A & P Announces Retirement Plan

In a letter to more than 110,000 employees of the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, John A. Hartford, president, announced today that the company had adopted a retirement plan.

Entire cost of the retirement plan will be borne by the company and no employee will be required to contribute. Some details of the program, tentatively scheduled to become effective October 1, still remain to be worked out, but all full-time employees who have completed five years of service automatically become members. Those with shorter periods of service become members as soon as they have completed five years with the company.

The retirement plan is in line with the company's policy of sharing with its employees and customers savings brought about by efficiencies in the field of food distribution. It was the first in that field to adopt a five-day work week for food store employees, insurance and other benefits.

In the letter to employees Mr. Hartford said:

Local Horses Win National Honors

At the great National Morgan Horse Show, held at Windsor, Vermont, last week, where more than 200 Morgans from all parts of the United States competed, Northville entries captured 10 ribbons in the various events.

Top honors to the Northville bred Morgan horses went to Gerald Taff's Springbrook Linda Lee who took reserve Grand Champion Yearling Mare after qualifying for the grand championship class by taking the blue ribbon in the yearling mare class. In this same class Vaughn Groom's Abbington of Shady Lawn was judged the 4th place Grand Champion. Springbrook Farns Rosella took 4th in the mares and geldings class, 5th in the model mare class as well as 4th in the fine harness class.

Just another Springbrook entry, went 5th in the stallions-with-get class and 2nd in the performance class, an unusual event that requires the horse to ride by itself, drive in harness, and pull a 1600 pound loaded team boat. The final blue ribbon was won by Springbrook Rosella in the model mare class.

This was the first time in the long history of the National Morgan Show that Morgans from Michigan went down this Michigan entry went from Gerald Taff's Springbrook Farns and Vaughn Groom's Shady Lawn Farm, both Northville breeding establishments devoted exclusively to Morgan horses. This section has become one of the three leading Morgan breeding areas in the nation, ranking along with Vermont and California.

Blue Star Mothers Tag Day Sept. 18

The Northville Chapter of the Blue Star Mothers, under the direction of Mrs. Dora Miller, President, will hold their annual Tag Day in the Village Saturday, September 18. All benefits derived from the sale of tags goes to maintenance of the Blue Star Mothers Rehabilitation Lodge, Indian Lake Lodge, 14 miles northeast of Pontiac. This lodge is a log house set in the midst of 87 acres of land bordering Indian Lake. It accommodates fourteen guests and is maintained for rehabilitation purposes for veterans and men and women of the service.

Next Thursday Is Nat'l Guard Day

The Nation will celebrate September 16 as National Guard Day. Established by Presidential Proclamation, that date is the eighth anniversary of the Guard's entry into Federal service before World War I.

This year, National Guard Day will also mark the end of the second year of the Guard's reorganization since the end of the war. With an ultimate strength of 684,000 men in 27 divisions, 12 wings, 21 regimental combat teams, the new National Guard will be a real M-Day Force, trained and equipped for immediate action in the event of national emergencies. In two years, the Guard has grown to 317,000 men, a strength greater than it ever had before World War I.

During this fiscal year, the Congress has set a strength ceiling of 391,000 men for the Guard. The portion of that strength ceiling allotted to the several States and their units has already been exceeded in some cases.

But the Guard still needs men. It needs men to fill existing vacancies under the ceilings. It needs men to replace the losses, which are inevitable in every voluntary organization. It needs men to be able to expand rapidly when the strength ceiling is raised at the end of the fiscal year.

The National Guard of the United States is conducting a recruiting drive during September, October and November throughout most of the country, that drive is aimed to bring units up to ceiling strength. In those areas where ceiling strength for this year has already been reached, the emphasis will be on keeping the units at ceiling strength.

Cooney Says Congress Must Cut Living Costs

Congress faces two critical problems—how to cut the high cost of living and what shall be done to preserve the American way of life, threatened as it is within the United States—according to Milton F. In discussing housing, Cooney said that he will actively back extension of FHA to aid private home-building and encourage Federal aid in promoting municipal housing projects that will allow owner occupied, taxpaying homes where such homes are not provided through private housing.

"I will support Presidential candidate Dewey in a thorough housecleaning and reorganization of the Federal government to eliminate unnecessary employees, improve its efficiency and help bring the cost of government down to earth," Cooney stated.

GLADSTONE—The man who made the "better mousetrap", 50 years ago this September, was Webster L. Marble.

The founder of the Marble Arms and Manufacturing Company, Gladstone's leading industry, proved the old adage still holds good. A world of sportsmen beat a path, through purchase of his quality hunting and fishing equipment, to this Upper Peninsula small town.

The story of Marble is the story of American opportunity. It is another Michigan Alger-to-riches chapter in the annals of frontier enterprise.

Webster L. Marble preferred his hunting camp at Round Lake, about 33 miles north and east of Gladstone, to the ease and comforts of city living.

It was in September, 1930 when he went to camp for the last time. His friends say he would have wanted it that way. He died in the woods.

The story of Webster L. Marble is a mirror of American enterprise in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan 50 years ago this September.

Rural Tele-news

THE RINGS YOU CAN'T HEAR — Many improvements in telephone service come about so gradually that it's sometimes easy to overlook the results. Take the matter of ringing on rural lines, for example. Ten years ago, nearly every rural-line telephone customer served by Michigan Bell heard the rings of all other parties on the line. The idea for the waterproof match box came to Marble while he was traveling on a train north from Grand Rapids. The new product had been instantly "during World War I" to exemplify the high percentage of total production for use of soldiers in the trenches.

At the time he had to believe that ninety per cent of Marble's products were bought by sportsmen who have no practical need for them. They want them as an

village Zoning Ordinance, as to Article XI, paragraphs 1 and 2, headed "Board of Appeals, Creation and Membership" which reads as follows: "There shall at the option of the Village Commission, be a Board of Appeals on zoning, consisting of not less than five (5) members (persons not holding any elective office) appointed by the Village Commission to serve without pay and in accordance with Sec. 5 of Act 272 of the Public Acts of Michigan for 1947 as amended. The members of the Board of Appeals shall be appointed for a term of Three (3) years provided that appointments for the first year shall be for a period of one, two and three years respectively so as nearly as may be to provide for the appointment of an equal number each year, depending on the number of members thereafter after each member to hold office for the full three year term and serve until their successors have been duly appointed. The Village Commission shall serve as and perform the function of the Board of Appeals on Zoning, provided there has been no Board of Appeals created as heretofore set out.

Section 12-01. Meetings of the Board of Appeals shall be held in the Village Hall at least once each month and at such other times as the Board may determine. Said Board shall adopt its own rules of procedure and keep a record of its proceedings showing the action of the Board and the vote of each member upon each question considered. The presence of a majority of the members shall be necessary to constitute a quorum. The concurring vote of 2/3 of the members of the Board shall be necessary to reverse any order, requirement, decision or determination of any administrative official or to decide in favor of the applicant in any matter upon which the Board is required to pass under this Ordinance or to effect any variation in such ordinance. The provisions of this amendment to said Ordinance No. 123 are hereby ordered to take effect twenty-one days after its final passage.

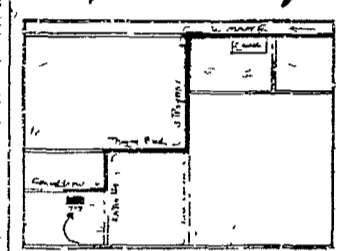

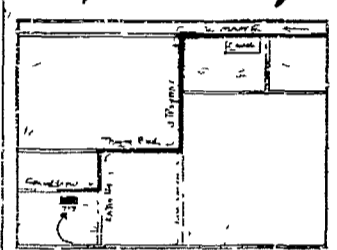
