### Hospital Project Makes Headlines

The proposed state mental hospital, to be built on Seward Mile Road, has come in for its share of comment again. Arnold J. Levin, Detroit News writer, Sunday, wrote an article on the state legislature's controversy over it.

Michigan health officials see an unhealthy parallel in the construction of the power plant for the \$20,000,000 Northville State Hospital, planned to provide care for thousands of mentally ill in the Detroit area and the power plant for the women's prison begun twenty-five years ago at Okemos, near Lansing, the article relates.

The legislature at that time refused to appropriate any more funds for the buildings and the plant smokestacks eventually were disposed of by a Michigan State college class in dynamiting.

Michigan health officials hope that the State hospital smokestacks won't be blown up, the article continues, as the result of tactics of some out-state senators.

The project was authorized in 1946 and \$2,000,000 was appropriated at that time for the power plant and the purchase of the land. Since then, the legislature has bitterly battled to a standstill over the further construction of the hospital.

The power plant work still continues on under a legislative mandate, and John A. Perkins, controller of the new Department of Administration Work at the Northville site, the article explains, has amounted to \$1,897,600, but the state has only paid out \$695,576.

Perkins said that if the project were abandoned right now, the state would lose most of the money invested in the project. But more than that, Perkins continued, the state would lose five years of planning and preparation. Since the legislature has not definitely decided what to do about the hospital, he continued, we are continuing on the contracts awarded.

It may be assumed that if the 1949 legislature stands by the Northville hospital, the present policy will have gained time, because of the period required to construct and equip power plants. It will be remembered that opposition to the hospital has centered in the Senate which suddenly sought to abandon the project while the House voted funds to start the first treatment unit.

The future of the hospital rests with Governor Kim Sigler's special 14 member legislative committee which has been appointed to study the mental health situation and prepare recommendations for the January legislative sessions.

Mental health authorities emphasized that in the Detroit area alone where 60 per cent of the State's 6,000,000 population reside, there are only two State-owned hospitals. Reflecting on that, the article concludes the sponsors of the Northville project hope that its power plant won't fail to a new college class in dynamiting.

The former Manse of the First Presbyterian Church is to be moved this week from the church property and it is to become a two family dwelling. Purchased by Mr. J. M. Osborne of Church Street it is to be moved to a site on the Northville - Plymouth Road. The old ten room dwelling will be made into two apartments.

Original plans were to move the building to the West side of town but due to its size and the old trees that line West Main Street the project was abandoned. The new Manse is at 542 W. Main Street, the former H. G. Rackham home.

To give the century old church a more spacious setting the moving of the Manse has been considered for many years. Plans are under way to landscape the corner which will make an impressive sight upon entering the business area of the town.

### Dondero Discusses 80th Congress

At Tuesday noon's Rotary Club luncheon meeting, the Honorable George A. Dondero, member of the United States House of Representatives, was the guest speaker. Introduced by T. R. Carrington, Mr. Dondero spoke on the recent activities of the 80th session of Congress.

Eleven thousand eight hundred and forty-one bills were introduced in the last session of Congress, he said, but of this multitude of acts, only 900 were written on to the United States statute books.

Dondero considered three laws:

1. Control of pollution in fresh water streams.
2. Repairing and building new roads.
3. Temporary housing for G.I.s at colleges and universities.

The law which controls pollution of fresh water streams in the country, he said, is a cautious approach to public health and sanitation, guarding human lives, and those of fish and wild animals.

Pointing out that there is a call for every four persons in the U. S. today, Dondero said that the law provides a two year extended program in which the federal government matches state government funds for repairing and building new roads.

Temporary housing, constructed during the war, under the new housing act, he said, can be moved to colleges throughout the country for use of married veterans who are taking advantage of the G. I. education plan.

Dondero next considered the loyalty pacts going on in Washington. D. C. He explained that the House of Representatives set up its own committee on un-American activities because the FBI can only gather information on each activities but cannot convey it to Congress. The FBI, he stated, can only give information to the Department of Justice.

The founders of our country, Dondero said, did not want our country to become a social agency, but wanted it to remain a government of individual freedom. If America is to be preserved and if we are to pass on to posterity what our forefathers have given us, he concluded, we must stamp out the ugly head of Communism.

Later that same afternoon, the fire truck was called to Cadillac street and Five Mile Road, just east of Bradner Road, to extinguish another grass blaze. This grass fire was also expediently extinguished.

### New Offices for Social Security

Readers of the Northville Record will be pleased to learn of the opening of a new Social Security office in Northwest Detroit at 12065 Wyoming Avenue at the corner of Grand River.

Opening on September 1, the office will handle all social security matters. These include the filing of claims for payments of benefits to retired workers and their families, as well as to survivors of workers who die after having been employed in jobs covered by Social Security. Monthly social security payments and lump-sum death benefits are handled by the new office.

In addition the office issues new social security cards, and replacement for lost and worn-out cards. Inquiries regarding all social security questions are handled, including those arising from changes in name, records, and wage problems. The telephone number of the new office is TE 5-1750.

Named as manager of the office is Hal Bultuck, with the Social Security Administration since 1937. In a statement to the Northville Record Bultuck said, "Opening this office is in line with the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance policy of bringing Social Security closer to the people we serve. We invite the public to make the widest possible use of the facilities we have to offer."

Bultuck also added that there would be no change in taxpayer service. A representative from his office will be at the Plymouth Post Office the second Thursday of the month at eleven a. m. The date for the next visit is September 9.

### Dog Quarantine Extended a Month

Dr. V. George Chabot, Northville's Health Officer announces that the dog quarantine has been extended from August 31 to September 30. This action has resulted, he said, from the current rabid dog threat throughout the community.

Officials throughout this community met at the Plymouth City Hall last Wednesday to discuss the problem and to extend the county quarantine date.

Dr. Barrett, of Wayne County's Department of Health, said that one case of rabies had been reported in Redford Township, nine cases in Livonia, ten cases in Canton, one case in the City of Plymouth, two in Plymouth Township, five in Northville township and the Village of Northville.

It was pointed out at the meeting that Northville has a group vaccination program which has been proved quite successful. Under this system, on designated days, owners of dogs take their animals to a central point where a veterinarian vaccinates them for a small fee. It was pointed out that this helps cope with the rabid dog problem.

### 1000 Attend Political Rally at Hettche Farm

President Truman and Attorney General Clark were welcomed Sunday by Santa Fe, Ford and Humphrey the inquiry into loyalty of Federal employees.

Ferguson was introduced to the more than 1,000 Republicans attending the rally by Louis J. Colombo, Detroit attorney Gov. Sigler, Republican State Chairman John A. Wagner and National Committeeman Arthur E. Summerfield were among invited guests—Detroit News Sunday.

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## THE FARMER'S MARKET

LELAND—This is a tale of nostalgia.

It is a story about J. Lee Barrett, Detroit's suave No. 1 ambassador and promoter of civic superlatives—manager of the Detroit Convention and Tourist Bureau, and his vacation retreat on South Manitou Island on Lake Michigan.

We viewed the distant outline of the Manitous—North and South—from a window of Karl Detzer's print shop here at Leland.

In the foreground are fishermen's weatherworn docks and shacks. A baldheaded man, bronze with tan, had set up his easel to paint. A family was having a picnic in the village park where a charcoal iron smelter once stood. Children were playing on a sandy shore, for the waters of Lake Michigan are numbing cold. Hundreds of gulls swarmed noisily about wood pilings that line the narrow harbor entrance.

Between this tranquil scene and the faint silhouette of South Manitou are 18 miles of blue water.

Tracy Grosvenor, mail boat skipper, knows the Manitous. His conversation about life on the islands was a pleasant relief from lingering troubled memories of teen age boys undergoing military training at Grayling.

"Back in 1908 my father was a logger on North Manitou," said Tracey at the wheel. "Before then the island had a popular summer lodge for Chicago tourists. Many times the dining room served 100 people. When the lumberman came in 1908 for a second timber harvest, the tourists left. Years later the island was acquired by William R. Angell, former President of the Continental Motor Company of Detroit and Muskegon and Roger Sherman, Chicago attorney. They operate it now as a sportmen's club and cherry farm."

We stopped at North Manitou to deliver parcel of food and to pick up two bags of cherries for the East Graft. Then we journeyed on to South Manitou where a natural harbor, curved like a new moon, is prized by sailors as being the best in Lake Michigan.

The boat trip from Leland is slow—two hours and a half. August Warner, Deputy Sheriff, met us at the South Manitou dock. We climbed aboard his 1928 model A Ford. The chugging ride up a reflected two mile trail was reminiscent of granddaddy's time.

## Second Annual Rural Health Conference To Be Held September 16 - 17

"All rural people who are interested in improving the health of their communities are cordially invited to attend the second annual Michigan Rural Health Conference to be held on the campus of Michigan State College, East Lansing, Michigan, September 16-17," announced H. B. Zemmer, M.D., Lapeer, Chairman of the Conference.

Under the Honorary Chairmanship of Governor Kim Sigler, the Conference will feature addresses by leading rural health authorities, discussion groups, and panel discussions with audience participation. This Conference, which has been acclaimed by farm and medical leaders as "being of vital importance to the health of rural people" is sponsored by the Michigan State Medical Society and co-sponsored by thirty-nine other organizations which are actively working to better the health of rural people.

To Develop Health Program Planned as a "working conference," the two-day session will make plans to improve health standards and expand medical facilities in farm areas and cutting districts, according to Dr. Zemmer.

The program will be divided into four main sections. Section I, "Planning for Healthy Communities" will include such topics

as community health councils, health programs of rural organizations, local health department activity, and disease control programs. Section II, "Modern Medicine in Rural Michigan" will discuss bringing and holding physicians in rural areas, education in health for rural people, mental health in Michigan, and nursing and other medical associates. Section III, "Dollars and Disease" embraces subjects such as voluntary prepaid group medical and hospital service, the hospital survey and construction program, aid to the medically indigent, and contributions of voluntary health organizations. Section IV, "Youth in the March of Health" will deal with dental care, child guidance clinics, prevention of children's diseases, and school health programs.
