The following article of local interest appeared in Sunday's Detroit News:

"While other groups talk of combining racing and harness racing on one track Northville Downs Saturday was granted permission to conduct a trotting meeting for 54 days from Aug. 1 to Oct. 1, 1949.

"Racing Commissioner Frederick E. Harris gave the choice dates to Northville in a statement.

"Northville Downs Association of Northville, Mich. is authorized by the Michigan Racing Commission to conduct a harness racing meeting with pari-mutuel wagering at Northville Downs track from August 1 to October 1 inclusive, a total of 54 racing days.

"No extension will be granted for any of the groups bidding for use of the Detroit Fair grounds in 1949 have asked or offered, to also conduct harness races there. Some of the groups claim to be partly financed by money from harness associations.

"Northville Downs has conducted harness meetings under lights for the past four years."

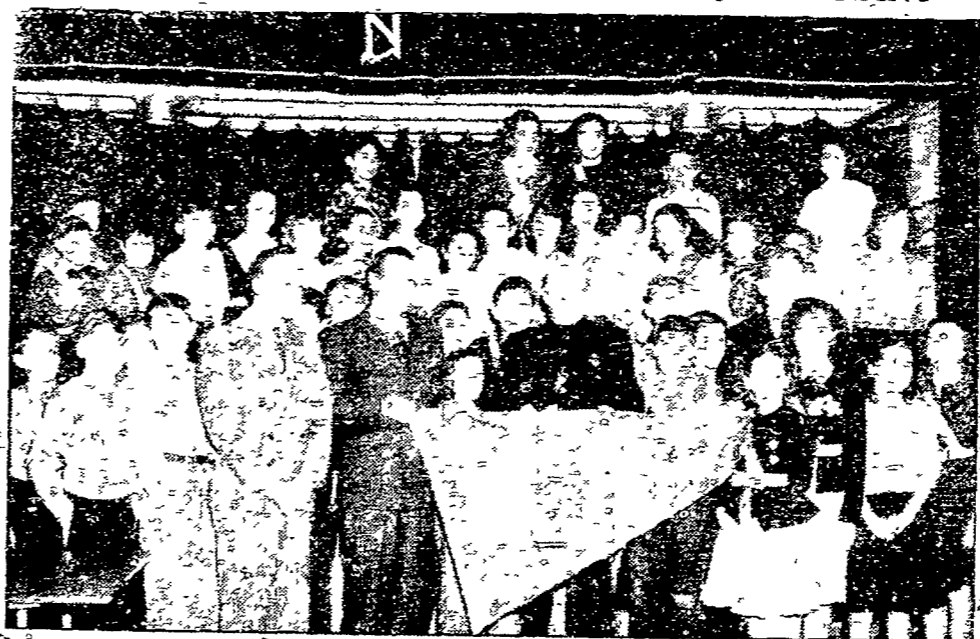
## February 3 Is Methodist Supper

## Spring Election Is February 21

Registrations are now being taken in the Township for the spring election to be held February 21.

Township Clerk Fred Lyke will be at the Village Hall Saturday, January 29 and Tuesday February 1 from 8:30 A. M. to 8:00 P. M. for the purpose of reviewing the registration and registering such of the qualified electors in the township as shall properly apply.

Persons voting in the spring election will help to choose one county auditor to serve a four year term, one township supervisor to serve a two year term, one clerk to serve a two year term, one treasurer to serve a two year term, two justices of the peace to serve four year terms, four constables to serve two year terms and one member to serve on the Board of Review for a four year term.

In order to secure the placing of the name of any candidate upon the ballot it shall be necessary for such candidate to file with the Township Clerk a petition signed by not less than one percent nor more than four percent of the electors of such township. The last day for filing a petition is February 1, at four o'clock. Petitions for Township Offices may be secured from the Township Clerk.

## Diphtheria Cases Are Reported in State

A total of thirteen new cases of diphtheria and four deaths from the disease in the first three weeks of January brought a warning to parents from the Michigan Department of Health.

Check up on your child's protection, it said. Take your child to your physician or consult your local health department. The child's immunization program for diphtheria should begin at six months. He should have a booster shot at three years of age and another when he enters school. Your physician may recommend booster shots for older children if there is an outbreak in the community.

The majority of Michigan diphtheria cases and deaths occur in young children.

## Dondero Tells of Air Pollution

Congressman George A. Dondero voted against the provision to make tickets for the Inaugural Parade tax free. Every child, all over the United States, is compelled to pay a tax on theatre, football sports, and other tickets; then why should tickets for seats to view the Inaugural Parade be tax free especially at a time when the Administration is calling for higher and higher taxes and at the same time spending and spending without a thought of curtailing needless expenditures and at a time when the Administration advocates that every person earning \$8,000 or more should pay a higher rate of tax on his income. The Senate sustained that point of view.

Congressman George A. Dondero, who stands at the top of the list on the Republican side of the House of Representatives, tells us that the governments of the United States and Canada have requested an investigation of the air pollution over the Detroit River caused by vessels and industries or others along the shore by the discharge of smoke, soot, or fly ash in sufficient quantity as to be injurious to health.

Nelson C. Schrader, Jr., chairman of the March of Dimes Drive reported that every thing points toward a successful collection of funds for polio stricken victims. The drive will close on January 31.

With the courtesy of Sam Schrader and Henry Luhs special drives for funds will be conducted Sunday and Monday at the local store. Volunteers at that time will pass canisters throughout the various streets. Many contributions are being paid to the drive.

At the March of Dimes page to end the end of it 1949 campaign period, N. C. Schrader, Wayne County Chairman, appealed for financial help that would be the means of polio.

We ask each of you to contribute in such a way as you can give your own share of the total to make your contribution to the March of Dimes campaign in your neighborhood.

A heavy responsibility rests on everyone in each community. That responsibility is to see to it that every possible aid be given to all our boys and girls. A survey should infamously strike on our hopes.

The current cost of hospital care for a polio victim in Detroit is approximately \$500 a month. The cost is prohibitive to most families but as long as there are March of Dimes funds—those funds are available to anyone needing financial aid to obtain medical care for polio, regardless of age, race or religion. The rising number of infantile paralysis victims nationally over the past several years has exhausted the treasury of the local chapter and has used up all the funds of the national epidemic and reserve. Your contributions are essential if we are to continue the patient care and polio research programs of The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis," Shapero said.

## Grade School Pupils Get Small Pox Shots

quantities to be detrimental to the public health, safety, or general welfare of the citizens or to the property interests on either side of the International Boundary.

The Congressman stated: "It is believed the Detroit-Windsor district is the only area in the United States thus affected."

An investigation is provided for under the Boundary Waters Treaty of 1909. Dondero, in discussing the situation, said: "Such an investigation would determine what preventative or remedial measures can be taken to protect the public health, the probable cost, and who would bear that cost. The two governments, upon request, will make available the services of engineers and other specially qualified personnel. A report should be submitted at as early a date as practical."

The President's budget message has been called a "repetition of the so-called Economy Act of March 19, 1933," to some extent, by some Veterans' groups. It would cut veteran benefits by \$1,300,000,000. One item affecting the 17th Congressional District of Michigan would be the cancellation of the project to erect a hospital in the Redford area providing 500 beds for tubercular cases, as well as a general medical hospital in Grand Rapids and a one-thousand bed neuro-psychiatric hospital at Toledo which would have allotted twenty-five per cent or more of those beds to Michigan veterans. There may be surplus beds in some Southern States hospitals, but the Veterans Administration does not provide tuberculosis facilities for Michigan veterans except a few temporary beds at Dearborn Hospital. Veterans may be told that they can be hospitalized at Milwaukee or Dayton, but it is reported that only a very few beds in either of those hospitals have been available during the past year and then only after a long waiting period. State facilities for these cases are limited and unavailable at this time.

Congressman Dondero said "I believe there is no need for a Veterans Hospital in every State, but where the need is there the facilities should be made available to our veterans. Let the cut be made where the need does not exist."

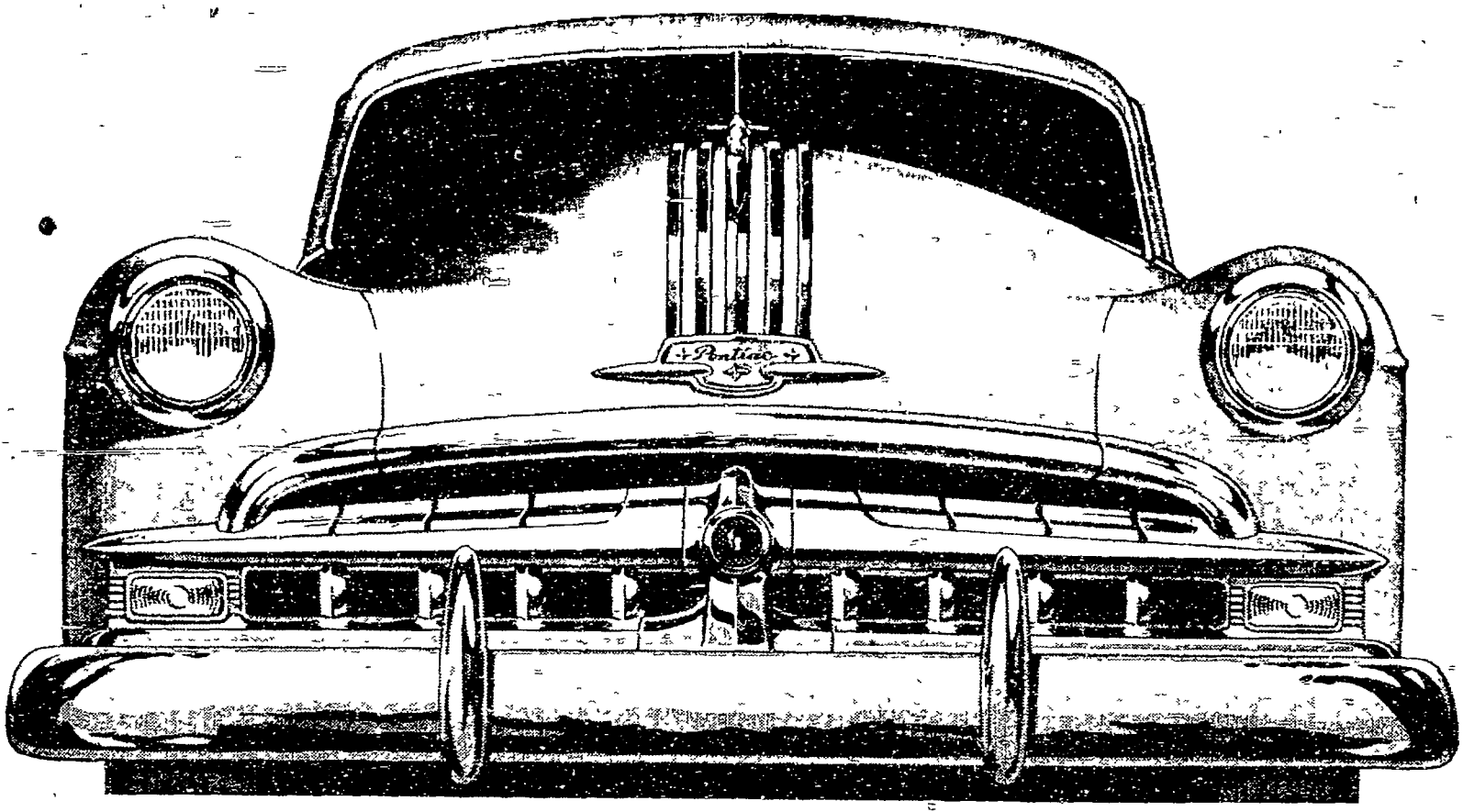

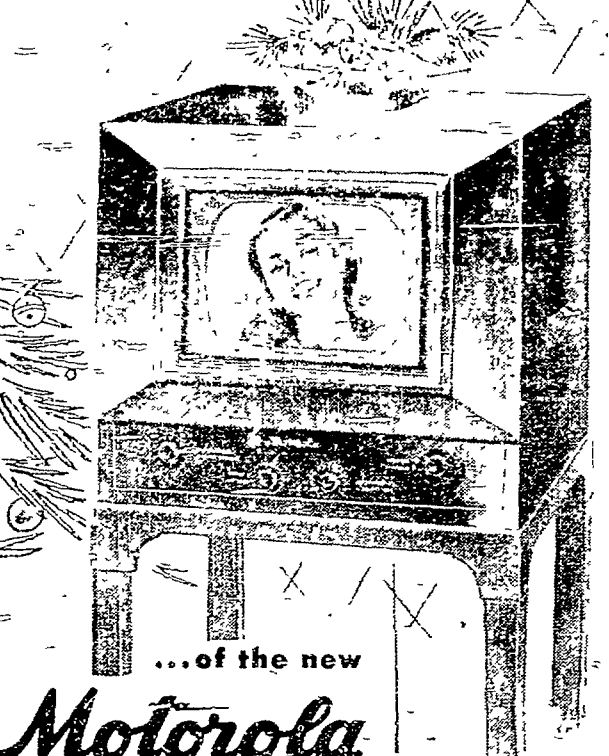
