered on the deck of the Battleship Missouri in Tokyo bay to sign the articles of surrender.

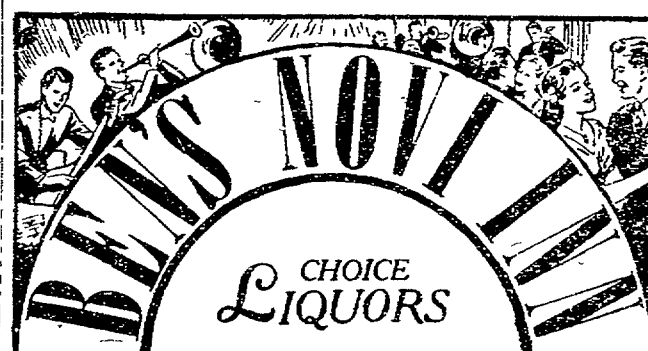
It was then that Americans hung themselves into a joyful frenzy of celebration over the brand new peace.

GRAYLING—A "new look" has arrived at 70,000-acre Camp Grayling Training Center of the Michigan National Guard.

Approximately 2,500 teen-age youths, most of them just out of high school, are getting their first experience in military training here.

When Congress resorted to compulsory military training (Selective Service) as the only effective way of manning the army and navy, the National Guard was given a preferred status. Youths who enlisted in State Troops were exempted from the draft.

Like having a gold rush on its hands, the Michigan National Guard recruited 2,500 teen-agers in 30 days. Total enrollment soared to 7,300, an all-time record. The troops arrived at Lake Michigan last week in more than 1,000 motor vehicles, and 200 rail road cars. They were reviewed last Saturday (August 14) by Governor Kim Sigler and Major General Ralph A. Loveland and this Saturday (August 21) following a week of over-night bivouacs and field exercises, the troops will depart for home.

The "new look" at Camp Grayling is as fresh as today's newspaper headlines.

Youth is getting its first peacetime military training as a part of national security. The atmosphere is hardly that of a holiday.

Col. Edward R. Roberts, Senior U. S. Army instructor on duty here, diplomatically pointed out

that National Guard divisions were not given "soft jobs" in World War II. The 46th Army Division (Oklahoma) suffered the second highest casualty rating in the war during its service in Italy and Europe. The 32nd Division (Michigan-Wisconsin) was first in action in the southwest Pacific, while the 29th Division (Mary-

The ground units at Grayling comprise the 46th Infantry Division. The air units are part of the Tenth Air Force.

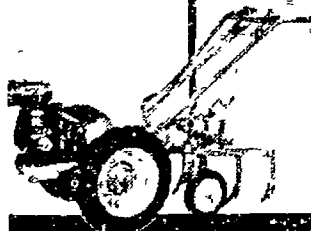

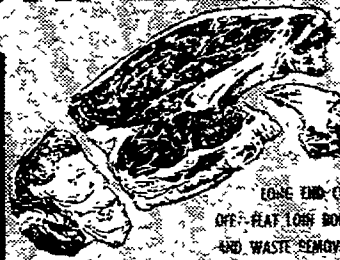
