

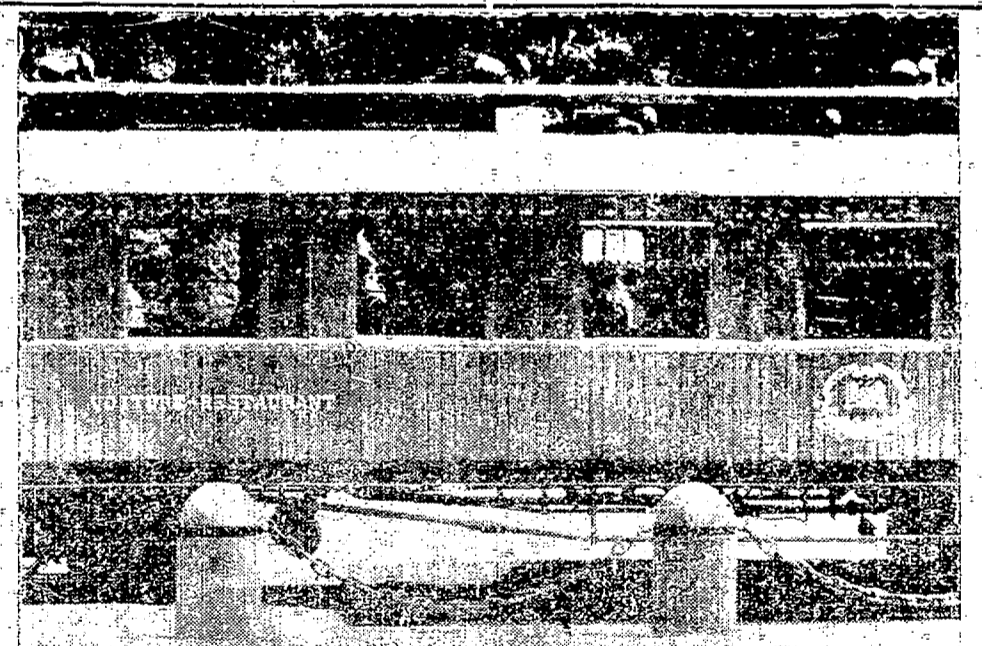

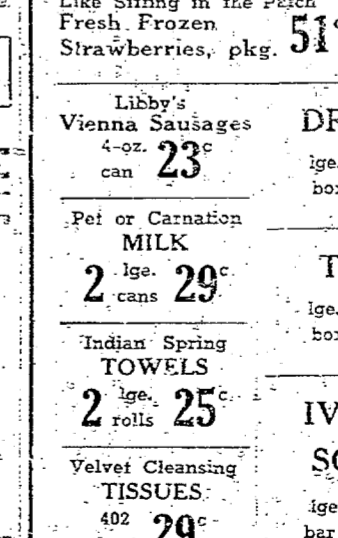

Exchange Club Backs Village Tb. Survey

At its regular meeting Wednesday noon, the Northville Exchange Club enthusiastically approved a plan to support the tuberculin skin testing program and the chest X-ray survey which are to be conducted in the Village. The plan was formulated in the Board of Control meeting Monday evening.

President William Peiz reports that the Club has agreed to cooperate with the school officials, the Health Department and the other organizations which are planning the program and to help in every way possible.

The Club will provide the patch testing material which will be used in doing the tuberculin skin tests on the school children. The members have agreed to go to the Mobile X-ray Unit in a body and have chest X-rays taken as part of the Club program for Dec. 8, 1948. They will encourage all others to do likewise.

The Exchange Club has gone on record as favoring this type of public health activity and all others, which will help protect our citizens and children against tuberculosis and the other killing and disabling diseases.

Every Exchange member is prepared to give information concerning the skin test and the X-ray test for tuberculosis.

That note of caution was sounded today by the Village Health Commissioner to all adult residents, industrial workers and school pupils in an effort to make the Village tuberculin conscious and to help make the

forthcoming tuberculosis survey an overwhelming success. Grades kindergarten through the eighth grade will receive patch tests and grades nine through twelve will receive chest X-rays about the last week in November.

About the first of December the mobile X-ray unit which is furnished by the Michigan Department of Health will come to the Village and free of charge, will X-ray all adults and industrial workers. The program has the sanction of Sup't of Schools Russell Armerman, the Coordinating Council, Mayor E. C. Langfield as well as many other community leaders.

A community planning meeting was held Wednesday night at the Village Library at which time was discussed the best ways to obtain 100 per cent participation in this community-wide chest finding tuberculin campaign.

This community program which is sponsored by the Wayne County Health Department, the Wayne County Medical Society and the Tuberculosis Health Society deserves the support of the entire community to stamp out this disease which yearly takes hundreds of lives throughout the country. Watch for the date when the Unit will come to the Village and plan on having your child and yourself checked.
