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Bell To Propose Nat'l Book Week Extended Service Begins Sunday

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company proposes to offer better types of service at attractive rates to areas, formerly rural in character but now grown into substantial residential developments, in more than 100 of its exchanges, including Northville.

John R. Saxton, manager for the company, said the Michigan Bell will file a petition with the Michigan Public Service Commission Dec. 15 to extend the base-rate area here and to establish two new locality-rate areas at Novi and Salem.

The base-rate area would be extended to include the following territory in which there are 274 telephone users: 6 square miles adjoining the present base rate area to the east, south, and west.

In the territory to be added, the company proposes to eliminate rural service when facilities become available, Saxton said. Instead, users would be offered urban-type services. The changes would not increase rates for rural-residence users but would involve somewhat higher charges for business users. Users of urban-type services would no longer pay exchange-line mileage charges.

There are 113 telephone users in the proposed new locality rate areas. The areas cover 2.6 square miles north and southwest of the present base rate boundary. Novi, to the north, has become urban in character. To the southwest, is the community of Salem.

In the proposed locality areas, exchange-line charges would be eliminated on urban-types of service, resulting in substantial savings in monthly charges, Saxton said.

Under the proposal, no change would be made in present rates paid by rural-line users in the new Novi Locality Area, he said.

Rural line-service would be discontinued in the new Salem Locality Area, Saxton said. Instead, customers would be offered urban-type services at an increase of 25 cents a month for residence users and \$1.25 a month for business-line users.

Nat'l Book Week Begins Sunday

Book week this year will be Nov. 14-20; the 30th observance in a long and fruitful series. Working together in common cause, librarians, teachers, parents, publishers, and book sellers have brought about a greater variety and volume of publishing of books for children than could have been foreseen by the most optimistic sponsors of the first book week in 1919.

Commenting on the children's books published recently, Miss Marie De Agostino, children's librarian at the Northville branch of the Wayne County Library, said: "We are proud of the books which we loan to children these days. Children love them so much that the books rarely get to the library shelves. In fact the young stars are what we might call 'chain borrows'! 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The new edition is a compact volume of 453 pages listing 10,894 names in Plymouth and Northville and surrounding rural routes, with eighteen continued as the minimum listing age. This represents an increase of 1,046 names over the 1946 edition according to the publishers records.

Special features of this new guidebook include the designation by the symbol of tenant-owned homes and homes and places of business having telephones, individual status, wives' names, heads of households, and lists of government offices and officials also shown. Two stories, describing each of the communities separately, appear in the book as well.







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Kim Sigler, Michigan's ex-cowboy governor, now one-term. Elected two years ago in a reform crusade upset, sparked by grand jury revelations of Lansing legislative graft, the colorful Kim will now be succeeded Jan. 1 by a 37-year-old veteran of World War II, another political amateur, a man whom the governor casually selected to serve as a Democratic member of the liquor commission.

This capital city is still catching its breath. Despite rising opposition to Sigler, largely from within the Republican party, the forecasted Dewey landslide had been count on by state officials to afford a safe margin for Sigler. What happened then?

Since Dewey and Ferguson carried Michigan and since a Republican legislature was elected, it has become painfully obvious that many persons who voted for Republican candidates did NOT vote for Sigler. This cannot be accounted for on the basis of persons who had been offended by Sigler during his grand-jury days. Nor can it be justified by a conclusion that the people did not approve of his ideas for streamlining government. The results of the same election show that several Sigler-sponsored changes

were given majority approval: A constitutional convention and better salaries for state officials and legislators by removal of constitutional limitations. True, repeat of the state sales tax diversion amendment was emphatically rejected, but Sigler had given up any hope of getting repeal approved at this time.

As we see it, the election of G. Mennen Williams was not a mandate for this and that in the way of social reform. It was the indirect outcome of a "protest" registered by Republicans, for the most part, who had come to the conclusion that ANOTHER change was needed at Lansing! Why did they arrive at this judgment after only two years?

We recall a remark made by Secretary of State Fred M. Alger Jr., one of the original Sigler men at Lansing. Alger came to the capital city imbued with great ideals; as voiced by Sigler during the campaign. Here was an opportunity for public service of the highest order.

Did Alger get an opportunity to become a member of an administrative team, as Harry Kelley had successfully developed during his four-year incumbency as governor? The answer is no. Sigler failed in this respect to effect a working partnership with his own state officials and with the legislature. This failure was costly. Alger is remaining at Lansing. Sigler is not.

More farm people were injured by falls than any other type of accident, with the majority of mishaps involving falling on steps and stairs and from vehicles. Men and boys were victims of twice as many injuries from falls as were women and girls.

Of the total number of farm accidents, 56 per cent were connected with farm work and 8 per cent with housework. The age period from 25 to 45 was disclosed as the most dangerous.

Clean, dry floors are recommended as a precaution. The feet of stalled animals also should be trimmed at least once a month.

Electricity Assures Water for Livestock

Electricity Assures Water for Livestock

Economical Installation

For Winter Suggested

Electricity, which has eased the farmer's chores, has come to the aid of farm animals, too.

Through the medium of electricity, Dobbins and Bossy no longer need fear that their drinking water supply will be shut off during the cold winter months.

Tests by agricultural engineers have demonstrated that electricity is economical to provide warm water for livestock during the winter. Watering devices were operated at a cost as low as 70 kilowatt hours per month, representing an outlay of \$1.40 at two cents per kilowatt.

Some farmers are finding that their installations are expensive to operate, principally because of lack

of insulation or because too much water is heated.

The following suggestion will help to make an ideal installation:

1. Use as small a tank as possible, definitely not more than 150 gallons.

2. Install a float so the size of the tank can be reduced. Commercial units now on the market use only a drinking cup.

3. Use at least three or four inches of insulation and cover all sides, leaving room for only one or two animals to drink.

4. Install a baffle board to prevent air movement over the water under the insulated top.

Use of electricity makes it safe to install the tank inside the barn or in a shed, which will encourage livestock to drink more water and thus increase milk and meat production.

Life on the farm is far more hazardous for the farmer and his sons than it is for his wife and his daughters. In fact, a survey covering 15,000 farms the country over, made by the department of agriculture, reveals that about four times as many accidents happened to men and boys between the ages of 14 and 65 as were suffered by farm women and girls. Of the youngsters under 14 injured, nearly 65 per cent were boys.


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
