All American Al Wistert Now Tackles Mail Problem

University of Michigan's captain-elect, Al Wistert after "tackling" football problems for the squad all fall is now "tackling" Northville's postal problem for the holiday season.

The thirty-two year old American football star is delivering mail on the West Main Street section, W. Street, South First Street, Fairbrook Road and South Wing Street. He reports that since he started on the route last Thursday he has incurred very little delivery difficulty, but thinks that it would be helpful if house and business addresses were more easily accessible. "Everyone," he says, "knows who and where Joe Smith lives here in the Village, but me."

The six foot three inch star left tackle for the U. of M. squad is the hero of many small fry around the Village. Only the other day he was accompanied around the neighborhood by Eugene Reinhart and Al Wistert.

Al, modest about his prowess on the gridiron, is proud however of the fact that he and his two brothers, Albert and Whitey, Wistert have all worn the number 11 numeral on their football jerseys for U. of M.

Albert is now playing professional football for the Philadelphia Eagles which Sunday captured the professional conference title when they defeated the Chicago Cardinals 7 to 0 at Shibe Park, Philadelphia. Whitey Wistert is now an attorney in New York. All three played the same position, left tackle and were named to the All-American team.

Al, who hails from Chicago, was out of school for 12 years and during that time worked as a salesman in the Windy City. Following forty-four months spent in the Marine Corps, one year of which was spent overseas in the Pacific, Al decided to go to college and chose his brothers' alma mater, U. of M. He is now a junior at the University and is majoring in physical education. Upon completion of his schooling, he hopes to coach college football.

Al is married to the former Nancy Scott of 10250 Seven Mile Road and he and his wife commute daily to their classes. They are now residing with Nancy's parents, Dr. and Mrs. Robert Scott of Seven Mile Road.

afternoon. In spite of weather

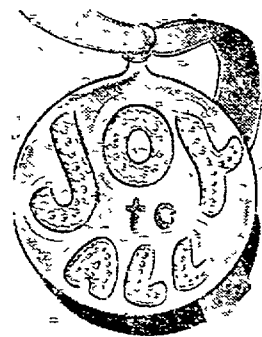
conditions fourteen ladies and
