

Small Game Hunting Season to Open Today at 12 Noon

Hunters getting ready to invade fields and marshes today, Friday, October 15, opening day of the small game season in the lower peninsula and of the duck season everywhere in the state. cannot shoot legally before 12 o'clock, noon, eastern standard

On the second day of the season it will be unlawful to hunt small game before 10 a m. in southern counties of the lower peninsula, but duck hunters can banging away one-half hour before sunrise anywhere in the state. .

Legal shooting hours during the migratory game bird (duck) season except on opening day are from one-half hour before sun-The to one hour before sunset.

The 10 o'clock opening hour on the second day of the small games season (ringnecked pheasants, rabbits, woodchucks, souricls, ruffed somes) is fixed by statute for those counties south of and including Oceana, Newaygo, Mecosta, Isabella, Midland, Bay, and all of Huron

doubtiul drinking water - three drops to a gallon and let it stand a half hour. You'll be better off thirsty than drinking from a creek or some old well which might be contaminated. 🍝

Choose clothing to suit the climate and the type of hunting you will do. Take comfortable hunting books and plenty of socks. Wear red but no white. Take adequate bedding; nights get cold in the north. Take rubber gloves if you are going to clean wild rabits in camp; some wild rabbits have tularemia.


