Dr. Chabot Gives Health Statistics

Current disease statistics, as presented by Village Health Commissioner, Dr. V. George Chabot, for Northville during the months of June, July and August are as follows:

During June there were no cases of Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Smallpox, Chickenpox, Undulant Fever, Rheumatic Fever, Whooping Cough, Syphilis, Poliomyelitis or Meningitis. Two cases of Iobar Pneumonia, three cases of bronchial Pneumonia, five cases of measles and two cases of Gonorrhea were reported.

During July there was one case of bronchial Pneumonia and one case of Gonorrhea.

One case of Tuberculosis, three cases of bronchial Pneumonia, two cases of Whooping Cough and two cases of Gonorrhea were reported during August. No deaths were caused by these diseases.

The total communicable diseases reported to date are 48. There were no infant deaths, (under one year of age) and no maternal deaths during the three month period.

Dr. Chabot reports that all Northville residents, except two, conform to the laws submitted by the Wayne County Health Department.

Degrees Awarded Two Local Men

At the close of the University of Michigan Summer Session, degrees were awarded to 3,120 students. Diplomas are now being mailed to these graduates, since no formal graduation ceremonies were held in August.

Northville men who received their degrees were: Albert Jay Boelens, 77 Grand View, Master of Arts and Frank Levi Eaton, 355 Eaton Drive, Master of Business Administration.

The list of summer graduates includes students from the College of Literature, Science and the Arts, School of Education, College of Engineering, College of Architecture and Design, College of Pharmacy, School of Business Administration, School of Music, School of Public Health, and School of Graduate Studies.

Because classes in law and forestry were completed later than those in other divisions of the University, graduates from the School of Forestry and Conservation and Law School will be announced later.

1011 Enrolled In Village Schools

Northville schools enrollment reached an all-time high this year with a total of 1011 youngsters enrolled in the Grade, Junior High and High schools. Never in the history of the school system has there been over a thousand children attending the schools in any one year.

Enrollment figures for the individual grades are as follows: kindergarten, 84; first, 88; second, 87; third, 80; fourth, 71; fifth, 75; and sixth, 62. The grade school total enrollment is 547 youngsters.

Junior High enrollment totals 124 pupils with 63 in the seventh grade and 61 in the eighth grade. In the senior High school there are 110 in the ninth grade, 84 in the tenth grade, 72 in the eleventh grade, and 74 in the twelfth grade. This makes a total of 340 students in the High School.

The first few days of the school year have been spent by principals and teachers in trying to make room and desk adjustments to the unusually heavy enrollment. The three houses taken over by the school system have been fully utilized and are in use by the grade school children.

Sept. 18 Is Final Registration Date

Northville men between the ages of 18 and 25 are reminded that they must register with Selective Service Board No. 102, regardless if they have previously served with some branch of service or not, before or on September 18. The board is located at 328 North Main Street, second floor, Plymouth.

The first two local boys to register on opening day, August 30, were Frederick A. Walker of 520 Horton Street and Eugene Nipper of 53229 West Eight Mile Road. Registrations are being accepted daily except Sundays.

The board has now set up enough registration points so applicants do not have to wait in line for long periods of time. Other points of registration are Livonia Township Hall, Redford Township Hall, Brownstone Township, Flat Rock, Inkster, Wayne and Belleville.

Questionnaires have been mailed to those who registered the first week. They consist of 8 pages of information to be filled out by the applicant and returned to the Board.

Men who are away from home during the registration period are to sign up at the nearest registration office, giving their permanent address. Their registration papers will be forwarded to their local board.

Bookmobile to Serve Rural School Children

To improve the library service to the rural school children in Wayne County, the Extension Dept. of the Wayne County Library will begin the direct loaning of books to an estimated 17,000 pupils this month. Replacing a system of loaning classroom collections, which became obsolete with the growth of the rural schools, the Traveling Branch Library and the Bookmobile will make trips to 90 schools each fourth week.

This winter the boys and girls will be able to select their books from the hundreds of volumes carried on the mobile libraries, instead of from classroom collections of about 40 books which were exchanged only three or four times each year, according to Miss Katherine Ashley, librarian.

Conversion to this type of service started last winter when the Wayne County Library obtained the Bookmobile. With the present schedule, all of the schools located in sections of the county which are not near libraries will receive this service.

In Northville Township the libraries will stop regularly at the Waterford, Thayer, and Base Line schools.

The date for the annual Harvest Festival, given by the local Presbyterian Church, has been set for Thursday, October 21.

Proximity to Run Tonight at Track

The great horse, Proximity, is to show his wares at Northville Downs Friday night when he competes in the Northville Driving Club Trot, one of the two biggest feature attractions of the night racing meeting.

Shortly after leaving the Downs, Proximity, who has won more money than any horse in Europe today, will leave for the \$100,000 trot in Paris and will compete in several \$50,000 races on the continent.

Proximity has a world's record and a number of United States track records tucked away.

Royal Man, darling of the record-breaking Northville Downs crowd, won the first 1 1/2 miles stakes of the meeting last Saturday night with a blazing effort. His old rival for top honors at the track, Brucita's Guy, was pressing him. These races tracked the biggest mutual pool ever recorded on a single race at the Downs.

Last Saturday also set another record for mutual betting at the track. The night, as attested by the American Totalisator System, was the best by a long margin.

This new record is expected to fall next Friday, however, and the management forces an ever greater record when the Michigan Pacing Derby, which brings Jimmy Creed to the track is held the following Friday, September 26.

John Carlo, secretary and treasurer, has returned to Northville after going to America for the opening of the Illinois trotting track at Rock, vice-president and is back after a trip to the East.

1948 License Plates Selling at Half Price

Charles Harold Bloom who is in charge of Northville's branch of the secretary of state's office, reminds that 1948 automobile license plates are now selling at half price until the 1949 plates come out.

The drop took effect September 1. Bloom said that the State no longer issues half-year license plates as in former years, but that drivers can buy full year plates at half price after the first six months of the year.

Current plates are good until the end of February 1949 but those who require them may obtain the plates at C. H. Bloom's office on West Main Street.

All commercial vehicles require the title and weight bill before plates can be issued, Bloom said, but passenger autos require only the title.

ONE YEAR AGO

The T. P. Biddle Northville Coachline daily transported 180 grade and high school students to and from school.

GARDEN—Bill Bonifas got his start here at Garden.

The Upper Peninsula lumberman, eight times a millionaire, arrived in the Garden peninsula penniless from Luksemburg. He was a six-footer, broad-shouldered, and in his early twenties. America was the promised land of opportunity, and the Upper Peninsula was one of its frontiers.

As a lumberjack, he started to work cutting timber for Louis Van Winkle, a Dutchman who built a sawmill at Van's Harbor back in 1831. Lacking a team of horses, he carried logs out of the woods on his back. It was William Stellwagen, proprietor of a hardware store at Garden, who staked him to his first capital—\$50 worth of needed tools and equipment. Stellwagen's son, Walter, runs a modern grocery at Garden.

Bonifas built his fortune in the Garden peninsula. Perhaps his greatest find was Kate Nolan, a beautiful Irish girl whom he met here at a lumberjack boarding house. Kate, a waitress, became his wife. Bill never forgot Garden. And neither did Kate.

The Garden peninsula is one of the least known of Michigan's famed peninsulas.

In some respects, as you behold the ghost town of Fayette, a few miles south of Garden, here is a peninsula that Michigan forgot. Few tourists know about it. Travelers who venture on a good blacktop and gravel road to Garden, Fayette and Fairport usually view the abandoned village of Fayette in wonderment. Here are ten abandoned houses and a 47-window hotel, all located on a scenic promontory with a view of Lake Michigan and Snail Shell harbor nearby. Inhabitants total 11. Among these is Donald Cheren, navy veteran who runs the postoffice and builds boats during his spare time.

No sign tells the story of Fayette where good hardwood was burned to smelt iron ore more than 75 years ago. You view the ruins of the deserted town and ask yourself "What happened to bring all this about?"

The story of Bill Bonifas gives an answer.

Charles Olmstead now 82 was a foreman for Bonifas at his first camp nine miles north of Garden on the plain near Little Harbor. He related to us the history of the region. Charles helped cut in a line and set station of his son-in-law, Roy Winter, at Garden. The Garden peninsula, in those days, was covered by hardwood trees—maple, birch and larch.

Because of the harbor and limestone at Fayette and the abundance of hardwood nearby, the Jackson Iron Company of Negaunee purchased 16,000 acres of trees for \$15,000. That was in 1866. They bought land at Plumb's harbor, later called Snail Shell because of its shape, from Iram G. Squire, built limestone kilns through the peninsula to convert hardwood into charcoal, extended a narrow-gauge railroad to Fairport at the tip, and then constructed huge furnaces at Fayette to smelt the iron ore, shipped from Escanaba into pig iron for loading into sailing vessels bound for Cleveland.

It took eight days to char the hardwood in the kilns. Twenty-five bushels of charcoal were consumed in the furnaces to produce one ton of pig iron. The virgin hardwoods of the Garden peninsula were literally burned up.

Fayette was a company-owned town—houses, hotel, stores, church, dance hall and furnaces. The place was abandoned in 1889.

Bonifas' logging camp became the William Bonifas Company with three brothers—John, Jim and Isaac—as partners. When Bill left the peninsula in 1917, he threw a big party at the Garden town hall—champagne and all. Worth then about \$500,000, Bill formed the William Bonifas Lumber Company at Escanaba.

Sawmills were operated at Marquette and Lake Linden. Pulpwood operations were maintained all over the Upper Peninsula by fortunate investments Bonifas acquired large blocks of Kimberly-Clark and General Motors stocks. He was a rich man.

When Bill died several years ago he left a million dollars to build a new St. Joseph's church at Escanaba including a rectory, auditorium and gymnasium. Kate donated \$250,000 for a new public school and convent in the village of Garden. When she died early this summer she left about \$2.

Safety will be stressed in all phases in the Grand Ledge schools this year, both on the buses, on the playgrounds, in the buildings and on the streets.

A group of Plymouth merchants presented city commissioners with a petition which requests that the installation of parking meters for the municipal parking lot be depleted from the improvement plans.

In order to ascertain undesirable housing conditions as well as to prevent future ones, the city commission of Birmingham, has passed a new ordinance designed to control public housing as offered by rooming houses, tourist homes, hotels and the like.

For the fourth consecutive year, Future Farmers of America chapters at Alma and Midland high schools are winners of the Michigan "Best" Chapter contest and will represent the state FFA in the National Chapter contest at Kansas City in October.

The traffic death toll of 133 persons in July established a new high for the year; but was one less than the 134 killed during the same month in 1947, according to the monthly statistical report of the Michigan State Police. The previous high was in June, when 119 died.

Four persons were painfully injured in a one-car traffic accident on the Grand River Cut-Off near Farmington. According to reports the accident occurred when the car in which the four persons were riding ran off the road and rolled over when the driver lost control of the vehicle.

Field trial permits have been given to the American Brittany Spaniel club for events this fall at the Highland Recreation Area. The Brittany trials will be held on October 2 and 3, and will be especially interesting as this is a national contest with dogs coming from all over the United States.

The fourth annual Farmers Day Festival which the Kiwanis Club is sponsoring in South Lyon on September 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, and 25 will be one of the longest celebrations ever staged in the community. And although the events go on for six days there will be something doing every minute.

Although the county regulated dog quarantine expired September 1, the period in Plymouth extends to October 1. City officials point out that this is particularly important for dog owners to note, in view of the fact that cases of rabies were reported in the township, city, and nearby communities recently.

Shooting butting of deer in Oakland county will start on schedule. That was the decision of the State conservation commission, which overruled protest from the regular sports of the county and that of Cass and St. Joseph in a meeting recently held. The experimental season will be from Nov. 15 to 30.

The grade 1 release of 11 antinecks in the State history by the conservation department's game division may under way. With 20,000 birds to be released before the end of October, 3,000 are now being released in six counties marking the highest number yet. The schedule allows 500 each to Oakland, Huron, Ottawa, Calhoun, Bay and Kent counties.

Only one man out of every 26 registering for the draft in Oakland County under existing regulations, it was announced will be eligible. According to word from Oakland county draft headquarters in Pontiac, this county's quota will be small, since this or that regulation screens out the bulk. As a result, that 26th draftee, who measures up, is pretty apt to be in uniform quickly. He will be needed to meet the States and County's quota.

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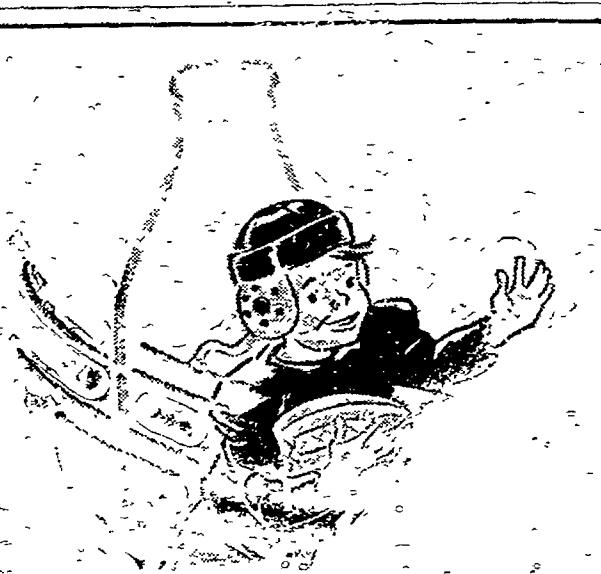

September Safety Program Outlined

"Give the kids a brake!" That's the theme of the state safety program during the month of September, when more than a million Michigan children return to school, according to Sergeant H. P. Kozowicz, commanding officer of the Detroit post of the Michigan State Police.

"There were 163 children and youths in the age range up to 19 killed in - pedestrian, bicycle, scooter and motorcycle accidents last year in our state," Sergeant H. P. Kozowicz said. "In addition, 4,336 were injured in pedestrian and bicycle accidents."

"The hazards increase when schools are in session. And drivers should bear this fact constantly in mind: No matter how much safety instruction you give them, children can always be expected to do the unexpected. That means drivers must do more than observe ordinary safety precautions. They must be on the alert for children darting out from between parked cars, playing in the streets, riding out of driveways on bicycles or scooters without stopping to look if all is clear, and other acts of carelessness."

"No matter if, technically, it isn't his fault, a driver who injures or kills a child never forgets the experience. It is an unhappy memory that lasts forever. Consider every child on the street a human caution sign. Keep clear of bicycles and watch out for youngsters on tricycles, roller skates, scooters and coaster wagons, and later the ones on sleds, too. Don't depend on children to observe safety rules. So give them a brake."
