

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Mrs. Levi Eaton sold her beautiful stone house on South Rogers Street to Harry E. Rackham of Detroit. The J. N. McLoughlin family will vacate the place for the Rackhams next spring. This property is the last of a sixty acre plot that was at one time known as the Sadler farm. The house having been erected by him about 75 years ago. Before that the place was known as the Clover Condensory property. At the time the stone house was built, no other marked that section and it was the intention of Mr. Sadler to develop it into a fruit farm. so a large number of fruit trees were set out. Two years later the Eatons came here from Connecticut, purchasing the property. Later in 1919, 57 acres were sold to a syndicate of Northville men including M. Johnson, C. C. Yerkes, L. A. Babbitt and the Lovewell Farms Co., for the purpose of making it into a subdivision. However the Eatons reserved that section on which stood the stone house. According to circulars put out at the time of the opening of the subdivision, "Orchard Heights" is soon to be an exclusive residence section of Northville and Wayne County, with electricity, water, cement and gravel roads and gas. Each lot is to consist of from one quarter to two acres. There are 2000 bearing apple trees, 1000 cherry, 500 peach, and six acres of strawberries.

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Governor-elect G. Mennen Williams has a tough job on his hands.

As a Democratic governor, succeeding the crusading Republican Governor Kim Sigler, he will have a Republican dominated administration board and a Republican dominated state legislature to work with. He favored retention of the sales tax amendment which diverts 76 per cent of the sales tax revenue back to home government, yet he will face a prospective deficit in the state treasury at the end of the coming fiscal year unless new or higher taxes are imposed by the legislature. The budget problem alone will call for a miracle.

Ironically enough, the man who counseled Governor Sigler, on reforms for state government is slated to be replaced by the governor-elect. It was the conviction of John Perkins, controller who heads the new department of administration, that Michigan's 100-odd state agencies should be streamlined whereby the governor could be held responsible for the success or failure of their performances.

Centralization of authority in the hands of the governor - yes, that was the conclusion as voiced by Mr. Perkins, himself an able and competent person in his field. Only by placing authority in the hands of the governor - the power to hire or fire the heads of leading state departments, would the State of Michigan achieve direct responsibility, so Mr. Perkins reasoned.

Quoting from a recent paper prepared by Mr. Perkins: "The cry of 'too much centralization' has been raised without seeming awareness that government has really centralized in Washington because there has not been more integration in the state capitals."

The present state controller sees clearly that "acute fiscal difficulty" is just ahead for the State of Michigan and that "a deficit of millions of dollars" appears now to be inevitable. Higher taxes are now freely forecast for our federal government. The same logic, applied to Michigan, would bring a parallel conclusion. If retail sales continue their present decline, state sales tax revenues will soon start to fall. It looks like that time of reckoning may not be far off.

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

The three Magi, or Wise Men, who followed the Star of Bethlehem and brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the Christ child remain nameless, but they were the first to recognize the importance of the birth of the Prince of Peace.


For the third time within two years Dearborn School District electors will vote on a five-year \$5-million school building program that would alleviate overcrowding of City classrooms.

Reading Yuletide Stories

Adds to Family Christmas

THE reading of literature's most loved Christmas stories, including the Gospels, is one of the best ways for a family to prepare for the day itself.

A family reading session, planned for the last few days before Christmas, will make it easier for the children to stand the tension of waiting and will add meaning and happy family memories to the occasion.

Christmas is, first of all, religious, and the New Testament accounts of the birth of Jesus ought always to be read first. Both the Christmas tales of Matthew and Luke are beautiful poetry and literature.

Perhaps the most famous Christmas book in the world, after the Gospels, is Dickens' "A Christmas Carol," written in 1843. It is a tale which will be told and retold as long as there is Christmas. It is profound enough for the most adult taste and it is still a children's classic.

Henry Van Dyke's "The Other Wise Man," is another story which has become a Christmas classic.

It tells of a fourth wise man who says the star rising and set out to follow it. The great desire of this pilgrim was denied, yet fulfilled in the denial.

Christopher Morley's "The Worst Christmas Story" happens to be almost one of the best.
