### NEW LUTHERAN CHURCH PLANS



St. Paul's Lutheran Church will soon begin construction on a new sanctuary and parish hall to accommodate a growing congregation who worship there.

### St. Paul's to Have New Church Hall

St. Paul's Lutheran church, corner High and Elm Streets, will soon begin construction of an estimated \$150,000 church and parish hall. Rev. E. E. Rosevold, who has been the pastor at St. Paul's since February 1937, states that the drawings are now complete and construction will begin in the very near future.

The church will be constructed to the rear of the present structure. It has been designed by Maul and Lentz, architects from Detroit, and it will seat 300 persons in the sanctuary and 300 persons in the parish hall. Bids for the construction of the building will be in November 12 and after they are opened and the contract awarded, ground breaking will take place.

Estimated to cost \$16,000, the financing of it will be done by the most part through the floating of a bond issue. It will be due in five, ten, fifteen and twenty year increments bonds which will pay an interest rate of from two and one half to four per cent. The bonds will be issued in \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000 denominations. The amount from the funds will be payable on April 15 and October 15 at the Depositors State Bank. Attorney George Schudlich of Detroit is the trustee for the bond issue.

### Post Office Begins Three Route System

The local post office this week inaugurated a new postal route in the village making the total number of routes three and giving improved twice a day delivery service to 75 more families in the village. Elmer Balko is the regular mailman on the new route which takes in the north side of town including Oakwood subdivision.

Harry German's route now includes the business section, East Dunlap Street, West Wing and all the streets east of Center Street and west of South Center Street to Wing.

Joe Litsenberger will now carry the mail to homes bounded on the north by West Dunlap, on the east to Wing and to the south all portions of the village south of West Dunlap Street.

Twice a day deliveries began this week on the 300 block on North Center and Grace Avenues, the 700 block on Carpenter and Horton, and in Oakwood subdivision. Mail was also extended to the 500 and 600 blocks on Carpenter and River Street, and to the 700 block on West Main Street.

Persons now receiving the twice a day mail service for the first time are asked to cooperate with the latest postal regulations concerning the placing of mail boxes. They are asked to put them where the postman will not have to climb steps or open doors. Boxes should contain a rack for papers and magazines and should have the resident's name clearly printed on it. This will insure efficient delivery.





Every Exchange member is prepared to give information concerning the skin test and the X-ray test for tuberculosis.
