54 Racing Days Granted Downs

The following article of local interest appeared in Sunday's Detroit News:

"While other groups talk of combining running and harness racing on one track Northville Downs Saturday was granted permission to conduct a trotting meeting for 54 days from Aug. 1 to Oct. 1, 1949."

"Racing Commissioner Frederick E. Harris gave the choice dates to Northville in a statement."

"Northville Down Association of Northville, Mich. is authorized by the Michigan Racing Commission to conduct a harness racing meeting with pari-mutuel wagering at Northville Downs, track from August 1 to October 1 inclusive, a total of 54 racing days."

"No extension will be granted. Some of the groups bidding for use of the Detroit Fair grounds in 1949 have asked or offered, to also conduct harness racing. Some of the groups claim to be partly financed by money from harness associations. Northville Downs has conducted harness meetings under lights for the past four years."

Congressman George A. Dandridge voted against the provision to make tickets for the Inaugural Parade tax free. quantities to be detrimental to the public health, safety, or general welfare of the citizens or to the property interests on either side of the International Boundary.

The Congressman stated: "It is believed the Detroit-Windsor district is the only area in the United States thus affected."

An investigation is provided for under the Boundary Waters Treaty of 1909. Dondero, in discussing the situation, said: "Such an investigation would determine what preventative or remedial measures can be taken to protect the public health, the probable cost, and who would bear that cost. The two governments, upon request, will make available the services of engineers and other specially qualified personnel. A report should be submitted at as early a date as practical."

The President's budget message has been called a "repetition of the so-called Economy Act" of March 14, 1933, to some extent, by some Veterans' groups. It would cut veteran benefits by \$1,300,000. One item affecting the 11th Congressional District of Michigan would be the cancellation of the project to erect a hospital in the Redford area providing 500 beds for tubercular cases; as well as a general medical hospital in Grand Rapids and a one-thousand-bed neuro-psychiatric hospital at Toledo which would have allotted twenty-five per cent or more of those beds to Michigan veterans. There may be surplus beds in some Southern States hospitals, but the Veterans Administration does not provide tuberculosis facilities for Michigan veterans except a few temporary beds at Dearborn Hospital. Veterans may be told that they can be hospitalized at Milwaukee or Dayton, but it is reported that only a very few beds in either of those hospitals have been available during the past year and then only after a long waiting period. State facilities for these cases are limited and unavailable at this time.

Congressman Dondero said: "I believe there is no need for a Veterans Hospital in every State, but where the need is, there the facilities should be made available to our veterans. Let the cut be made where the need does not exist."




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
