New Animal-Repellent Will Lessen Free Meals

Animal wildlife will find free lunches fewer and farther between next year. A new product developed by the B. F.4 Goodrich chemical company and tested by the state of Mame fish and game department at its Swan Island wildlife refuge, may be just what farmers have been seeking.



Progress Made in Rural Phone Areas

"Sübstantial progrešs" was nade in the development of telprogram.-

Approximately 23,000 farm families were provided service last year. This brings the total 37 HUDSON Terreplane, in good number of telephones in service in the company's rural areas to 142,000 — an all-time high.

'Sınce V-J Day, Michigan Bell has installed 63,000 new rural telephones. Total rural development, as a result, has jumped from 57 telephenes per 100 establishments before the war to 70

This achievement was made ossible through an unprecedented rural line construction which included the program setting of 50,000 new poles and the stringing of 30,000 additional niles of wire.

The quality of rural service also has been raised, said Brandt. On most of our lines, the number of subscribers has been reduced to the normal objective of eight or less. The average is seven customers per rural line. "Also, more than 7,500 rural

telephones have been schafiged from crank-the-handibe to dial or lift-the-receiver operation. Brandt said demand for telephones by fermers still was at

a high level with 10,000 on th waiting list. He pointed out, though, that the waiting period for new service now is consider ably=shorter than, it was.

"We fully realize that much has to be done before telephones are available to the maximum possible number of jarmers,' said Brandt "Our rate of growth in rural areas is greater, propor tionately, than in urban areas. Telephone service now is within reach of 85 per cent of all rural establishments in our territory without any construction charge. "While we can't build every-


